

Association Opposes New Tax Increase

Secretary of Auto Association Says Corporations and Others are Evading Just Share of Supporting State Government.

Automobiles of the state are unalterably opposed to any further increase in gasoline taxes and will oppose such a measure to the limit, according to Chas. C. James, secretary of the Ohio State Automobile Association. Mr. James said that never were automobile clubs as well as individual owners more united on an issue than they are at the present time in opposition to any increase in the gasoline tax.

"One cent a gallon increase in gasoline taxes means \$6,000,000 more annually from the pockets of automobile owners of Ohio," Mr. James said, adding "at the present time auto owners must pay three different taxes. First that for the license taxes each year, then the personal tax, and the gasoline tax of two cents per gallon. Why, if they add to the gasoline tax it will cost many autists one cent per mile tax for every mile they drive."

"Approximately \$13,000,000 is now being collected annually from gasoline tax while the revenue from the sale of automobile license taxes reached \$9,250,000. That is almost \$3,000,000 collected annually from Ohio automobile owners, while the personal tax will average almost \$10 per machine, which means \$10,000,000 more. It does not count the loss from operation due to depreciation, liability, theft and other insurance which most automobile owners carry."

"Automobiles have been the source of pleasure as well as business for millions of Ohio residents. If the general assembly adds to the gasoline tax it is going to prove a prohibitive measure for many who now operate machines going to and from work can not afford the expense."

"It would seem that every time the state needs more money for operation they strike at the automobile owner, while large corporations and others are enabled to evade their just share of supporting the state government. There have been those who have tried to collect all money required for the state government, and the auto owner was not included in it either."

The marriage of Mr. James Rhine and Miss Madge Snyder came as a complete surprise Tuesday when their wedding was announced.

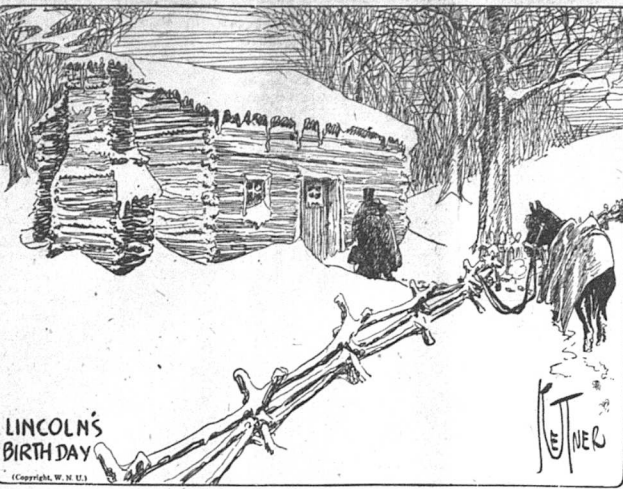
Miss Snyder is the charming daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Snyder, and is a graduate of Plymouth High school.

Harry Murphy Enjoying California Ranch Life

R. T. Chappell Writes of Visit to Home of Former Plymouth Boy; Tells of California Beauty.

"The Advertiser is in receipt of a letter from R. T. Chappell, who recently moved to California, and who has written a mighty interesting story of spending a delightful day at a guest of his boyhood chum, Harry Murphy, who will be remembered by many here. The letter follows:

"We go up this morning with a beautiful sun shining bright and warm. At eleven o'clock we started out to make a visit to Harry Murphy's ranch for he had asked us down to spend the day with him and his folks."

"We drove out to Sacramento on the Stockton Boulevard which is a very fine wide road. We had not gone much over seven miles from the city when we drove up to a flock of sheep. 'I don't know that many of you have tried to drive through a real flock of these animals.'

"As we approached them we slowed down and asked a man that was in the rear, how many there were, and he told us that there were twenty-six hundred in the flock."

"This man opened the way for us to get through which took at least five minutes for they don't go just where they are asked to."

"With this flock there was a covered wagon, the same kind that you see in motion pictures, and about five or six men, each man having his own dog."

"They were taking the sheep from the low land pasture up to the top of a fine ridge, and they were working their way up into the mountains, where they do their summer grazing."

"We drove on, went through the edge of Lodi, a town of about eight thousand, which has a beautiful Palm drive, going into the city. Then on to the Murphy ranch. On our left we could see a mountain range with the sun shining on its snow capped peaks."

"When we were nearly there, we stopped at a gas station and asked the man there, if he could tell us where to find the Murphy ranch, he said that it was very clearly, for that is characteristic of California people to be very obliging."

"We were on a very short time until we drove up to the lane that goes back to Harry's home which is about six hundred feet up a fine road, and directly to Stockton, nine miles south of Lodi. We had only made the turn into the ranch when it was all before us."

"It was the same Harry that used to be about the streets of Plymouth. I don't know how he has changed, but he was mighty glad to shake the hands of one of his old chums again."

"Mr. and Mrs. Murphy and Harry's partner were on the porch to meet us. Mr. and Mrs. Murphy are looking great."

