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Anti-Nebraska Meeting. Pursuant to previous notice a large and respectable meeting of citizens of Plymouth opposed to the passage of Douglas's Nebraska bill, was held in the Methodist Church, on Thursday evening, last.

On motion, Dr. E. BENSCHOVER was called to the Chair, and Dr. H. Austin chosen Secretary. After which a committee of seven, consisting of the following gentlemen, was appointed by the Chair, to draft resolutions...

Resolved, That the Nebraska bill is a violation of the Constitution of the United States, and that the people of this State are bound to resist its passage.

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Louis Napoleon Preparing an Italian Insuburgation. The New York Tribune has received some interesting information from London, which it is said that on the 3d of February, a declaration on the part of the Prussian Cabinet was despatched to Paris and London, withdrawing mediation with the St. Petersburg Cabinet...

Whether Prussia shall propose, in connection with Austria, a general signing of the German Confederation, will depend on the result of the meeting. Powers would have to be invited to give you all the rumors about the matter; they are very contradictory, and some are highly exaggerated.

The Tribune also furnishes the following reports in relation to certain contemplated movements of the French Emperor. Louis Napoleon has sent a confidential agent to London, to have orders issued in consequence of the failure of Count Olcott's mission.

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Constitutional. March 18.—Senator Mr. Gwin from the Committee on the Pacific Railroad, reported a bill providing for the Government contracting with individuals or corporations for the construction of a road to the Pacific, from the western coast of the one of the Atlantic states to the State of California; Government granting 20 miles of land for each mile of road, and 100,000 acres sections, and six hundred dollars per mile per annum for carrying the mail; the company contracting to place two million dollars in the State of United States stocks, in the treasury, as security for the faithful performance of the contract; and the United States to receive tolls.

House—Mr. Perkins, of Louisiana, asked, but did not obtain leave to introduce a resolution directing the Committee on Foreign Relations to inquire into the statement, report such action as may be necessary and proper for Congress to enable the President to address the outrages recently committed on the flag of the United States, and the persons and property of citizens by the Spanish Government in Cuba.

House—The Speaker submitted a communication from the Secretary of the Navy in answer to the resolution of the committee, relating to the repairs in the employment of a French cutter, which was not suitable for service as a war vessel, but in such a manner as would not be reliable for war steamer, in case they should be required for such service, though they could be made very useful as transports, or as privateers bearing armsaments. Numerous petitions were presented against the Nebraska bill.

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An Asylum for idiots has been established in New York, under the patronage of the State. The number of pupils at present is fifty. An appropriation has been made for the erection of suitable buildings, the accommodation of 100 to 150 pupils.

A. J. Hylan, Representative in Congress from the 11th Congressional district in Indiana, has written a long letter to his constituents, in which he states he is opposed to the Nebraska bill and shall vote against it, unless insured differently by his constituents. This they will not do.

The ladies of South Carolina have formed a Colburn Monument Association, for the purpose of raising money by private contributions, in which they are the memory of the late honorable statesman.

It is said that the Secretary of State and the Peruvian Minister have settled the affair in relation to the ship *Itelance*. They are introducing the American railroad into England. It is admitted by his constituents, in which they are the memory of the late honorable statesman.

A bill for the prevention of fish in the waters of New York, has passed their Legislature. The Catholics of Philadelphia, are making efforts to raise \$20,000 to finish the Cathedral at Logansquare.

The study of agriculture is to be introduced in the State College, under the charge of Prof. A. Nash. The Legislature of Tennessee has passed a bill providing for the election by the people of Judges and Attorney General.
