Department of Education. Since my visit, I have talked over the
building situation with the head of the bivision of Buildings and with
our board of high school supervisors.
Your building is not at all adequate for a modern high school
program. It is quite old, overcrowded, and has a worn-out portable
on the grounds, now housing very poorly the, children of grades one
and, two at some risk to their health Grades seven and eight are
crowded into a room not sulted to more than half its present pupil
load. The room used for high school science is too small for satisfactory science work. The home economics rooms are in the basement
not originally intended for classroom purposes at all. The sewing
room cannot be properly heated. The girst are forced to huddle
around a gas heater with their feet on the rungs of chairs to keep
them off the cold concrete floor, if fact, the building is no longer
suited for high school purposes at all. It is doubtful whether is in
vise to try any longer to use it for school purposes.
In view of these unsatiafactory school facilities, the Board of
High School Supervisors has voted to continue your charter only itil
November, 1928. If, at that time, provision is not made assuring the
removal of pupils of grades 1-712 inclusive into more adequate quarters,
the charter will be automatically lost.

While the Department of Education urges the economy, in the
long run, of abandoning the old building for school purposes and of
crecting a new school plant for all pupils at some distance from the
railroad) yet we are willing if it seems necessary, that the old building
