GOOD PROFIT ON EGGS IS SHOWN

Those who are skeptical as to the profits received from chickens will read this story with interest for it tells just what can be done after proper care and attention is given to flocks.

Geo. W. Page, Shiloh poultry and hatcheryman gives the following statistics concerning twelve leghorn pullets:

"Twelve Leghorn pullets from trapped hens laid 569 eggs from December 9th to February 20th. They consumed \$6.08 worth of mash and grain. The eggs received from the flocks for \$29.25 leaving a net profit of \$14.20 in the short period of seventy-four days, and this period was during the winter months."

Mr. Page states that the above figures show that proper feed suggested by the big poultry raisers can be had at a reasonable cost to the small individual poultry raiser. The improper feeding of chicks at the start is very harmful to the egg production of the flock later on.

Eggs this year brought a higher price than last and many are wondering just what the price will be this fall and winter. It is predicted that prices will be higher the latter months of this year owing to thousands of hens going to market on account of short corn crop and poor wheat outlook. These are the two main reasons for this prediction, and the poultryman who looks ahead will get good quality chicks this spring and make money from eggs by feeding a good balanced ration.

LUTHERANS PASS CAMPAIGN MARK

The campaign of the United Lutheran church to raise \$400,000 has reached that mark, but the work will continue until April 1, Rev. Dr. Paul W. Koller has announced.

The church officials are trying to raise enough money that \$400,000 can be invested in securities. The income will be used to assist disabled Lutheran ministers and their wives.

Dr. Koller has charge of the work in this state. The Lutheran church in this state was asked to pledge \$333,333. That amount has been surpassed. An effort is being made in each state to get enough in pledges to allow for shrinkage and leave at least \$400,000.

Neck Broken as Car Overturns Near Sandusky

While Miss Dorcas Haun and Orville Haun of this place and Gordon Schwab and Miss Josephine Snyder of Shelby were motoring to Sandusky Sunday to the home of a relative and on about two miles out of the city, on account of a flat tire, the car slid off the road into soft ground causing it to turn over and the ditch plunging the occupants under. Orville Haun sustained a broken neck, resulting in almost instant death. The other three occupants released by passing motorists were rushed to the hospital in Sandusky for first aid. Miss Snyder is suffering a broken arm and the other two severe bruises. Miss Dorcas Haun and Orville Haun are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Haun, and the sorrow in this home is shared by the community, as Orville was a favorite boy and will be greatly missed.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon from the home of Rev. E. E. McElroy officiating and the body laid to rest in Mt. Hope cemetery.

Last Rites Held For Ed Howell

Accumbed Saturday to 3- Day Illness.

After a brief illness with pneumonia lasting only three days Edwin Howell, well-known Plymouth resident, died at his home Saturday night at 11 o'clock. News of Mr. Howell's death cast a gloom over Plymouth for those who knew him. The deceased was 55 years old, and had been making Plymouth his home for over 20 years. He was one of the oldest employees in the moulding department of the Fate-Root-Heath Co.

Private services were held Tuesday afternoon at the home with Rev. E. B. McElroy officiating. Chas. Miller had charge of funeral arrangements.

Edwin Howell was born August 21st, 1872 in Hackettstown, N. J. He departed from this life at his late home on Mill Street, this city on Saturday, March 24th, 1928, after a three days illness which suddenly developed into double pneumonia.

On October 6th, 1897 he was united in marriage with Miss Lucietta Lawrence. To this union one son, Ed, was born, who preceded his father thirteen years ago to the "Great Eternal Tomorrow."

For a number of years Mr. Howell was employed as a railroad and his duties as such brought the little family to Plymouth twenty years ago. Eighteen years ago he left the employ of the railroad then known as the Northern Ohio and entered the employ of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. in whose employ he was at the time of his death.

On June 11th, 1916 he was baptized by Rev. Mott and taken into the fellowship of the Methodist Episcopal church where he was a regular attendant and interested supporter.

These gymnasiums are not provided just for these few individuals but for the whole school as well as anyone else who wants to use them. The public also enjoys seeing games played on a good floor or a good field.

The development of the physical side of the body is nearly as important as the development of the mental side. In providing good gyms and good athletic fields the people provide a means of developing this physical side of the young men and women who will some day be the voters and business

people of this world.

Good athletic equipment also serves as an incentive for many boys to stay in school just to take part in the athletics and at the same time they have to study to keep their grades up or they become ineligible for the games.
