Seeing what Richards was about he stopped, beat in his tracks, looked meditatively at Richards for a moment, then at his headpiece and finally burst out:

"What a lucky devil you are, Richards. Now if I owned a wig like that, all I'd have to do would be to hang it on the footboard outside and tell those crazy females on deck to help themselves."

DELEGATES TO CLUB CONGRESS

Six delegates have been chosen from among all prize winners at the County Fair to represent Huron County at the Youth Annual Club Congress to be held at Ohio State University, November 7-12.

Lowell Ruzgles, North Fairfield; Dwight Newman, New Haven; William Sims, West Hartland; Bertie Davis, bright, Richmond Township; Virginia Micky, Greenlawn; and Elizabeth Miesler, Bronson Township are the fortunate club members who were recently chosen by the County Club Congress.

The delegates will engage in a short conference session each day, discussing various problems. The rest of the time will be spent touring the University campus and buildings, including the stadium and museums, attending demonstrations, listening to illustrated lectures, taking part in games and dramatics, watching motion picture shows, and visiting points of interest in Columbus. They will be housed in first class hotels, and will get their meals at the King Avenue Methodist church.

Not all delegates chosen were first prize winners, and not all first prize winners were selected as delegates. Huron County's allotment of delegates by the state was six, and there are several first prize winners, some of whom have already had the honor of being delegate, some of whom are too young, and some of whom have not completed a full 4-H program for one year or more. All were chosen because of outstanding club interests in addition to their good standing on their club exhibit.

Proposed Bond Issue to Be Ready For Voters on the 8th of November.

In order to correct a false rumor that has been circulated, it will be stated that the State Tax Board has never refused to permit the school board to submit the \$125,000 bond issue to the voters of Plymouth village. They have hesitated to grant this permission until the need was made clear. Now that the local situation has been presented to them in its true light, they have granted this permission.

It was stated by members of the Board that every detail has been completed and that the ballots will be on hand election day, and that all is necessary now is for the voter to give his approval of the venture on the ballot.

There is no doubt that the school bond issue will be opposed, but it is believed that in spite of the opposition the issue will carry by a good majority.

The need for a new school in Plymouth is too great for the voter to turn down the opportunity after the Board has exerted every effort to get the question before the people. A new school in Plymouth will be one of the biggest things the town has boasted for years, and it will assure the patrons of the school a safe building for their children and a better education in every respect.

The question as to why the present building would not be suitable for the grades, and why a high school constructed? Here's the reason: we are in favor of a complete building:

1. Only one heating plant needed.

2. Expense of one janitor during school hours.

3. The gymnasium will be available for physical training by all pupils.

4. It would almost be impossible to have hot lunches for the children in two buildings, especially if they were any distance apart. And there seems to be no suitable site close to the present building.

ARGUMENTS FOR NEW BUILDING
1. The present building could be used only for a few years before the issuance of bonds would again be necessary.

2. It is cheaper to build and equip a new building all at one time.

3. According to estimates furnished the costs for a Junior and Senior High school would be \$100,000. It will take \$25,000 to repair the present building to meet state requirements.

TO REQUIRE THE CONTROL AND USE OF THE PUBLIC SEWERS BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HUDON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES, OHIO.

Editorial-News And Comment On National Happenings

ON NATIONAL HAPPENINGS

A recent parole from a state penitentiary was not enough to completely rehabilitate a burglar. He secured a position in a jewelry store as a salesman, but the firm wished to send him to Europe to buy diamonds and his status as a paroled convict grossly interfered with the granting of a passport. So the governor of the state obligingly granted a pardon. The officials in the county from which he had been sentenced are said to have recommended the pardon and the jewelry firm expressed confidence in the man's honesty. The incident should be most encouraging to prison reformers—who think convicts should be released early and given good chances to "come back." Of course it pictures this world as a pleasant place when governors, jewelers and other men are ready to lend the "helping hand" even to a former criminal. Also it can be regarded as no more than just that a felon should be given "another chance" after he had paid his "debt to society" by serving his full sentence. It is to be hoped the new diamond buyer will "go straight" with all success and not spoil the optimistic story with another criminal offense. Yet we cannot agree that ex-convicts deserve better opportunities to get along in the world than honest men. No debt, a prison record is a handicap in business, making it additionally hard for the former prisoner to succeed, but we do not see that it entitles him to official or other favor not accorded a law-abiding citizen. We wonder how much sympathetic assistance in his search for employment a man who had never broken a law would get from a busy governor. With crime uncomfortably abundant, it surely would be poor policy to make a prison term a stepping-stone to occupational preference. And the jewelry company's character testimony as to the man's entire honesty puzzles us somewhat. If a burglar paroled from a penitentiary in July can establish a perfectly trustworthy reputation by October, what's the use of being honest and trying to get along year after year without any of the easy money to be had from crime?

