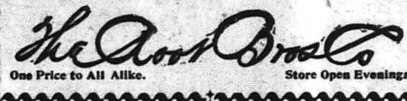

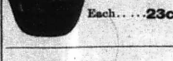

In 1832 they stood 100 per cent apart, but by dropping 1st per cent a year, in 1840 they would form a junction with free trade. In 1843 they accordingly met and traveled together without any material change until March 4, 1845, when the free trade democrats took entire possession, under James K. Polk as president of the United States, when they passed a purely free trade tariff law, concerning which Roger Q. Mills said he thanked God that there was not one solitary item of specific duty in the law that it was wholly on the ad valorem schedule.

Now let us see if the statement above set forth can be verified by the official utterance of Presidents Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, John Q. Adams and Andrew Jackson by their official acts during their several administrations. By what rule of logic can the present free trade democratic party, as now organized claim as they do at their regular national conventions and especially at their 6th of January festivals, held in honor of the "hero" of New Orleans that they are following in the footsteps of the old champions of democracy and sound money and a protective tariff? Jefferson in his inaugural address of March 4, 1803 says: "The remaining revenue of the nation is consumed by foreign articles in cherubry paid by those who can afford to add foreign luxuries to domestic comforts, being collected on the sea-board and the frontiers only, and incorporated with our mercantile citizens. It may be the pleasure and pride of Americans to be what farmer, what merchant, what laborer ever sees a tax gatherer of the United States?"

Again in his annual message to congress, Dec. 2, 1806, on the subject of tariff he says: "The question therefore now comes forward, to what other object shall these surplus be appropriated and the whole surplus of imports for the entire debt be paid? Shall we suppress the imports and give the advantage to the foreigners over domestic manufacturers?" Jefferson in his last message to congress, Nov. 8, 1808, recommended a continuance of tariff (not for revenue only) but he says in substance: "After we are free of debt and need it for no purpose other than protection" he advises its continuance and says: "It needs to be the surplus thus created for public improvements." President Madison in his seventh annual message to congress, Dec. 5, 1815, says: "In adjusting the duties of imports to the object of revenue, the influence of the tariff on manufacturers will necessarily present itself for consideration.

However wise the theory may be which leaves it to the agency and interest of individuals, the application of their industry and resources there are in this, as in other cases, exceptions to the general rule. Besides the condition which the theory itself implies of a reciprocal adoption by other nations, experience teaches that so many circumstances giving a powerful impulse to manufacturing establishments, especially of the more complicated kinds, that a country may remain long without them although sufficiently advanced in some respect, even peculiarly fitted for them.
