PART IN WINNING WAR

Ten Thousand Soldiers Turning Out Shields to Meet Germans.

MANY ARE INJURED AT WORK

Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland. Place of Leadership Over Allies in Scientific Progress and Deadliness of Output of the American Brain.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 19.—Men who have been working in shipyards and munition plants have received just praise for their fulfillment of the war duty, there is an army of men 10,000 strong who have, as a rule, carefully screened from public notice, performing some of the most important work of the war, work which was largely responsible for the early ending of the armistice. They have received no recognition at all.

They are doing their best to keep the munition plants and shipyards from being impressed upon the Germans the impetuosity and headstrongness of the American brain.

These men of the Edgewood Arsenal stayed on American soil, never had the excitement of an ocean voyage or adventure in a foreign country or the hero-worship which is accorded to overseas, and in this country they had more than many of the men on the firing line.

300 at One Time in Hospital.

The hospital at Edgewood is now occupied by 300 men who have been gassed or burned while about their country's work. They have become heroes at Edgewood as on the battlefield. There is in the hospital a blue-eyed boy in early manhood, smiling bravely through scars which are today as vivid as the first day months ago as he sits up in bed, a wretched old man, almost blind, to the hospital. Nor is he the only one. There are others, some of whom have been gassed twice and three times, who have been gassed in Colorado, having developed tuberculosis.

Hundreds of others are injured and will always bear the scars of their sacrifice for Uncle Sam, which they gave so gladly without any of the glory, stripes, promotion or emblems.

The signing of the armistice has been the first insight into the vast work which has been accomplished at the Edgewood arsenal, where has been manufactured and shipped safely, for the world to use, the shells which were used in the war.

Gas Factory a City in Itself.

Where on October 24, 1917, stood a bare tract of land, now stands a city in its activities. Great chemical plants have risen with lightning rapidity, and down near the water the large filling plant where the big shells were filled with deadly poisons and sent on their errand of felling humans.

Edgewood arsenal covers a tract of 1,000 acres. The work of the arsenal was done by 10,000 men. The gas shells were filled in the plant, and the shells were packed in the plant.

William Edward Wechter.
Carrying a withered arm, a permanent and regrettable injury, torn by shrapnel at Chateaufort, Thiery, Private Wechter of Co. E, 23rd Infantry, has reached the home of his parents at New Washington, discharges from the service after well onto a year in France.

He is the first soldier with a permanent wound to return to the county of Crawford after discharging the big duty "over there" that he enlisted for.

Unmarried, and now living on Tiro R. D. No. 1, Wechter joined the army at Plymouth, O., and went overseas early in 1918, assigned to the 23rd Infantry, he went over the top five times, saw five months of trench service and battling, and then spent many weary months in French hospitals before he was sent home, a casualty. Wechter's withered arm is a far more eloquent badge than the war crosses of overseas dominion.

It testifies indisputably and permanently to his part in the big muss.

And he got it at Chateaufort, Thiery. His command "went in" with the fighting marines, the "leather-necks" in July 1918, when they launched that smash which started the German resistance to crumbling; the brilliant offensive which electrified the armed world and stamped America as the producer of the peerless fighting man.

Private Wechter is visiting at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Wechter, in New Washington. A modest young man, he is not voluble about his experiences overseas. Like the real soldier, he does not become his own press-agent. But that injured arm and the record of his regiment will always testify to his part in the big struggle.

Private Wechter enlisted a year ago in September, got the usual course of preliminary training, and early in 1918 found himself on the soil when the great de-

struction was going on. His regiment was in various engagements, his first time "over the top" being in March, 1918. The Chateaufort Thiery smash was his last engagement. There, the 23rd fought side by side with the Marines, and delivered the smash that took the heart out of the Germans.

It was there that a flying fragment of shrapnel crashed viciously into his right arm, smashing the elbow joint. It was ultimately necessary to remove the joint and Private Wechter's arm is permanently useless.

He was in France for nearly six months after his injury, every effort being made to improve the condition of the arm, without satisfactory result. Then he was invalided home with the casualties.

While he would rather have come back sound and whole, Private Wechter is satisfied. He saw his duty and he did it, and the sum of such service as he gave, is what won the great war for the Allies.—Bucyrus Telegraph.

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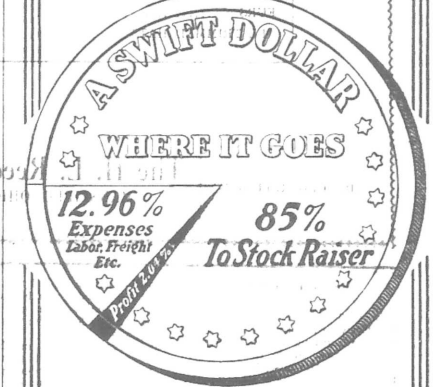
Losses of live stock from disease, accident and other causes, probably three-fourths of which are preventable by proper preventive measures and modern veterinary practice, amount to enormous sums each year. In 1915 they were estimated as reaching \$212,000,000. This sum, say specialists of the United States department of agriculture, would supply the entire American expeditionary force of 2,000,000 men with meat for nearly a year. To these losses may be added losses which, though indirect, are nevertheless important. The discouragement of stock raising is one indirect loss, and this in turn retards the development of diversified agriculture.
