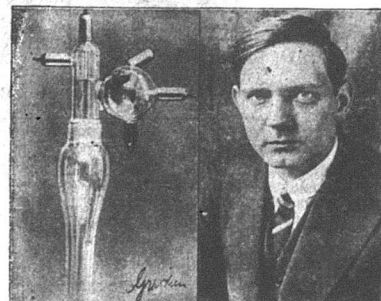

BEGG STAMPEDES G.O.P. CONVENTION WITH HIS SPEECH; REFORMS URGED

Congressman Says No Ohio Farmer Can Pay \$4 Per Acre Tax and Stay Out of Bankruptcy; Win Applause From Entire Convention.

In his address before the state Republican convention, Congressman Begg, T. Begg gave some very emphatic views which brought him applause after applause, finally breaking up the session. Congressman Begg is from the Thirteenth district and he is receiving strong support for the governorship. The speech in full is as follows:

We have again assembled to select presidential electors and to renew our faith in the basic principles of the Republican party, the history of which is replete with the names of famous statesmen who have contributed in no small measure to the making of American history. It will not be my purpose to enumerate the names of these men beyond our own times.

It is fitting that we start with William McKinley, whose memory occupies a sacred place in the heart of every American. He was followed by that dynamic character, Theodore Roosevelt, whom everybody adored. There is another great statesman from Ohio, still living, who occupied the Presidential chair and who now holds a position that also carries great honor. I refer to Chief Justice William Howard Taft.

In chronological order we come next to another Ohioan, President Warren G. Harding, the most loved man who ever occupied the White House and who has left a lasting impression on the hearts of all Americans. The Fourth was generally observed here with lawn parties and motor parties for the summer resorts. The tax was a quiet one in Plymouth with the exception of the morning and evening traffic in the early morning hours the hum of the auto motor could be heard and the heavy stream of traffic lake-bound continued until almost noon.

The weather was ideal for the hot day and hundreds of people took advantage of the opportunity to come on an all-day outing or entertaining friends in the homes.

2 Killed By Auto

Mrs. William Broadhead, 68, and her little three year old granddaughter Anna Eleanor died in the Shelby hospital early Thursday morning from injuries received when struck by an automobile at Vernon Junction at noon Wednesday. The little child died at two o'clock this morning and the grandmother at 4. Both suffered from fractured skulls and internal injuries.

Mr. and Mrs. Broadhead and family went over to Vernon Junction Wednesday morning to visit their daughter, Mrs. Alice Sweet, and to attend the exhumation of the body of their son, who was killed in the same accident. It was while returning from the home about noon when the tragic accident occurred. Mrs. Broadhead and her little granddaughter had crossed the railroad tracks and were some distance from the road when they were struck by an automobile driven by a man whose name is given as Hartman and going toward Shelby lunched over the crossing and struck down the two victims. Mrs. Broadhead, who saw the accident states that the driver exhumed the body of her son from the machine. It was also stated that Hartman was traveling at a high speed while passing through Vernon and that he was halted by officials but did not stop. Hartman was placed under arrest as a result of the accident.

While returning to Shelby about noon 2:45 Wednesday afternoon the Pontiac roadster driven by Mrs. Broadhead was wrecked as the machine struck an embankment on the west side of the Marsh Run Bridge on the Plymouth-Shelby road. Broadhead suffered minor cuts and bruises on his right arm and the machine was somewhat damaged. He had been to Bellevue to bring his sister to her mother's bedside.

Mr. and Mrs. Broadhead moved to Plymouth in 1911 from Newark, O., and since their residence here she made many friends who were shocked to learn of her tragic death Wednesday. She was born in Fayette county. She is survived by three sons, J. W., Frank and Henry and three daughters, Mrs. Katherine Mellick of Bellevue, Mrs. Alice Sweet of Vernon Junction, and Mrs. Hazel Snyder of Mansfield.

The remains of Mrs. Broadhead were removed to the Miller Parlor. A double funeral for the victims will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Lutheran church. Interment will be made in Glenview.

SUMMER Health Talks

Tetanus

Sponsored by the Ohio Public Health Association

Year after year, the Glorious Fourth used to leave a trail of small, new graves across the country. Tetanus, the dreaded lock-jaw, made its appearance along the middle of July just as surely as the pistols firing blank cartridges or dynamite "capers" banged on the Fourth. With the establishment of a sander, if tamer, Independence Day, that danger has lessened.

