Many friends in Auburn twp. will regret to learn of the death of E. H. Baker, well known Civil War veteran. The following account is taken from The New Washington Herald:

"Ephraim H. Baker, a well known resident and one of the Civil War veterans of this community, passed peacefully to his eternal rest at 2:15 Wednesday morning after having been invalid for several years. He was born in Auburn township, Jan. 22, and lived practically all his life in Auburn township until his death. He was 82 years of age when he took up his abode with his daughter Mrs. W. H. Robinson of New Washington.

Baker was one of the best of his kind. He was a member of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, Local No. 100, and was a member of the Grand Lodge of the B. O. E. F. of the same name.

And Mr. Smith is not the only one suffering from the lack of water. Several cities of town are reported low and some are dry and many families are conserving every drop of water possible.

The Cleveland Railroad is being forced to haul water to Cleveland and other points are experiencing the same difficulty. The weather man has given no promise of rain and unless relief from the drouth comes shortly considerable damage will result.

It is predicted that many farmers that think will be better this winter on account of feed shortage. The pastureland has been very poor and far this fall and next spring the farmers' crops have been affected.

JOHN T. CURPEN DIES SUDDENLY

Many Plymouth friends were shocked last Friday to hear of the sudden death of John T. Curpen which occurred at 2 o'clock Friday morning at Monnett Hospital in Bucyrus. Death being due to a stroke.

Mr. Curpen, while attending the Crawford county fair Thursday evening was stricken about 5:30. He was rushed to the hospital where death came in the early morning hours. He seemed to have been in the best of health and was talking to Mrs. Voyard a few minutes before he was stricken. Relatives here were summoned to Bucyrus and they arrived there at 1:30, just a half hour before death. He was unconscious and recognized no one at the last.

John T. Curpen was born in Upper Sandusky July 1, 1858 and at the age of five moved here with his parents where he grew to manhood. While in Plymouth he was identified with the grocery business being connected with Frank Lofland and they operated for years under the name of Curpen and Lofland. Later they dissolved their partnership and Mr. Curpen continued in the line.

For the past ten years Mr. Curpen had made his home in Bucyrus where he was a member of warm friends through his kind and likeable disposition and his friendship was highly cherished by those who knew him.

John Curpen was the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Curpen, who preceded him in death, also two infant brothers and Frank P. Curpen, an older brother. The deceased is survived by two sisters, Mrs. C. K. Watson of Plymouth and Mrs. J. C. Watson of Delta, and three brothers, John R. Curpen, A. Curpen of Plymouth, and H. R. Curpen of Savannah, Ill.

The remains were removed to the Miller Chapel and funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the home of the sister Mrs. C. K. Watson. Burial was made in the Miller Chapel cemetery at 2 o'clock.

The passing of John Curpen takes away another of Plymouth's well known and beloved former citizens and his many friends and well wishers cherish his memory.

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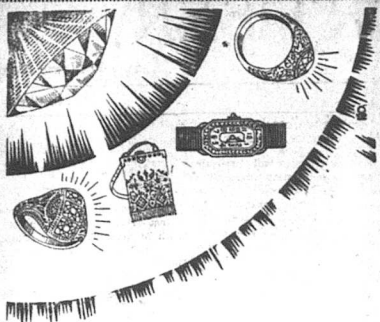

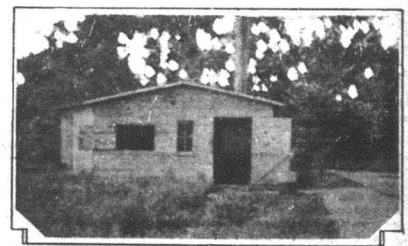

REPORTER TAKES RIDE ON A.C. & Y.

Jake Falstaff of the Akron Beacon Journal recently made a trip on one of the A. C. & Y. locals, and Jake tells interestingly of his trip. In a special article to the Akron newspaper which we reproduce. Many Plymouth people will recognize the names of the train crew, and it proved to be an interesting day for the crew as well as the newspaper writer. The story is as follows:

"ENROUTE ON LOCAL FREIGHT"
A. C. & Y.—Under a sea, blue sky flecked with archipelagoes of cotton button clouds, on as fine a day as ever September gave the world, we are making our intermittent way across the north part of Ohio. We are bound from Akron to New London. But we're not in any hurry.

