

Arrival of the Canada

FULL PARTICULARS OF THE SEIGE OF SEBASTOPOL—OVER 3,000 MEN KILLED IN ONE SORTIE—THE PORTS HAVING BEEN PROBABLY DESTROYED—COLLISION BETWEEN AUSTRIA AND RUSSIA NEAR—MR. SOULIERA CLOUSLY PERMITTED TO "PASS"—PRODUCE ADVANCING.

PORTSMOUTH, Nov. 22.
The Canada arrived at this port last night. The news by the Canada is three days later. It is highly interesting and important. We give the following summary of the intelligence received since the commencement and progress of the siege.
