Know Nothing Platform.

The first printed Platform of the Know Nothing Party, which we have yet seen, is the following, which is given in the New York Times.

The committee to whom was referred the State President's Annual Report.

Resolved, That Slavery, like Polygamy, is a moral, social and political evil; and in variance with the spirit of our republican institutions, and repugnant to the principles of freedom, that it is our duty to resist its extension; and that we cannot as Americans consent to the admission to the Union of any new States which do not recognize human bondage.

Resolved, That no adult Alien can engage in teaching and propounding of youth.

Resolved, That the peaceful enjoyment of our rights is best secured by a constant readiness and ability to resist encroachments; and that the Republic can only secure its safety, by a timely, consistent and determined redress of all wrongs inflicted on our citizens by the despotic rulers of foreign nations.

Resolved, That freedom can be prepared for the exercise of the rights of citizenship.

Resolved, That the temperance cause is one worthy of cordial support, and that we will in no case be drawn into any party or connection which will interfere with its progress.

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed to prepare a platform for the State Convention.

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THE ATLANTIC ARRIVED AT NEW YORK

The Atlantic arrived at New York on the 30th inst., with Liverpool dates of the 27th.

The chief interest of the news centres in the proceedings of the British Cabinet in which the Government have just announced resigned. Lord John Russell resigned his seat in the Cabinet and a total break up of the Ministry is talked of.

Gen. Lipinski had again advanced his outposts to the Schadowitz, and the Prussians, with 80 guns, are said to be at Porcup.

Letters state that the French had finally won the battle of the 25th, and that a favorable opportunity to blow it up. Success in the camp was increasing, and Manicheff is reported to have said: "My troops may rest: Gen. Janina, February and March will fight our battles for me."

An Orderly letter of the 9th says: "The Russians will shortly resume the offensive in the Crimea, having received the necessary reinforcements from the Crimea. The Prussians have been ordered to concentrate themselves at Porcup with a view of attacking Eupatoria."

It was reported at Vienna, on the 25th, that a battle had been fought before Sevastopol, in which the Russians were victorious. It was positively asserted that Count Palush's forces would begin operations on the 18th of March, and the allies lost the control of the artillery of the fleet, along the coast.

A dispatch from Manicheff, dated Jan. 17th, was published in St. Petersburg on the 25th, to the following effect: "The siege operations do not advance. Two successive night attacks on the 13th and 15th—we took 14 English and 15 French prisoners, and the allies lost a considerable number of men."

The DANUBE.—The Patrie says the recent passage of the Danube, by the Prussians, has given rise to a demand by Austria, for explanation of the reasons, and orders have been sent to Count Cronau to prevent the Russians from recommencing a campaign on the Danube.

The Admiral has received reports from the Black Sea and the Sea of Azof in a state of strict blockade, and has captured an enemy steamer on several occasions. The screw steamer Black Sea, with a steam engine to connect with the Black Sea, has just been captured by the British.

The FRENCH.—Russia interprets the four points thus:—1. No abolition of the Russian protectorate over the Danube and Wallachia, those provinces being placed under the guarantee of the Five Powers. 2. The free navigation of the Danube, from the mouth of the Danube to 1811 to attach, more completely, the existence of the Ottoman Empire to the interests of Europe.

Prussia claims the right to participate in the Vienna conference in her capacity as a great European power, and she has a protest to the cabinets of Vienna, Paris and London against any resolutions passed without her participation.

The troops furnished by Saxonia number 20,000 men of arms.

The Swedish army is to be placed on a war footing.

It is thought that Prussia will accede to the demand of Austria to mobilize her army, should she be sent into the Diet.

ARRIVAL OF THE ASIA. H. M. S. Feb. 14. The steamer Asia arrived on route for Boston. She left Liverpool on the 31st inst. Her arrival is some weeks later than those received by the Atlantic.

The resignation of Lord John Russell was followed by that of the entire British Ministry, and the department of the present government now Cabinet had been constructed.

Lord Derby had been invited by Her Majesty to form a new ministry, but his efforts were unsuccessful.

Affairs in the Crimea remain in precisely the same condition as last reported and there had been no fighting of importance.

In Germany relations were in a complicated condition as ever. Intellect, news from the departments of the Government having charge thereof.

The Queen sent for Lord Derby, but he was unable to form a Ministry, and resigned to Lord John Russell, Lord Clarendon, and the Marquis of Lansdowne as the most likely men.

Prussia had gained a triumph over Austria in the Diet, and the proposition of the former to the mobilization of the German army having been carried against the wishes of the Prussian Government.

Prussia wishes to permit French troops to march through her territory.