"Travel between points on the map is a minor part of this expedition. The primary business is what we do

which we get there. A local freight, along with its own switching, does switching for the upper class trains. They pause at each station only long enough to drop off a car or two.

"The local comes along some time later and puts the cars on the right sidings. The train which carries me as a caboose passenger has for its conductor Frank Crow of New London. He has been railroading for thirty-five years and has been with the A. C. & Y. since 1916.

"He has the calm assurance of a man accustomed to authority and responsibility, and has the friendliness that is the chief characteristic of all railroad men I have met. He's the sort of man you'd go to for kindhearted and sensible advice. John Hill of Akron is the engineer, and W. A. Burdette, of Akron is fireman.

"The rear end brakeman is C. V. Sourwine, whom one calls "Snooks," and who whistles merrily no matter what he is doing. He cooked our breakfast this morning, and it was a better breakfast than I've ever eaten on a through train diner.

"Afterward, he washed dishes and C. Manning Crow dried them. J. P.

Kelly, a special brakeman, is in duty at the front end, in the absence of L. C. Green of Akron, who is the usual fifth member of the crew. We started from the Britain yards on Tuesday morning at about 7.

"We made stops at Fairlawn, Bell Junction, Conley, Sharon Center, Betsa, Medina, Litchfield, Spencer, Huntington, Bakers, Semple, Hiles and New London. Our most extended stop was at Medina. We pulled in at a little after 11:30 and it was past 12 before we left.

"This gave me ample time for a stroll around the public square and for a visit to the goldfish in the town fountain. The caboose in which I am writing this has as friendly an atmosphere as I have ever found. It has a washstand, a desk for the conductor, a coal stove, a Kerosene stove, a refrigerator, a cupboard, several lockers and a coal box.

"Above the lockers are the seats of the cock loft. It is a royal feeling to sit up there in the cupola which surmounts the caboose, looking out ahead over the swaying, shifting line of box car tops. The caboose rides as comfortably as the average day coach, and is about one hundred times as

pleasant a place to be.
"There is plenty of room to walk around. I am being treated with real warm hospitality. Engineer Hills has been making gentle stops and starts for my benefit. "Snooks" and Conductor Crow shared their food with me. Special Brakeman Kelly offered me his dessert. They explain things patiently to me, and suggest things of entertainment when the delays are long."

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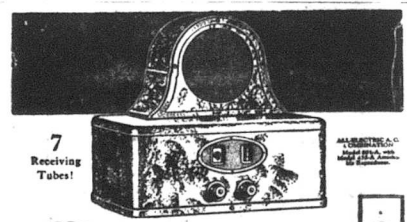

MRS. ANA DOUGLAS DEAD

After several months illness Mrs. Anna Beelman Douglas died Sunday morning about 1 o'clock. She was the daughter of Christian and Sarah Beelman and was one of six children, there being three boys and three girls, and now only one off the family left, Charles Beelman of Mansfield.

Mrs. Douglas was the widow of William Douglas, a civil war veteran, who with one son James Douglas preceded her several years. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. Rita Brumback of this place and Mrs. Ethel Douglas Shambaugh of Mansfield. She also leaves five grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. Mrs. Douglas was a member of the M. E. church from early womanhood and the impressive funeral service was conducted by her pastor Rev. McBroome Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Rita Brumback. She was also one of the oldest members of the Ladies Aid and was active as long as her health permitted.

She had reached the age of eighty years, having spent all of her life in this town and community, and

occupied a unique position as one of its citizens. Previous to the time when nurses could be secured in the homes and hospitals were few, and during the prime of her life she was called to the birth of many, and has recorded the first care given to seventy-six children, and in the majority of these homes she ministered until the mother was able to care for her child.

Kind and obliging by nature she leaves many friends who sympathize with the daughters in the sorrow that parting always brings.
