FOREIGN NEWS.

St. Petersburg, March 30th. The steamer Canada arrived this morning with Liverpool dates to the 18th. The steamer Baltic arrived. The steamer Texas arrived on the 18th, with troops from Liverpool. VIENNA, March 10th.—The treaty between the Western Powers and the Porte, respecting the terms of the armistice has reached here and been forwarded to the other Powers.

The London Chronicle's Paris correspondent states that dispatches from the French Envoy in London had been received, stating the English were not about to look upon a proposition made by Russia for a renewal of the armistice between the Western Powers and Russia as sincere or likely to lead to a new era, and that there was no occasion for two to exist in the world. The English government declares that the only thing to be done at present is to hasten the embarkation of troops for Constantinople, and dispatch a squadron to the Baltic;—his opinion of the English Cabinet are fully appreciated by the Liverpool.

LIVERPOOL, March 18th.—Colonel Richard B.