The tetanus germ is quite common, especially in garden soil. However it can multiply only when it is deprived of oxygen. These are the reasons a barefoot youngster so often develops tetanus after he has run a nail into his foot. The nail which has been lying on the ground has become infected, and the nature of the wound shuts out air.

Every wound which excludes air ought to be opened. If a physician can be reached he should open it. If a physician cannot be secured, it should be opened anyway with a knife which has been boiled.

An infected wound should always be treated by a doctor. He will probably open it widely, clean out all loose shreds of tissue, treat with a three per cent solution of iodine or other antiseptic, and give about 1500 units of tetanus antitoxin. If the wound does not heal within a week another dose of the anti-toxin should be given.

The incubation period of tetanus is between six and fourteen days—usually nine or ten days. Through its effect upon the nerves tetanus produces a muscular spasm and the jaw muscles, among others, become fixed. If that were all, the patient could be fed through his nose, but the poison spreads, and in about half of all cases convulsions, exhaustion, and death result.

Once tetanus has developed the treatment consists in large doses of tetanus anti-toxin. Application of local antiseptics is useless. Proper treatment of infected wounds will practically always prevent tetanus. If the disease does develop the patient should be placed under a doctor's care immediately. A few hours may mean the difference between life and death.

Commission Association Reports Good Business

PRODUCERS CO-OPERATIVE ASSO.

Manager A. F. Potter, of the Producers Co-operative Commission Association, of Cleveland, Ohio, which is a farmer owned and controlled live stock selling agency reports that the business during the past week was one of the most satisfactory in several weeks past. The organization handled sixty-two decks of stock that arrived by Railroad, with a sufficient amount of animals brought in by truck to make a total of 69½ decks. This represented 30.69 of the car receipts for the week.

Hogs have shown some advance recently but the present week closed a little slow. Manager Potter says "That packers have been resisting any attempt to advance prices and that in all probability but very little if any further advances might be expected in the next few days, but later on in the season a somewhat higher schedule of prices may be expected to prevail."

The outstanding feature of the trade through the past week was the activity shown in the veal calf trade. Large numbers of strictly choice veals sold up to \$17 and \$17.50 with a few at \$15, one fancy calf commanding \$20 which was the outstanding price paid on the Cleveland market in several months.

The lamb trade has been a little slow, but shows some improvement over a week or ten days ago. The supply of cattle has been light which has favored the selling side of the trade.

STRETCHING THE LIFE OF RUBBER

Countless millions of miles of service will be added to the many millions of automobile tires used by motorists, through the use by tire makers of Neosine, a chemical preparation recently discovered by American chemists, it is asserted. In short, it is said that tires containing the substance will not deteriorate through chemical reaction while in storage or when carried as spares, but will only fail through wear or damage. Tests of rubber articles containing this chemical compound show that they retain their elasticity indefinitely. It is intended for use in all kinds of rubber products, including rubber bands, fruit jar rings, washers, garden hose, hot water bottles and moulded rubber goods.

SALAD HATERS MAY WANT BIG HELPINGS

Slimpy Servings Look Like An Insult—"Put It On The Table In Bowl," Says Specialist.

Men who turn up their noses at salad might change their ideas if a salad "hater" were man size. That is the opinion of Miss Lella Ogle, nutrition specialist in the extension service of the Ohio State University. In Miss Ogle's office, a man visitor recently denounced the average "gentle" helping of salad as nothing more nor less than an insult in quantity.

"Nothing wrong with putting on the salad in a big bowl and inviting people to have a second helping," said Miss Ogle. "The average bread and butter plate on which salad is served is too small."

"Another reason why men sometimes don't eat salad is that they are

suspicious of it, because they don't know what's in it. The way to get around that is not to mix it too much. The various ingredients may be arranged in layers, with the dressing dotted around over them. Or they may be mixed just enough to distribute the dressing over them. That way, the eater of the salad knows just what he is eating, there is no mystery about it.

"Salad-haters can be converted if the salads are mixed this way and served in generous helpings."

TOUGH STEAK MIGHT BE BREEDER'S FAULT

Selection and Feeding Methods Can Produce More Tender Cuts, Says Expert.

