
OBITUARY

ROSALIA LANE GILMORE

Rosalia Lane Gilmore was born near Adario on February 27th, 1851. She was the daughter of Asa and Mary Jacobs Lane and had but one sister, Marna, who died in 1927.

Her father enlisted at the time of the Civil War and was killed by guerrillas, while in the south.

Afterward her mother married a widower, Thomas Harkness, with one son, Thomas Harkness, Jr. To this

union was born one son, Barton Harkness.

In 1868 she married Philip S. Gilmore, and bore two sons, Ora Asa Gilmore, and Frederick Lane Gilmore, both of whom have preceded her in death.

In 1913 her husband died, and she lived on in Shiloh where they had previously made their home.

In September 1927, she became ill, and was brought to the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. James Schreck of Plymouth, where she remained until the following June. She then wished

to visit her niece, Mrs. Floyd Anderson, who was with her father, P. J. Ruckman, on a farm east of Plymouth. Shortly after she arrived there she once more became ill, developing dropsy, which was the cause of her death on September 21, 1928.

Funeral services were held from her own home in Shiloh, Rev. Himes of the Plymouth Lutheran church officiating, and she was buried in the Mt. Hope cemetery at Shiloh.

She was a member of the Mt. Hope Deciple Church at Shenandoah, and belonged to Angelus Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star.

Mrs. Gilmore need no eulogies from those who knew her, and loved her. Altho she saw her loved ones taken one by one, her faith never faltered, and she surveyed the world with her serene blue eyes, as a place to help others, and take what measure of happiness came to her, with a thankful heart, and a never failing sense of humor.

She was beloved wherever she went and she leaves behind her a host of friends, who mourn their own loss, while rejoicing that she is once more with her loved ones, in that "land that is fairer than day."

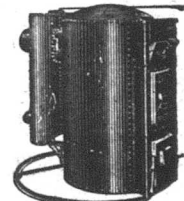

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF CASS TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT, RICHLAND COUNTY, OHIO

In the matter of the Additional levy of Taxes in the Cass Township School District.

Whereas the amount of taxes that may be raised by the levy of taxes within the 15 mills limitations will be insufficient to provide an adequate amount of money within the taxing district of Cass Township School District to provide the necessary funds for local school purposes of said school district:

Therefore, Be It Resolved that it is expedient to levy taxes at a rate in excess of said 15 mills limitation sufficient to provide funds necessary for the following purposes: for the purpose of meeting the current expenses of said school district, and that a rate of 2 1/2 mills be levied in excess of the 15 mills limitation, and that said rate of 2 1/2 mills be levied upon the duplicate of the taxing subdivision for the current year, and that the levy run for a period of five years, and not to exceed five years, and that the same be submitted to the voters of the Cass Township School District at the next November election to be

held November 6th, 1928 as provided by law in sections 5625-15 and 5626-17 G. V.

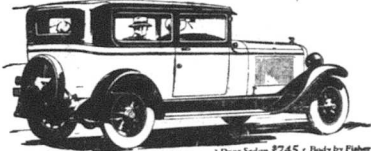
