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INSANITY AND MURDER
No one who remembers the Remus case—who doesn't?—will doubt the efficacy of permitting a jury of twelve laymen to determine the mental responsibility of one accused of a capital offense. In this case, as in many others that have besmirched recent criminal history, the plea of insanity served merely as a hook on

which to hang an emotional denial of justice.
The Remus case is one of the reasons why the National Crime Commission is launching an assault upon the prevailing method of dealing with insanity pleas in criminal courts. It urges all states to adopt reforms already in force in Massachusetts and Colorado.

In Massachusetts the law makes mandatory a mental examination, before trial, of all persons accused of a capital offense or indicted for a felony more than once. State experts, over whom neither the prosecution nor the defense has any control, make the examination and the results are admissible as evidence in the trial. It has stopped the discreditable practice of mental experts saying on the witness stand what they were paid to say and has saved the state costly trials in a number of cases. The Colorado statute is basically the same.

Justice should be defeated by neither the prosecution nor the defense. Where a human life is at stake public opinion considers it several degrees more reprehensible for public prosecutors to buy perjured expert testimony than for the defense to manufacture a case. Certainly there is no greater crime than the payment of large fees for expert testimony to prove an insane man sane that he may not escape the chair of noose. But that very thing has been done by prosecuting attorneys striving for a record.

HAVE FAITH IN TOWN

More towns die for want of confidence on the part of the business men and lack of public spirit than from the rivalry of neighboring towns or adverse surroundings. HISTORIC WOODS OPENED

THE WOODS OF CAYATE SITES
The wooded section of BAY VIEW Point, formerly Martin's Point, on Sandusky Bay has been platted out in cottage sites and will start for sale beginning Sunday, July 1st.

This section of primeval forest has been the scene of many Indian camps centuries ago and was favorite tribal camping ground during the fishing season. Sandusky Bay has always been a spawning ground for the lake fish and in those days as now offered a reliable source of sport and food. The game-filled peninsula, now changed into high grade cottage sites, was the joy of the young Indian boys, and a favorite place to stalk and ambush beast and fowl.

In 1813 a great English fleet sailed by Bay View Point on their way to a crushing defeat at Fort St. Vrain (now Fremont) by a 21 year old lad named Croghan, and a handful of men. Bay View saw the "Pegsaw," one of the earliest power boats, cringing by under full speed of its 4 horse treadmill.

There has been much activity at Bay View since the beginning of the two million dollar highway bridge across Sandusky Bay which will hook up the Buffalo-Detroit, A-S-C-E-I-Highway. The bridge starts at Bay View Point stretching across to Danbury. A battery of barges and huge construction machines are now in the bay working on the bridge. It will be completed and opened this fall.

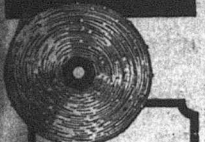

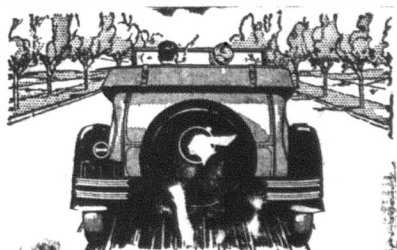
