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The house last week passed the Lantz bill, one of the most important introduced at this session, according to republicans. It provides insurance by townships of road improvement bonds, large issuance of which are now being held up by bond attorneys because the present law does not authorize them.

A two-story frame dwelling house on the farm of Mrs. Walter Cook, just north of Shelby on the Plymouth-Shelby road, was completely destroyed by a fire which started about 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Only a few of the household articles were saved, the house and contents being covered by \$1200 insurance.

Enemies of chicken hawks and other members of the hawk family can now make a little extra Christmas change by starting a slaughter on the pests. Notices have been posted telling of the law recently passed by the Ohio legislature offering a bounty of \$1 per head for all hawks killed in the state by residents of the state and presented to the proper authorities. The law providing for the bounty was passed on March 8, and is now in effect. It provides that each township shall set aside an appropriation not to exceed \$200 per year from the general fund of the township for the payment of this bounty. The dead hawks must be presented to the township clerk, who is required to destroy the carcasses and to tender a certificate for \$1 per head for the dead birds.

Norman Laser of Bloominggrove township will represent Richland county in the spelling contest to be held in Columbus in June. In the county contest held in Mansfield he outspelled the other winners in township contests held over the county. The county champion, who is 18 years old, drove 17 miles to Mansfield to take part in the contest. He is anxious to go to Columbus to participate in the state contest and it will be an event which he will long remember as it will provide a break in the routine of farm life to which he has been accustomed. Arrival at the position of Richland county's champion speller has been due solely to the boy's persistent efforts to gain an education as his schooling has been confined to the winter months on account of his assistance being required in farm work during spring, summer and fall.

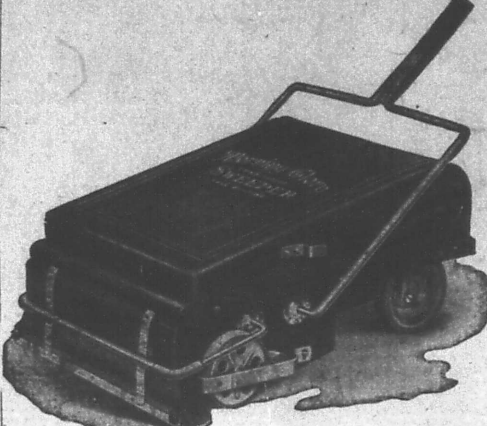

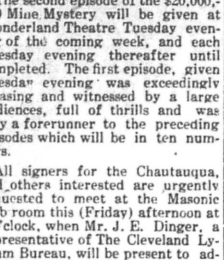

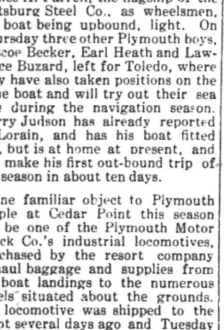

FOR SUNLESS WINDOWS

By EBEN E. REXFORD. It often happens that the woman who loves plants has no sunny window in which to grow them and under the impression that they cannot be successfully grown without sunshine, she does not attempt their cultivation, thus depriving herself of a great deal of pleasure, especially in the winter.



A Few Blooms in the House Add a Cheering Note.

In windows that are without sunshine are among our most desirable ones for house culture. First on the list I would place the Boston fern. Nearly everyone is familiar with this plant. It requires only the ordinary attention. Give it a soil of garden loam with enough coarse, sharp sand worked into it to make it friable, a liberal but not an excessive amount of water and a temperature several degrees above the frost point and anyone may be reasonably sure of success with it.

In steam-heated, gas-lighted rooms. No plants will flourish under such conditions, though many will live on indefinitely under them.

The aspidistra is about the only plant I would dare to recommend to those living in rooms heated and lighted as mentioned above. This plant has almost an iron constitution, which enables it to withstand influences that would soon kill most plants. It seems to care nothing for the sunshine and therefore is excellently adapted to cultivation in sunless rooms.

MOST SHOWY POPPY

The Shirley's are the best as well as the most showy poppies, and show a rich variety in color. The Iceland poppies are perennial, flowering the first year. They are unique among poppies in that they are fragrant, and the blossoms are quite enduring if cut as soon as open.

