



ACCEPTS OFFER

Gives Notice He Agrees to Peace Plan of Argentina, Brazil and Chile.

CONDITIONS ARE NOT KNOWN

It is Anticipated That First Move of Dictator Will Be to Ask for an Agreement on Change in the Personnel of the Mediators.

Washington, D. C.—Gen. Huerta has accepted the offer of mediation made by Argentina, Brazil and Chile.

Just now for this goes toward a final settlement of the difficulty between the United States and the Huerta government cannot be said, for the conditions of acceptance are not known.

Huerta's Anticipated Move. It is anticipated that the first move of Huerta, after accepting mediation, will be to ask for an agreement on a change in the personnel of the mediators.

The "general proposition" of the mediators is to be submitted by them to the United States, Huerta, Carranza and Gen. Zapata. The first proposition, it is officially stated, will be that the mediants agree that the pacification of Mexico, regardless of personal interest, is the first essential.

Secretary of State Bryan said that the United States is in no way bound to accept terms "cannot be stated."

As the mediators understand it, there are to be general the Huerta viewpoint and those of Carranza and the other agents and then by a digest of these frames the first detailed plan of mediation.

Until further report is had from Mexico City the three mediators, Ambassador De Gama of Brazil and Ministers Noy of Argentina and Suarez of Chile will be at a standstill.

Secretary of State Bryan stated unequivocally that mediation has not reached the stage for formulation of a treaty or treaty.

It is understood clearly at the White House and state department that the first proposals of a definite nature will not be originated by Carranza and the mediators that this government will answer to their offer of mediation.

To Sound Both Governments. As it is understood here the mediators are to be formally invited after acceptance by Huerta without communicating the views of either party to the other.

Attention is called by some of the officials to the fact that Secretary of State Bryan said he will represent the United States in Brazil to represent the United States in Mexico.

PROPOSES NEW LEGISLATION

Favors Establishing National Bureau of Labor Exchange in Connection With Department of Labor, With Central Office in Washington.

Washington, D. C.—Proposals for federal legislation to correct labor market conditions and thus prevent the annual recurrence of unemployment have just been made public here by the federal industrial relations commission.

The proposed legislation, transmitted in the form of a bill, would establish a national bureau of labor exchange in connection with the department of labor, with a central office in Washington.

New York City.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr. told Congressman Martin D. Foster, chairman of the house committee on mines and mining, Monday that he was in no position to arbitrate the bit or troubles in the Colorado coal fields.

Washington, D. C.—President Wilson had made a personal appeal to John D. Rockefeller to bring about a settlement of the Colorado coal field and end the violence which has cost a score of lives and large property loss.

NEARLY 200 KILLED AS MINES BLOW UP

OTHERS ARE RESCUED FROM SHAFTS, MANY OF THEM BADLY WOUNDED.

Rescuers Risk Their Lives In Effort to Snuff Out Flames With Earth and Water—One of the Greatest Mine Disasters in State.

Bluefield, W. Va.—With a thunderous detonation which made the hills quake and the valley folk panic stricken from their homes 200 miners under tons of rock and wreckage 550 feet underground.

Of the 74 men who were buried in one shaft, No. 6, 7 have been taken alive and badly wounded and 77 dead, without any hope whatever of rescue.

The cause of the explosion has not been ascertained and perhaps will never be known. The New River Co. operates six mines at Eccles, No. 6 and No. 7.

The Virginian railway suspended traffic and rushed a rescue crew of the Panama Coal & Coke Co. at Matoaka to the scene.

The superintendent also called for help from Beckley, another point on the Virginia railroad, but the Matoaka rescue crew were the first to arrive.

The rescuers cleared No. 6 mines and then started to reach No. 5 through the connecting walls of No. 6.

Orders Troops to Colorado. Washington, D. C.—The refusal of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., principal owner of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. to consent even to an attempt to arbitrate the differences of his company with the striking strikers in Colorado compelled President Wilson Tuesday to order six troops of United States cavalry to Colorado.

RESERVE COMPANY ORGANIZED BY MIAMI UNIVERSITY STUDENTS.

Spirit of Days of '91 Revived by Sons of Men Who Answered President Lincoln's Call.

Western Newspaper-Union News Service, Cincinnati, O.—The Miami university spirit of '91, reincarnated in the sons of the men who answered Lincoln's call, was evidenced by an officer of a reserve company to the First Regiment, O. N. G. A delegation of students from the Oxford college called upon Regimental Adjutant John W. Patton and Capt. I. H. Dube, of Company F, at the Army and notified them of their plans.

From present indications, it is likely that the regiment will have the only ceremonial colors in the National Guard. With a big French monoplane as well as a balloon, promised, sufficient equipment will be had.

RESERVOIR PLAN APPROVED

Dayton, O.—Called upon to examine into the feasibility of various plans of flood control, the government engineering corps looks with favor upon the plan of a reservoir, parallel channels and levees to carry off disastrous floods in the Ohio and Miami valleys.

The engineering corps laid stress upon the importance, economy and efficiency of the reservoir system. The action of building a reservoir in lowlands adjacent to river beds is attacked as the chief cause of the failure of the Ohio river and its tributaries to carry off floods with sufficient rapidity to prevent great destruction.

While the report is not final, it contains much valuable information that will prove beneficial in connection with the promotion of flood prevention plans in the Miami valley.