"After we had been in the house a few minutes, Harry, Douglas and I started out for a walk over the ranch which was very interesting to me."

"We walked out through his orchards, as he has ten acres of peaches with walnut trees planted every other row."

"This is done so that the peach trees are cut out as soon as the walnut trees are grown, for walnut trees grow to be a good size."

"He told us that the walnut trees were grown from walnuts that he and his partner had planted."

"We went on and there were five acres of apricot trees, five acres of black and white cherry trees together which were planted so that one row was white and the next one black, also twenty acres of grapes."

"Next, Harry took us over to the pump house where the water is pumped to irrigate his orchard. The well is one hundred and sixty-five feet deep. To pump this water there is a fifteen horse power motor and a water pump which forces the water into a large tank and from there through pipes which are under ground."

"We had hardly looked this plant over when the dinner bell rang and we went into a fine chicken dinner with everything that goes with it. Around the dinner table we all went back to Plymouth to talk over the old town and our many friends."

"After dinner Harry showed us some pictures of some hunting trips that he had taken, for he had two heads mounted, and hanging from the wall, which he had killed in the mountains in sight of his home. He also had some pictures of a bear and two cubs which he has to his credit from one of the trips up into the mountains, some pictures of some fine large mountain trout, as the fishing is good in the streams and lakes."

"This ranch is in the San Joaquin Valley. The land is very level and rich. There are forty-five miles from Calaveras Big trees which are midway between Yosemite Valley and Lake Tahoe."

"After listening to a few pieces on the radio we had to start for home. When we were in the yard talking Harry's partner pointed out to us two flocks of wild geese that happened to be flying over us. There must have been a hundred and fifty in the two flocks which were flying close together."

"We said good-bye and started on our way for Sacramento, forty-five miles distant. Having had such a good visit and dinner I can not help but write to tell you of a boy that formerly came from Plymouth, Ohio."

"Harry does not know of this letter so he will have to excuse any errors which I might have quoted about his ranch."

"I am glad to write to you of the marked success of my old friend Harry Murphy."

Traffic & Motor Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 10. To Regulate Traffic of Motor Cars and Other Vehicles

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Hygon and Richland Counties, Ohio,

SECTION 1.—DEFINITIONS

The term vehicle shall apply to and include any automobile, truck, motorcycle, bicycle, wagon or other vehicle however propelled.

The term driver shall apply to any person who operates or is in charge of any automobile, truck, motorcycle, or any person who rides, drives, or has charge of any horse drawn vehicle.

The term intersecting street shall apply to any street which joins another at any angle whether or not it crosses such street.

SECTION 2.—Speed Limit of Motor Vehicles

Whoever operates a motor vehicle or motorcycle on the streets, alleys or public highways of this Village at a greater speed than is reasonable or proper, having due regard for the width, traffic rules and conditions of such street or alley or other public way or so as to endanger, life, limb or property of any person shall be fined not more than one dollar and for a second or subsequent offense shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars or more than \$500.

A rate of speed greater than fifteen miles per hour in the closely built up sections or twenty-five miles per hour in the residence section of the Village shall be presumptive evidence of a rate of speed greater than is reasonable or proper.

SECTION 3.—Closely Built Up Portions Defined

The following described districts shall be the closely built up sections of the village referred to in the foregoing section.

On Plymouth Street from High Street to the Public Square, East Street from Albany Street to the Public Square, On Sandusky Street from North Street to the Public Square; On West Broadway Street from Bell Street to the Public Square, All of the Public Square.

SECTION 4.—Driving Motor Vehicle While Intoxicated Prohibited

Whoever operates a motor vehicle or motorcycle on the streets, alleys or public ways of the Village while in a state of intoxication, upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, and the second and subsequent shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00.

SECTION 5.—Age of Driver

No person under the age of 16 years shall drive a motor vehicle or

motorcycle upon any street, alley or public thoroughfare in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, unless he is the parent, guardian, custodian or person in charge of and responsible for such minor, allows such minor under 16 years of age to operate any motor vehicle or motorcycle upon the streets, alleys or public thoroughfare of the Village of Plymouth shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than \$500.

SECTION 6.—Riding on Sidewalks Prohibited

It shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, adult or child to ride on any bicycle, motorcycle, on any sidewalk within the limit of the Village of Plymouth.

SECTION 7.—Motor Vehicle to be Provided With Brakes and Signal

Every motor vehicle operated and driven upon the public streets or highways in the Village shall be provided with brakes sufficient to control the vehicle at all times and suitable bell, horn or other device for signaling, and during the operation of such motor vehicle shall give warning by sounding such bell or horn at the approach of every street crossing.

SECTION 8.—Lights Required

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any automobile, motorcycle or motor vehicle within the limits of the Village without having such motor vehicle properly equipped with head lights and rear lights as are required by the laws of the State of Ohio. Such motor vehicle shall also be properly equipped with a dimming device as required by the Laws of the State of Ohio.

