





INVESTIGATION BY GRAND JURY

DOUBLE PROBE OF ALLEGED POLITICAL ASSESSMENT OF STATE EMPLOYEES.

ATTORNEY GENERAL TO AID

Governor Requested to Permit Hogan to Appear Before the Judgment, Public Inquiry, Civil Service Commission Will Ask Prosecutor to Submit What Information He Has.

(By Doris Duval).

Columbus, O.—Through a new turn in the proposed inquiry into alleged violations of the civil service law there will be two investigations, the first to be made by a Franklin county grand jury, and the second by the state civil service commission. The situation grows out of a sudden change announced by Prosecuting Attorney Edward C. Turner, who originally informed the state commission that information had been obtained before him that state employes under civil service had been assessed a per cent of their salary to promote interests of candidates.

Loan Agents Dodge Taxes. "High-rate loan companies are a bunch of tax dodgers and district tax assessors in every county of the state should make special inquiry concerning the assets of these companies if all just personal taxes are to be collected," said Hugh Huntington, Columbus attorney and leader of a recent campaign against loan agents.

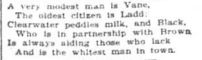

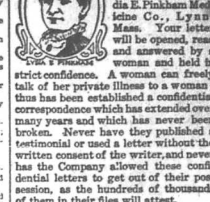

Monument to Apple Man.

Auditor John Dalton has just received a petition signed by several property owners, asking the county commissioners for an 11-mile extension of the improvement of the Black Fork through Weller, Franklin, Cass and Bloominggrove townships. The county commissioners say that the plan proposed by the property holders is to have that stream straightened, widened and deepened for a distance of 30 miles. 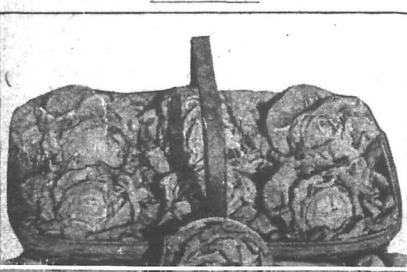

**Huron County Shows an Increase in Improved Roads.**

Huron county is the foremost county in the state of Ohio in building improved roads, when the number of miles of improved roads is compared with the population. Such a startling fact is shown in a statement compiled by County Surveyor Herriek and sent to State Highway Commissioner James A. Marker.

These figures show that Huron county, outside the incorporated cities and villages, that is the actual country districts, has 149 miles of stone road, 15 miles of gravel road, 18 miles of concrete roads, a half mile of brick road and 693 miles of dirt roads. The total miles of roads in Huron county is 675.

In the year 1912 Huron county spent the sum of \$385,959 in road work. This was divided as follows: road repairs, \$7,500; road construction,

\$210,000; bridge and culvert work, \$38,959. In 1912 the sum of \$151,390 was spent in the county on all road improvement.

The total tax collection in December, as just figured up by County Treasurer J. F. Henninger shows a total of about \$360,000 so it is seen that the tax collection for road work in Huron county in one year are about two-thirds of the tax collection for six months.

It is a consideration and comparison of all these figures that shows just what Huron county has done for improved highways since the grand improvement for better highways was started here about two years ago. Huron county leads in concrete roads for the state of Ohio. Inspectors from the state highway department recently completed a trip over the concrete roads in the county and a report to Governor Cox stated that the Huron county concrete roads could not be improved upon.