Rev. R. H. Balmer received the sad intelligence by telegram Tuesday morning from New York of the death of his brother, George G. Local people constituted the balance of the cast, and their work was commendable and worthy of high praise.  
One of the heaviest rainstorms ever known in this section, which amounted to almost a cloudburst, prevailed in this section about 6 o'clock Saturday evening, flooding all low lands and causing the river to leave its banks, and many cellars about town were flooded, while the streets were miniature rivers for the space of about a half hour. The water was so deep over the S. N. & M. tracks at North street that the 6:15 north bound car was unable to negotiate it and had to lay up until the water subsided. Early in the morning the water was washed out and a cubic foot of loose soil changed location. It is generally conceded that the rains were at least four inches, but the heaviest in the length of time ever known here.

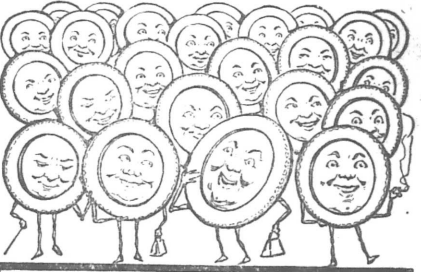

Her expenses for a week's stay in the state capital will be paid by the Agricultural Commission. She will be under the eye and care of the Domestic Science lady teachers at the State University. Good rooms and board will be furnished. She will be given a five-day course in lectures and actual demonstrations in cooking, home making, home decorating, and home health. Every county should be represented in this new and unique class. Dean Price of the College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts is requested to give special attention to these young ladies who are brave enough to enter the contests and make a good fight in a worthy cause. ### FINANCE

**Ordinance to Supply, Seal and amend an ordinance** passed on the 17th day of September, 1902, entitled "An ordinance granting The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Ohio, the privilege of laying pipes in the streets, alleys, sidewalks, public places, and grounds of the Village of Plymouth, Richland and Huron Counties, Ohio, for the purpose of conveying and supplying natural gas to the consumers thereof and fixing the price at which said gas shall be furnished for the period of ten years," to regulate and fix the terms, price and conditions upon which said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall be required to

furnish natural gas for and during the ensuing ten (10) years, commencing on the 14th day of April, 1914, and to repeal Section 3 of the above referred to ordinance, said repeal to take effect and be in force from and after the 14th day of April, 1914.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio: Section 1. That Section 3 of the said ordinance, passed on the 17th day of September, 1902, entitled "An ordinance granting The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Ohio, the privilege of laying pipes in the streets, alleys, sidewalks, public places and grounds of the Village of Plymouth, Richland and Huron Counties, Ohio, for the purpose of conveying and supplying natural gas to the consumers thereof and fixing the price at which said gas shall be furnished for the period of ten years," be hereby amended and supplemented by Sections 2A and 2B, which amendments and supplements are to take effect and be in force and effect on and after the 14th day of April, 1914.

Section 2A. Terms of Grant and Price. That during the period of five (5) years, from and after the 14th day of April, 1914, the maximum price which The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall be permitted to furnish gas to the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and its inhabitants for the domestic use as gas engine purposes, shall be, and the same is hereby fixed at thirty three (33) cents per one thousand (1000) cubic feet, with a discount of three (3) cents per one thousand (1000) cubic feet, if paid on or before the 10th day of each and every month succeeding the first period of five (5) years, from and after the expiration of the first period of five (5) years, as heretofore specified, the maximum price which said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall be permitted to charge for, and the minimum price at which it shall be required to furnish natural gas for the domestic use as gas engine purposes, shall be, and the same is hereby fixed at thirty-eight (38) cents per one thousand (1000) cubic feet, if paid on or before the 10th day of each and every month succeeding the second period of five (5) years, as heretofore specified, the original ordinance and this rate ordinance shall end and determine. The said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall furnish and install all meters free of cost to the consumer.

Section 2B. Commercial and Manufacturing Use. The said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall be authorized and permitted to sell for commercial and industrial purposes such natural gas as it may have available from time to time, in excess of all domestic gas engine and similar requirements, and the rate or rates to be charged for natural gas sold for such purposes shall be controlled solely by the said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, but shall be in keeping and competing with the cost of coal or other fuel in the manner and for the purposes for which coal is sold to consumers, with due consideration given for all additional or incidental charges connected therewith and to the element of convenience, and the saving of time and labor through the use of natural gas, but in no case shall such charges be more than is charged for domestic use and for such similar purposes. The said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall have the right to change, modify or withdraw any or all such rates and service for commercial and industrial purposes at any time upon giving notice of its desire so to do, as provided in the special and general contract of purchase entered into with said commercial or industrial consumers, the intent being that in the event of a failure to contract for the said natural gas, domestic consumers and gas engine users, shall be given preference in the amount consumed.

Section 2. In the event that any consumer shall use less than two thousand (2000) cubic feet of gas in any month, the said The Logan Natural Gas and Fuel Company, its successors and assigns, shall be permitted to charge such consumer for the gas used during said month the maximum price herein fixed for two thousand (2000) cubic feet, irrespective of the amount consumed.

Section 3. That the said Section 3 of the ordinance of the Village of Plymouth, passed on the 17th day of September, 1902, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by the laws of this State.
