

# Simplicity of cooling system is a feature of the new Ford



A COMPLETE water plant is a part of every automobile as it is a part of every mod-

The purpose of this water ant is to keep the engine plant is to keep the engine cooled to a temperature that will make it efficient in oper-ation. If it were not for this, the cylinder walls would be-come overheated and the pistons refuse to operate.

The entire cooling system of the new Ford is so simple in design and so carefully made that it requires very little attention.

The radiator should be kept full, of course, and drained once each month so that sediment will not collect and retard the free passage of water. In cold weather, a reliable anti-freeze solution should be added.

As owner and manager of this important water plant you should also see that the water pump and fan shaft are properly lubricated and the packing around the pump shaft kept in adjus-ment.
