CASS TWP. ASKED TO RENEW LEVY

When the people of Cass Township voted \$50,000 in bonds to build an addition to the school, it became necessary at the same time to each year take care of the interest on the bonds at five and one-half per cent. plus \$2,000 in bonds retired for a twenty-three year period.

The voters of Cass Township then voted an extra levy of two and one-half mills for school purposes for a five year period. This tax money which amounted to about \$500 took care of the \$2,000 in bonds retired each year and the interest on the remaining bonds.

The five year period granted by the voters expires this year and therefore it will be necessary to ask the voters to again grant the Board of Education the right to levy enough for a five year period to take care of the bonds and interest coming due.

Inasmuch as the interest is less each year, the Board of Education is asking for only a one and one-quarter mill levy instead of a two and one-half mill levy as previously voted. It has been the policy of the Board of Education to lower the taxes just as much as and as fast as possible.

Therefore if the voters of Cass Township vote in favor of a two and one-half mill levy the taxes will be somewhat lower than they have been for the past five years. This is not a new levy but merely a renewal of the old levy with a one-quarter mill reduction.

If the voters fail to pass the two and one-quarter mill renewal levy it will mean that the \$2,000 of bonds falling due each year will have to be paid from the money now used for school purposes. The bonds and interest will be paid each year as they fall due.

This amount subtracted from our tax funds used for the operating of our schools would surely cripple the progress of the schools. It would mean eight months of school instead of nine as we now have. It would mean a reduction in the teaching force which in turn would mean a very limited course of study.

At the schools are now organized on the six-year plan, they are recognized as schools of first grade and are chartered by the State Department of Education. A refusal to grant a renewal of this levy will mean the loss of this charter and securing a second grade charter in its place.

It was not until the voters retained their present status vote YES on the renewal levy. REMEMBER IT DOES NOT MEAN AN INCREASE IN TAXES BUT RATHER A DECREASE OF ONE-QUARTER MILL.

A PROBLEM IN ADDITION

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State of Ohio Department of Education Columbus

Dear Mr. Nimmons:

On Feb. 2nd, 1923, I visited the Plymouth School for the State Department of Education. Since my visit, I have talked over the building situation with the head of the Division of Buildings and with our board of high school supervisors.

Your building is not at all adequate for a modern high school program. It is quite old, overcrowded, and has a worn-out portable on the grounds, now housing very poorly the children of grades one and two at some risk to their health. Grades seven and eight are crowded into a room not suited to more than half its present pupil load. The room used for high school science is too small for satisfactory science work. The home economics room is not originally intended for classroom purposes at all. The sewing room cannot be properly heated. The girls are forced to huddle around a gas heater with their feet on the rungs of chairs to keep them off the cold concrete floor. In fact, the building is no longer suited for high school purposes at all. It is doubtful whether it is wise to try any longer to use the building for its present purpose.

In view of these unsatisfactory school facilities, the Board of High School Supervisors will vote to continue your charter only till November, 1923. If, at that time, provision is not made assuring the removal of pupils of grades 7-12 inclusive into more adequate quarters, the charter will be automatically lost.

While the Department of Education urges the economy, in the long run, of abandoning the old school for school purposes and of erecting a new school plant for all pupils, the Board of Education (railroad) yet we are willing if it seems necessary, that the old building be used for elementary purposes for a few more years. However, the Division of Buildings feel that if it is to be used even for elementary school purposes, rather extensive remodeling and repairs will be required. They urgently recommend scrapping the building as being more economical considering its limited usefulness even if much money is spent in making the necessary alterations and repairs in it.

New physical and historical maps, physics and general science equipment; additional library books; and elementary supplementary readers should be purchased before school opens next fall.

In order that all members may know the financial condition of the district, a financial statement showing the balance reported at the last meeting, income and output since the last meeting, and present balance, should be made available at each regular meeting of the board. It would be desirable to have a copy of this monthly report in the hands of each member.

It is hoped that the people of Plymouth will by their vote next November, make provision for properly housing the pupils of their school district.

Since this report from the State Department of Education was received every one of these requirements has been met except the first and most important: the one that the Board of Education and superintendent are powerless to remedy without the permission of the voters of Plymouth. The old building has been cleaned and repaired, supplies and equipment have been bought, the physical conditions most criticized, the pupils in some of the rooms have been shifted to the north rooms to face a condition of overcrowding. We still have to use two rooms in the portables which have long since ceased to be fit for school purposes. We still have to use three rooms in the cellar of the main building, which was not built nor ever intended for school purposes.

Although we have remedied the extreme overcrowding in the seventh and eighth grade rooms, which the above report criticizes, we have accomplished it by overcrowding two of the remaining grade rooms. It is true, we have helped the situation somewhat by erecting temporary partitions half way from the floor to the ceiling, yet these pupils are greatly handicapped, both by the overcrowding, and by the extra confusion which must result from such makeshifts.

