HIGH COST OF LIVING

**Was Greater One Hundred Years
Ago Than at Present Time.**

"A Pennsylvania man has furnished an account of a daybook kept in 1814 by the bookkeeper of a general store, in Amity township, Berks county," says the Delphos Herald. "From this daybook one catches a glimpse not only of what 100 years ago cost to live, but also how they live. For instance, with every bill of goods was attached one gallon of whiskey, rum or brandy, worth 25 cents. Homes were lighted with candles, costing anywhere from thirty-seven and one-half to eighty-seven and one-half cents a pound. Calico was thirty-seven and one-half cents a yard. Tea was a dollar a pound. In one charge, a map bought one quarter of a veal at four cents per pound. Eggs were never more than ten cents a dozen with six to eight cents three-contingency price. Chickens twelve and one-half cents to eighteen cents apiece; geese twenty-five cents to thirty-seven and one-half cents apiece. Beef three to four cents; wool ten to twelve and one-half cents per pound; maulin fifty cents per yard. The citrus was reached in one charge—one bushel of salt, \$16. We seem to have boxed the compass in the matter of the costs of living. One hundred years ago it was manufactured goods and commodities against which transportation costs were charged, which were the food that we eat. Today factory products are cheap, food dear."

Mansfield Man Called By Death.
John Britton Ink, one of Mansfield's best known business men, died at his home, 639 Marvin avenue, late Thursday, after an illness of a few days. Late Friday Mr. Ink went to Cleveland on a business trip where he was taken ill and was brought to his home.

Mr. Ink was born at Plymouth, March 17, 1846, and at the age of 6 years moved with his family to Michigan where he lived until 19 years of age, when he returned to his home in Plymouth.

In 1872 he was united in marriage with Miss Mary E. Nimmons who was the daughter of the late John and Harry E. Ink, survive him, two children, Lilla and Elizabeth, having preceded him in death.

Mr. Ink was a member of the firm of Reed, Ink and Lewis, but for the past twenty years has been vice president of the firm of H. W. Palmer, the Ohio Suspender Company. He was an active member of Mansfield lodge, No. 56, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. Brief funeral services will be held from the family home Saturday at 9 a. m., to which friends are invited. The burial will be at the Mt. Pleasant-Mansfield Mews, March 28th.

His ashes were brought here in an urn Monday forenoon and interred in Greenlawn cemetery.

Forty constitutionalist soldiers had been cut off by the federals on the river bank. After fighting for nearly half an hour, the constitutionalists tried to cross the river and surrender to the American troops.

The commander of the American cavalrymen signaled repeatedly for the federals to cease firing, but his signals were disregarded. Finally he ordered his men to open fire.

Officials at Washington approved the action taken by the United States troops on the Rio Grande.

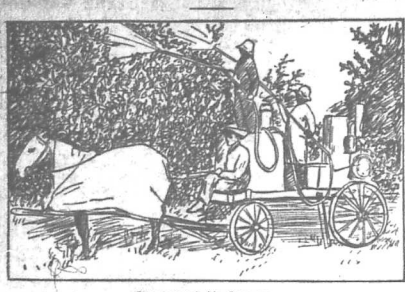
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PENETRATION SYSTEM OF ORCHARD SPRAY

calyx cup, or are so oily that they are hard to wet. In the matter of practical control it is these protected parts which must be reached.

The purpose of high pressure is two fold. It assures quickness of application, and it gives penetration to the spray.

High pressure means as much pressure as the pump will produce. The ideal high pressure is 250 pounds. More than this is not needed.

When trees are over 12 feet tall their tops should be sprayed from an elevation and not from the ground.

The method which, in our experience, has proved the most effective in producing these results calls for the following equipment: 1. A nozzle which will produce a conical penetrating spray.

In general, spray nozzles are of two kinds: the hollow stream, and the solid stream types. The former, variously known as the mist, whirl, or disk nozzle, breaks up the liquid into particles which leave the nozzle as a hollow cone of spray.

Mosses. Effective spraying calls for a downward directed spray. With a straight rod the downward direction is attained only by the falling spray, and that spray has lost its penetrative power.

When trees are so small that they can be sprayed from the ground it is advisable to complete each tree before moving on to the next.

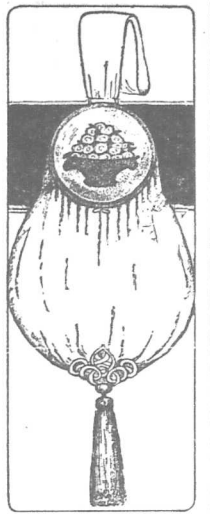
