The Richland county commissioners Tuesday voted to transfer \$21,000 from the officers' fee fund to the general county fund. Of this amount, \$4,500 will be taken from the county auditor's fund, \$4,500 from the county treasurer's fund, \$3,200 from the sheriff, \$4,000 from the probate, \$2,500 from the clerk of the courts and \$2,500 from the recorder's fund. The commissioners explained that this surplus came about through the changing of the salary of the officers from the fee fund to the salary fund.

The license act says the census is to be taken the year preceding the license year, the evident purpose being to prevent increases in the number of saloons after the number has been ascertained according to law. As the act has been drafted, however, it appears that a special census is good only for one year.

The Forty-eighth Annual Encampment of the Department of Ohio G. A. R., will be held in the city of East Liverpool, June 22-25. The "Ceramic City," as it is popularly known, because 90 per cent of the table ware of the United States is manufactured within its boundaries, is making preparations to entertain the old soldiers on an elaborate scale. Everything known to comfort and convenience will be provided for, and it is hoped that the guests will receive a welcome such as should live long in the memory of each delegate and visitor.

A great many people have an idea that they can write a letter and send it through the postoffice for one cent, providing they do not seal it. The fact of its not being sealed makes no difference. Any written communication must pay the first class rate of postage no matter whether sealed or not. Only circular matter mailed at a lower rate. A letter would save themselves and friends much trouble if they would remember this fact. Nearly every day they have to be told to seal a letter, while the address is paid, but the necessary steps are foretold their mail.
