and capable of weighing a point with an accuracy of about one part in 40,000,000.

In one of the engineering laboratories they have a giant tension-compression machine capable of exerting a pull of 1,000,000 pounds or a compression of 10,000,000 pounds. This machine is used to test building material of all kinds from suspension bridge cables to airplane frame members. I was interested to learn that this department of the Bureau was instrumental in determining the cause of the dirigible Shenandoah's catastrophe. Before any construction was done on the Shenandoah samples of the frame work to be used were submitted to the Bureau for examination. These samples came up to the high standard set by government engineers. After the ship broke up over eastern Ohio some samples from the wreck were sent to the Bureau Standards in an effort to find out if the material that actually went into the Shenandoah was identical like that submitted for examination prior to construction. It turned out that the different members of the frame had been marked with paint at the factory to facilitate construction, and there had been a weakening of the framework at the points the paint was used due to chemical reaction between the paint and metal. One of the problems the radio department is concerning itself with just now is that of radio signal intensity measurement—in other words, a study of the bugaboo 'fading' known only too well to radio listeners.

Another diversion of the Bureau has just completed an investigation of the absorption and transmission of ultra-violet light by different kinds of glass and clothing. This portion of the spectrum is invisible to the eye, is cut out of the sun's rays by ordinary window glass, and contains those rays which doctors have recently been telling us are so important for the good health of adults and which are necessary for infants.

Last Thursday afternoon we went to the House of Representatives to see how the 'school boys' were cutting up. I estimated less than one hundred Representatives in attendance then (i. e. about 25 per cent present), although the late afternoon hour may explain the cause for so many seats being vacant.

Thursday evening we went to the Library of Congress to look around and incidentally look up some references. The remarkable fact about the Congressional Library is that at least one copy of every book copyrighted in the United States is on file there. In addition, great numbers of the most important foreign publications are catalogued. The big drawing card here is the case containing the original Declaration of Independence and Constitution.

Saturday I visited the Naval Research Laboratory at Beltsville, Annapolis, the National Museum and the Smithsonian Institution. I was able to see only a part of one department at the Naval laboratory, and that quite by chance. Visitors are not allowed on the premises unless they desire to see a certain person; even then there is a bit of red tape to go through. It happened that I wanted some information to be used in connection with a research problem going on here at Duke University, so I was admitted, otherwise it would have been 'stay out'.

The National Museum and Smithsonian Institution are the relic 'treasure houses' of the States. Here to be found antiques and relics from practically every period, war, and incident since Revolutionary Days. There is no field which is not covered by one or the other of these institutions.

At present the article of greatest common interest in the historical way is Col. Lindbergh's plane, the 'Spirit of St. Louis.' A feeling of awe is bound to come over everybody who looks at the first plane to make a non-stop flight over the Atlantic. Also, among other notable planes in that division is the NC-4—the first plane to ever fly from America to Europe, and one of the planes used by the Army Round the World Fliers.

One of the most important things I learned was this: It is impossible to see very much of Washington in three days. Of course anybody could take a sightseeing bus and look at the outside of most all the buildings and even go inside a couple, but I am assured is far better to see the inside and really know something about a few.

Now, back in Durham I have sympathy for my friends in Shiloh where I hear the temperature is close to zero. As I write, the sun is out bright—like a May day in Ohio, students are walking across the campus without overcoats, and the thermometer is about 65 Fahrenheit outside.

In an editorial in one of the leading southern Ohio dailies, the editor explains the superior rules regulating basketball in the west over the bit and miss racetrack style of the east.

"Basket ball in the west is looked at from a scientific angle. The coaches give as much attention to perfecting plays as a football mentor does. There is placed on getting the ball and retaining possession of it. To do this without violating the rules requires clever thought on the part of the coach in training his men and an equal amount of cleverness on the part of the players in executing the plays Coach Earl Busbey of St. Clairsville led his team to victory with that brand of basketball last Saturday night when they defeated Marietta on the St. Clairsville floor.

Coach Busbey does something that probably no other coach in the valley does. He has one of his assistants chart all shots made at the basket. At the close of the game he has a record of the chances at the basket, the shots made and from the position on the floor from which the players scored or attempted to score.

The St. Clairsville mentor also believes in scouting. Whenever the opportunity presents itself for him to witness an opponent in action he accepts it. Naturally the material at St. Clairsville is limited, but nevertheless the players are showing signs of being well coached along the more modern lines of basketball, and it is the only team in the valley that have these characteristics.

The St. Clairsville team under coach Busbey have been winners in several important games. Earl is taking success right along with him from the north to the south.

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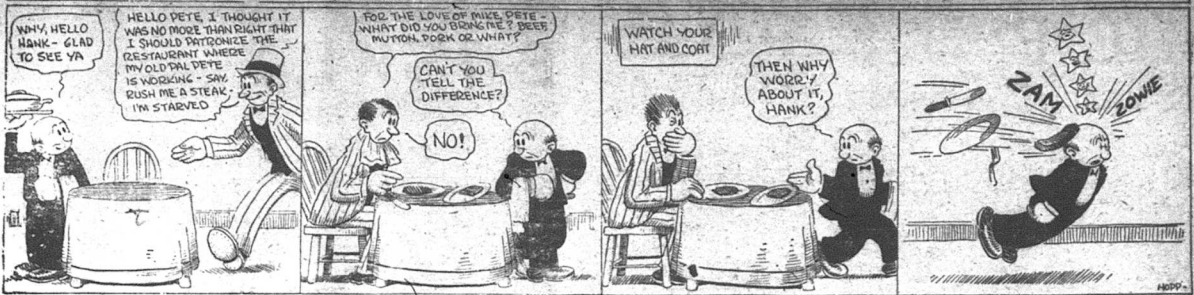

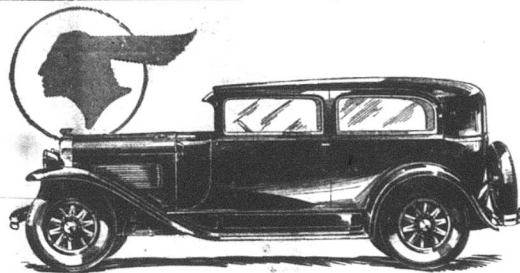