Tough steak is not always to be blamed on the butcher. The breeder of beef cattle can produce, by wise selection, proper feeding, and intelligent management, a beef animal every cut of which will yield a tender, juicy dish, according to E. W. Sheets, chief of the animal husbandry division of the bureau of animal industry of the United States Department of Agriculture.

"We have animals today whose chuck cuts will produce a more toothsome steak or roast than will a loin or rib cut from cattle less proud of ancestry and less favored in the feed lot," said Sheets in a recent address.

Growers have difficulty in determining the value of bulls of the beef breed, and especially in knowing what characteristics a beef sire will transmit to his offspring, Sheets said. The importance of this knowledge is indicated by the fact that the present public demand for beef is principally for a few choice cuts which represent only about 18 per cent of the entire carcass.

"The best results for the least expenditure of money in the improvement of beef cattle," said Sheets, "are obtained by the use of carefully selected, purebred bulls. The problem, moreover, is not so much that of obtaining animals superior to any which we have today as of learning to appraise accurately the most valuable among those we already have."

ically the history of the Republican administrations since the time of Abraham Lincoln.

That we shall be successful this fall nationally is almost a foregone conclusion. This success is doubly assured by reason of the fact that we will present to the electorate a party solidarity never stronger than in this year 1928. Sharp contests were waged for the coveted honor of being the standard-bearer of the party; but, vanquished, like true soldiers, have returned to the fighting line, militantly awaiting the general's command to go forward and do battle for the success of our principles.

The success of the party in national affairs, in my opinion, has been due to the fact that we have a national Republican organization functioning properly at all times. The result has been astounding.

In 1920 when the Republicans took over affairs in the nation we found the national credit depreciated to where our federal securities were selling at 85. The national debt amounted to 26 1/2 billions, staggering to the imagination of even our great financiers. Business was disrupted everywhere; labor locked employment.

By reason of the fact that we had a united party, a President and Congress of the same political faith, both determined to cooperate to the end and that the cost of government

should be so great, we found that our federal securities are commanding more than par in the money markets of the world. The national debt has been reduced at the rate of approximately a little more than a billion dollars per year, until today, instead of 26 1/2 billions, our national debt amounts to about 17 1/2 billions. In the face of this phenomenal debt reduction, our taxes have been reduced until the maximum has fallen from 75 per cent to 25 per cent and the American people are paying into the federal Treasury in taxes annually two billion less than they were paying in 1920. This was accomplished nationally by the elimination of waste, the stoppage of leaks and the institution of real business principles into governmental operation.

While we have seen this progress being made by the federal government, opposite has been true in Ohio. Instead of the Republican party having success three-fourths of the time as we have had nationally, and instead of presenting a solid organization supporting the ticket from top to bottom, we have been confronted with disintegration, with the result that we have had two one-term governors in twenty-four years. We cannot escape the fact that during the last six years with the Democratic Governor and a Republican legislature, the cost of state government has mounted annually until state taxes have increased approximately 75 per cent in recent years. In addition the political debt of Ohio has increased something like 500 per cent.

The tax duplicate has been arbitrarily increased with no added wealth as a basis. This resulted in multiplied taxes being imposed upon agriculture and industry until, for instance, farms in Wood County are today carrying a tax of from \$2.50 per acre off the main highway to \$4 per acre on the Dixie Highway.

There has been a great cry in this country for agricultural relief. Many schemes have been put forth but, unfortunately for agriculture, not one has commanded a sufficient following to be enacted into law.

Of one thing I am certain: No farm in Ohio is rich enough in fertility to pay four dollars an acre toward the cost of state government and still stay out of bankruptcy.

One form of farm relief that I imagine will be welcome to all the farmers of Ohio will be a reduction in the cost of government.

We find industry leaving the state where possible and moving to our neighboring states because of more favorable tax conditions.

A ton of steel manufactured in Youngstown carries twice as much tax cost as a similar ton of steel made in Pennsylvania.

Such conditions cannot long continue if industry and agriculture are not to be handicapped. Perhaps the question comes to your mind—Well, what is the remedy? My reply is that I am positive of one thing that with a legislature of another there is more extravagance and waste than under a Governor and a legislature of the same political party, working together. Many extravagances and wastes have crept into the state government that can be eliminated and the savings
