R. H. BITTINGER DIED MONDAY

Roland Harvey Bittinger, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Bittinger, died at the home of his parents north of town Monday noon after an illness of several months. Mr. Bittinger was in the prime of life and his death brought much sorrow to his many friends in the community.

Rollie went to Sunday School at the Lutheran Church at Plymouth, under the pastorate of Rev. Helbert, joined the church on October 29th, 1907, and has always remained a member.

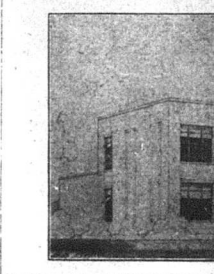

TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES MAKE ROAD TOUR

Township trustees from thirteen Lorain County Townships, stopped over in Plymouth for a few minutes Tuesday afternoon on their tour over Ashtabula county travelled and surface treated roads to find out how that process of road building works and how this type of road stands up to the test of construction.

It is generally taken three years to build a road of the gravelled type at a total cost of \$8,000 per mile compared to \$12,000 per mile for other types of construction.

Lorain county commissioners, George Rhoads, Chas. Murray and George Richmond, led the procession of ten cars and forty officials and at Ashtabula they were met by representatives from the Federal Highway Department and were addressed by one of the representatives.

ROAD LEVY UP IN HURON CO.

The County Commissioners of Huron County are submitting a vote of the people at this election a proposal for a one and one-half mill levy for a period of five years for the further improvement of county and township roads.

This is work in which the entire citizens of this county are interested and this levy should be approved of and carried by a large majority. It is of the greatest importance to the people of Norwalk as well as to the people of the townships where the actual work will be done and the money spent.

Huron County has on its county system of roads a total of 165 miles, 45 miles of which is as yet unimproved, and it is important that the rest of this work should be done and the farmers of Huron County given roads they can ride over in comfort and through. If this levy carries, considerable mileage of new roads could be built each year, but if the levy should fail, nearly all of the money available for road purposes would be used for maintenance and little or no further mileage could be built each year.

Huron County cannot afford to slip behind other counties of the State in road improvement work.

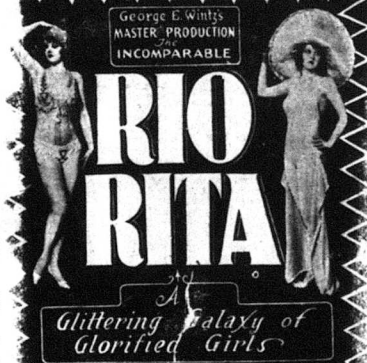

GORGEOUS PLANS PRECEDE "WINGS"

Twenty Months of Work Given to Perfecting Wartime Epic of Air

Only after a period of combined preparation and actual production lasting over a period of nearly twenty months, "Wings," Paramount's epic of the air, was ready.

"Wings" was the "pet" of the Paramount studio; it was recognized as the great achievement, that would carry to fame, not only the names of Wellman and Hubbard, but also the featured players, Charles Rogers and Richard Arlen, who were associated with Clara Bow and Jodya Hailston in the principal roles.

It is a story of the air service, "done" for the first time on the screen. It was written by John Monk Saunders, himself an instructor of aviation during the war. 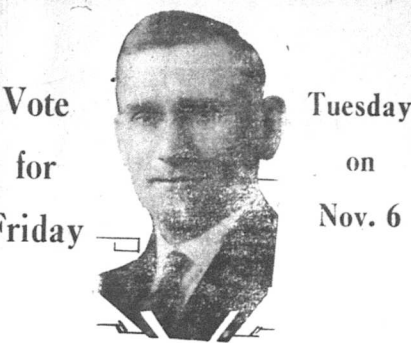
Mr. Ford has suggested that we select a school song which can be used for all school purposes so sometime in the near future the selection will be made.

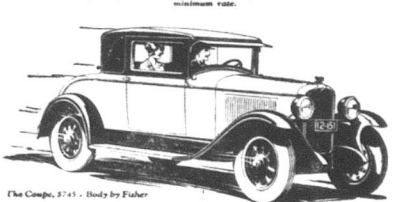

SECOND EXAM FOR FEDERAL AGENTS

Washington, D. C. — The United States Civil Service Commission today announced the second examination for agents under the Bureau of Prohibition.

The examination held last year failed to furnish a sufficient number of eligibles for many of the prohibition districts. The new examination will be held throughout the country to supply the shortage of eligibles and to provide a register from which vacancies occurring later may be filled. Applications for the examination will be received by the Civil Service Commission until November 20.

The entrance salaries for agents range from \$2,500 to \$2,800 a year. As the Bureau of Prohibition states that it will be its policy to fill the positions of investigator and inspector by promotion, persons desiring appointment to those positions should enter the agent examination.

The examination will consist of mental tests; practical reports based on the duties of the position, and a training, experience, and fitness. Those who do not meet the minimum experience requirement will not be admitted to the written test. Those who qualify in the written part of the examination will be called for a personal interview and will be subject to a further investigation of their fitness. The fingerprints of all applicants who are investigated will be taken and will be used to check the accuracy of the applicants' statements as to arrest, indictment, or conviction for crime or misdemeanor.

Full information may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board at the post office or customhouse in any city.

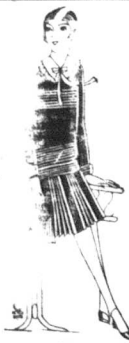