TRY AMARANTHUS

The Amaranthus is a much neglected plant. It can be made more effective than the canna or the Calladium. With its color-schemes in red, and red and yellow, and red, yellow and green, can very easily be worked out. Give it a trial.

TRUE BLUE FLOWERS

If you want a flower of a true-blue shade, grow the corn flower. The artists say it is the only true-blue shade nature has given us and the mother of a blue-eyed baby will tell you that it matches her baby's eyes.

Cyclamen plants should be rested during the summer months, not allowed to dry off entirely, but watered sparingly and kept as dormant as possible.

Farm Business.

In farming, as in every other business, elements of chance should be removed as far as possible. The amount and distribution of rainfall, the number of sunny days during the growing season, and the temperature are factors beyond the control of farmers. The farmers may, however, remove to a large degree the chances of a poor stand of his crops. This is accomplished, by carefully and thoroughly preparing a seed bed, by a careful selection and testing of seeds. The little broken seeds in the small grains and also a large amount of weed seeds can be removed by the fanning mill. Seed corn should have been selected last fall in the field, but seed corn, however it may have been selected, should be tested for its percentage of germination. This is a very simple process and anyone who is not familiar with it should write to the Extension Service, College of Agriculture, Columbus, Ohio, asking for information.

Binder Twine.

In normal years about 200,000,000 pounds of binder twine are required for harvesting the grain and flax crops. From two-thirds to three-fourths of this is made from domestic sisal fiber, practically all of which is produced in Mexico and exported from the port of Progreso. This year the demand for twine is certain to be greater than ever.

The disturbances in Mexico have already caused an increase in the price of twine in the stock of fiber now in this country. In commenting upon the situation, the Secretary of Agriculture said that the situation was fast becoming more serious than it was in 1912 when a threatened shortage of twine resulted in a rise in the price from 7 to 12 cents per pound. Then it was a matter of price; if Progress were to be closed this year, it would be a matter of actual scarcity which would result in a waste of a great part of the grain crops.

Large Number Paroled.

All records for number of paroles granted at a single meeting were broken by the state board of administration when the bi-monthly parole meeting was held at the Ohio State reformatory last week. The board was engaged during the entire week in hearing a total of 235 cases. A total of 165 applications for parole were granted and only 13 rejected. In addition there were 57 parole violators who were granted a hearing in their application for a restoration to a parole. The board acted favorably on the majority of these. Among those who applied for parole at the April meeting was Edward Burzgraf, who has been serving time in the institution for conviction for manslaughter. He was rejected however, as the members of the board were of the opinion that he had not served a long enough period to become eligible and also because of the fact that his record during the first part of his incarceration was not very clear. He will not be able to apply for a parole until four or five months have passed.

RAILROAD NOTES

The interstate commerce commission says thirty railway systems paid \$51,000,000 more in wages in 1913 than they paid in 1909, and that one ton—coal—increased in price 7.7 per cent from 1910 to 1913.

The high cost of living is a question the railroads have had to face without increasing the price of what they have to sell, except in a few instances. They had to wait four years for a small increase in freight rates. During that time many of them failed.

There are now ninety-two railroads in the hands of receivers, 85 per cent of the number doing business in the so-called 2 cent fare states. Significant. Five years ago the Erie railroad double tracked its entire line from New York to Chicago, except forty-five miles in Indiana. But it hasn't paid a dividend. Two years ago it stopped the improvements. It was obliged to stop, and several thousand men were thrown out of work. With money to spend this company would undoubtedly resume its vast betterment plan.



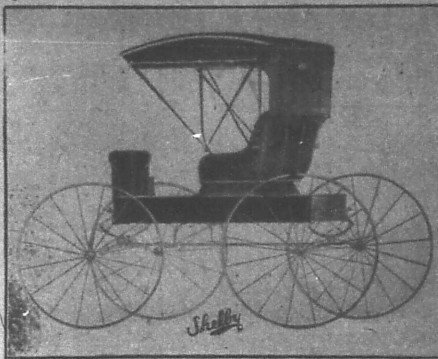