A Yale professor claims kitchenette apartments and difficult economic conditions for professional workers is a primary cause for the decline of the biological vigor of the creative class. Should this theory be true, the world will be practically unpopulated by 2127.

Hugh Campbell Wallace, who took an active part in several Democratic national campaigns, is back at his home in Tacoma, Wash., after going about the country considerably in the last few months, and he is back with an idea. He says that the Democratic party is going to nominate next year a ticket headed by Governor "Al" Smith of New York and completed by the widow of Woodrow Wilson. About the only comment called for is that he makes it hard to understand the fact that Mr. Wallace was the American ambassador to France from February, 1919, to July, 1921, holding a post which is supposed to demand vision, judgment and carefulness in speech.

The new revelation the tornado made of the "spirit of St. Louis" is not a picture of adventure and pioneering. It does not call for a Lindbergh to do what no one ever did before. But it shows a city both rich

and proud, able to take care of all its own sufferers from a great disaster and ashamed to let any outsiders help in that heavy task.

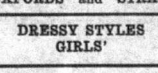

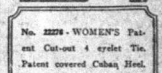

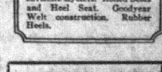

When Robert Ingersoll was denying the existence of God for so many dollars a lecture, he asked Gen. Lew Wallace to be ready to assist him in clearing up the mythical story of Jesus and God. Mr. Wallace promised to assist in the clearing of what he called "Christian Superstition" but he told the secretary of the Y. M. C. 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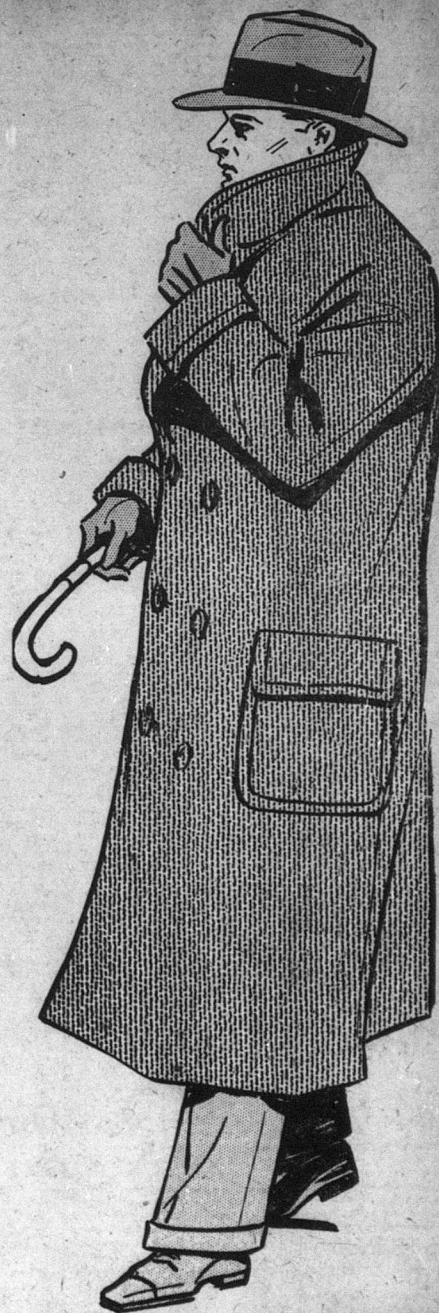
