COST OF NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

As we all know the question of a new school house will be up to the voters of Plymouth at the November election.

There are many view points or angles to the question which are debatable, but there is one question which is not debatable if the proposition carries, which Plymouth tax payers must face, not only now but for twenty-three years, which is a certainty, and that is the cost of the new building and running expenses of same.

Each individual tax payer is asking the question either mentally or orally—what will a \$125,000 school house cost me?

In order to get a basis to figure the approximate cost, consult your last tax receipt to find the valuation of your property. The rate for general taxes in Plymouth Village for the year 1927 (one-half due in Dec. 1927 and one-half due in June 1928) is now fixed by the Auditor of Richland County at \$19.69 per thousand to which sum add \$5.40 for a new school house, if the proposition carries at the election, making \$25.09 per thousand for 1927. This is the latest word from the Richland County Auditor, being his closest approximation. The statement which the Auditor heretofore made of 3.34 is an estimate of the average for the 22 year period. Multiply your valuation by 25 and be careful where you place the decimal point and you will have a pretty good idea what your tax will be for 1927. Whether you regard the tax as high or not will be your own notion of the tax dollar—and say, don't let the Plymouth voters vote to build a situation plan in the sum of \$25,000 which still stands. The referendum and injunction only covered the purchase of the quarry site.

This article is not intended as an argument either for or against the \$125,000 new school house proposition. I am not arguing, I am telling you.

More Light On The School Situation

In response to considerable talk that is going around that the Board of Education were not granted an audience with the Tax Commission of Ohio and that the Tax Commission had not given their consent to the Proposed bond issue for the new school building we wish to state that the Tax Commission did grant the Plymouth board of education an interview and did grant them the request asked for. A letter granting this request is in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Education (Mr. Judson) and can be seen by anyone so desiring. Regarding the increase in taxes which the bond issue will raise, we wish to state that the present tax rate for Plymouth is eighteen mills which is among the lowest in Huron County, the other twelve low ones ranging from 16.10 mills to 18 mills. The proposed bond issue will raise our rate on an average of 1.33 mills which means that a person with property valued at \$5,000.00 on the tax duplicate will be assessed extra for this new school building \$16.65 on the entire \$5,000.00 each year as long as the bonds run or in other words for school purposes.

This means that if you list your property at \$5,000.00 on the tax duplicate that you will be paying less than 5 cents a day toward this new school building and certainly anyone with property valued at \$5,000.00 on the tax duplicate should be willing to pay 5 cents per day in order that our children may have the right kind of a schooling. We spend 5 cents every day for things far less worth while and never grumble so why raise such a bother about spending 5 cents a day toward education.

When people talk that the new school building will double their taxes you can put them down as not having the right kind of a common sense thought or else they cannot grasp. Greenwich is voting again on a new school house and their tax rate NOW IS 25 mills, or 7 mills higher than ours so why should we hesitate.

We ask the public to use consideration in this matter and not jump

Former Editor of Advertiser Dies In Calif.

News of the death of Frank Dawson Waite, which occurred in San Diego, Calif., will be received with much regret by many friends here, who well knew and held him in high esteem.

Mr. Waite was born in Plymouth and started his newspaper career on the Plymouth Advertiser. From here he went to Cleveland where he was engaged in newspaper work. After leaving Cleveland he settled in San Diego, where he was connected with The San Diego Sun up until the time of his death.

A number of near relatives survive Mr. Waite, among whom are, Dell Waite of Plymouth, and George R. Waite of Shelby.

The Sun says: "Frank Dawson Waite, former editor of the Sun and one of the ablest and most respected editorial writers in southern California, died at his home early today at the age of 71 years."

"Waite became editor of the Sun in 1892 when the paper was consolidated. He retired as active manager of the Sun in 1905 but remained associate editor for several years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Waite, and two granddaughters Edith Louise and Eileen Waite of San Diego and a niece Hazel Waite Gilbert of Hollywood."

"Waite was born in Plymouth in 1856."

ATTEND ANNUAL CONVENTION

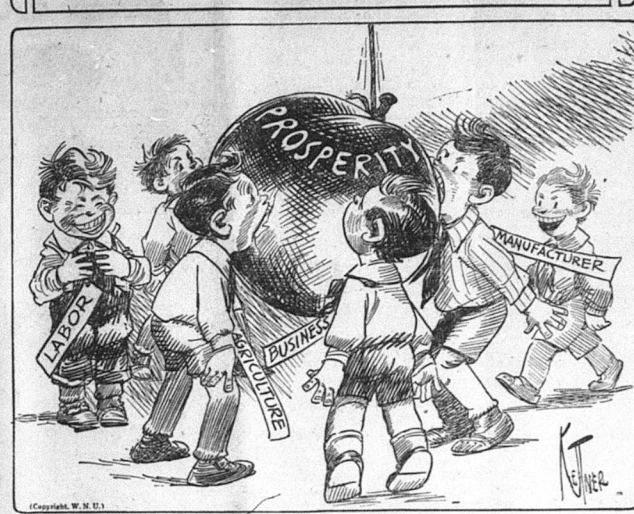