The School Board and the superintendent have done all in their power to remedy conditions, now. Voters of Plymouth, "It's up to you." All the resolutions we have passed, all the legal forms have been observed, with the most exactness, all we need is your approval in the November election. The Board have engaged the services of a competent architect, Mr. Granville Scott of Norwalk whose ability and integrity are unquestioned throughout the State of Ohio, where he has built dozens of School buildings.

For several months, Mr. Scott has been working with the Board and superintendent in an endeavor to plan a building which will meet the needs of our community and satisfy the requirements of the State authorities, and yet impose as light a financial burden as possible. Since the State Department has granted permission to use the old building for grade purposes, it was decided that we would ask for a bond issue to build a building for grades seven to twelve only. The very least amount required to build an adequate building for these grades, including a standard combination auditorium and gymnasium is \$75,000. So that is the amount of the bond issue which will be asked to approve on Nov. 6th.

CAN BUILD BUT FOUR MILES IN HURON COUNTY IF LEVY FAILS

Twenty miles can be built if the levy carries in Huron county, and only four miles if it fails, is the terse way the situation is described by County Surveyor Clifford T. Williams, who says: "There are 120 miles of improved roads on Huron county's present highway system. We have completed 14 miles of Bituminous Macadam, 2.0 miles of Waterbound Macadam, 1.6 miles of resurfacing with Waterbound Macadam and 22 miles of surface treatments. We have proposed improvements of 2.5 miles of resurfacing with Waterbound Macadam and 7.4 miles of Waterbound Macadam of Concrete alternate on our present year's program.

"We will be able to build about 20 miles of improved roads and our Surface Treatment program if the levy should carry and about four miles and Surface Treatment program if it should not carry.

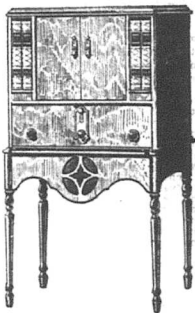

THE PARSON'S COLUMN

Jesus came into the world at a time, when the people of his own nation were doing a great deal of mixed thinking concerning the governmental condition under which they were living. To the mind of a devout Jew it was a matter of deep concern that the chosen people of God should be living in subservience to a pagan Emperor. It was a very material thing that when the "Prophet" from Nazareth had attracted to himself and his teaching a no inconsiderable following that this fact of national character should be presented to him for an expression of his opinion thereon. As Matthew tells the story one pronounced the question thus: "Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar or not?" Jesus replied: "Shew me the

tribut money." This having been done he asked: "Whose is the image and superscription?" They answer, "Caesars." Then he said: "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesars and unto God the things that are Gods."

The Jews were in the political situation in which they found themselves because they neglected to cultivate those principles of life, which had made their forefathers, especially Abraham, the chosen of God. Namely, humility of heart and contriteness of spirit. The Master knew that it was pride and not reverence for the law that prompted the question they had propounded to him; hence his answer. To continue to pay tribute humbled that pride and the ironical hope of political salvation was a return to God with that acceptable sacrifice of "A contrite heart and a humble spirit."

On Tuesday of next week the citizens of these United States of America are called upon to render unto the Government the tribute of their franchise. Let there not be a single member of the church of Jesus Christ, who does not render this act of homage to his government, but as he renders it may he do so at the dictates of the best that is in him, humbly seeking to know the righteous will of God in his vote.

Some years ago when the prohibition movement was in its infancy I heard of a certain man going to prayer meeting on election night and praying, "God prosper the cause of prohibition in this day's election." It developed later that this particular man had been too busy to go to the polls that day. I think I can hear the man of Galilee say to that praying man: "This ought ye to do but ye ought not to have left the other undone."

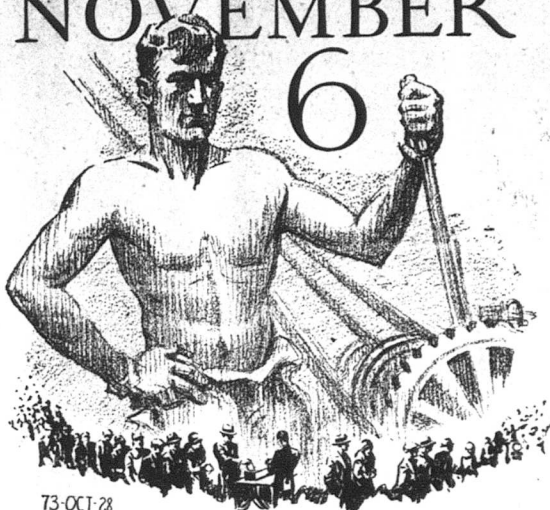