SECTION 9.—Red Lights at Rear when Parking

No person shall leave a vehicle standing upon any street or thoroughfare in the Village of Plymouth during the period from thirty minutes after sunset to thirty minutes before sunrise, leaving a red light burning, shall be visible from the rear of said vehicle for a distance of two hundred feet.

SECTION 10.—Red Flag Required on Projections

Any person operating or driving a vehicle loaded with material which projects from the rear end of said vehicle three feet or more shall during daylight hours display at the rear end of said projection, a red flag not less than ten or twelve inches in size and during the period of darkness shall display a red light at the rear end of said projection.

SECTION 11.—Muffler Required

No person shall operate or drive a motor vehicle or motorcycle upon any street or thoroughfare in the Village of Plymouth unless such motor vehicle is properly equipped with an adequate muffler nor shall such motor vehicle or motorcycle be operated in the Village of Plymouth with such muffler, cutout, or disconnected.

SECTION 12.—Parking Regulations

(a) All automobiles shall be parked on all streets except as hereinafter stated, parallel to the curb and within six inches of said curb and each automobile shall be parked within three feet of the car in front, or three feet from the car behind.

(b) On the Public Square all motor vehicles shall park at right angles to the curb and with the front wheels of said cars against the curb.

(c) No automobile, motor vehicle, motorcycle, wagon, or other vehicle shall be parked within ten feet or other side of a fire hydrant or within twenty feet from the intersection of any street.

(d) No person shall leave a vehicle standing within ten feet of either side of the main entrance of any theater or public building during any meeting or public gathering therein except when taking on or discharging passengers or freight and then not to exceed five minutes.

(e) No vehicle shall be parked within twenty feet of either side of a street station.

SECTION 13.—Traffic Rules

(a) A vehicle shall keep to the right side of the center of the street except when necessary to turn to the left in crossing the street or in making another vehicle and except when the right side of said street is in such condition as to be impassable to the driver or person in charge of a horse-drawn vehicle backed to the curb of a street or thoroughfare.

(b) The driver or person in charge of such vehicle, and in the direction in which traffic upon that side of the street is moving.

(c) The driver of a vehicle before backing such vehicle or turning out from the curb into traffic shall give a visible or audible and timely warning and in so doing must exercise care not to injure any person or property.

SECTION 14.—Penalty for Violations

In case of violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance otherwise specifically provided for, the fine for the first offense shall not exceed \$25.00, and for the second offense not less than \$50.00 or more than one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution.

SECTION 15.—Enforcement

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

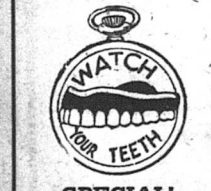

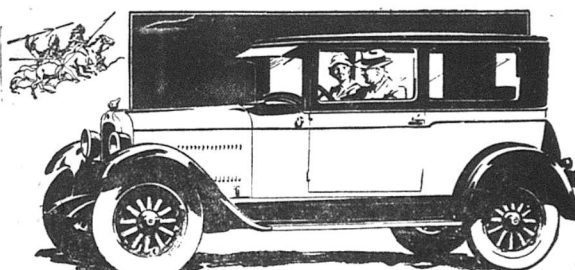

Many old time residents of Plymouth and vicinity will recall John W. Bell, who resided here some twenty years ago, and who suddenly left town without making known his destination.

Mr. Bell's residence was not known until a few years ago, when word reached that he had located in Portland, Oregon. He recently died in that city and left two wills, the validity of which was contested in courts there.

The following is a clipping from the Oregon Daily Journal, and will be read with much interest, as Mr. Bell presided as a district judge for some time.

Whether District Judge John W. Bell was mentally competent on December 13, 1923, when he made a will bequeathing the bulk of his \$29,600 estate to Ruth V. Murphy, is the issue in the contest over the estate being waged before Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles, according to the opening statements by the attorneys and the witnesses placed on the stand.

The contest is over the validity of two wills, one dated July 8, 1922, in which Judge Bell left \$5,000 to the Waverly Baby home, \$5,000 for the superannuated preachers' fund of the Methodist Episcopal church, and the bulk of his estate to Mrs. Emma V. Gillespie, and the other dated December 13, 1923, in which he left the bulk of the estate to Miss Murphy, a small donation to Mrs. Gillespie, and her husband, S. S. Gillespie, and \$100 to the First Methodist church, eliminating the other beneficiaries.

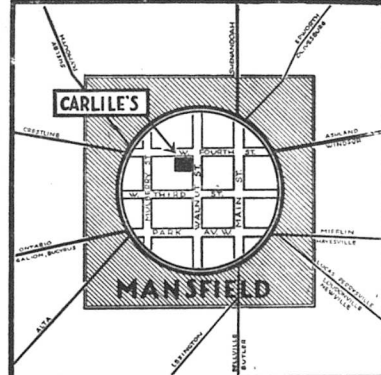
