ACCIDENTS STAGED SUNDAY

Harry Rappole, Jr., who was seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Mansfield-Bellefonte road on Sunday, September 22nd, died at the Mansfield General Hospital early this last Sunday morning, after putting up a brave fight against great odds. Little hope for his recovery was entertained by those around him, and death came as a welcome relief to the young man.

The deceased was born at Chillicothe, September 31st, 1906, and was just past 23 years old at the time of his death. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Edith McGee of Chillicothe. The body was removed to the home of his mother Sunday and the funeral and burial was in that city.

Miss Aleria Hale of this place who was injured in the same accident, was still confined to the General hospital at Mansfield on Tuesday, Mrs. D. E. McFarland, mother of the deceased, however, that she is improving and that she will be able to get out again within a few days.

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FATAL FIRE BURNED

Iona V. Bish, 16, of near Greenview, died, and her brother Edgar, 15, is suffering serious burns about his forehead and the left side of his body as a result of his futile attempt to save his sister from burning to death.

The girl lived but five hours after the oil exploded at her home four miles southwest of Greenview at seven o'clock Monday morning.

The girl's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bish were asleep in Michigan for the week-end. Iona had started to build a fire in the kitchen stove to prepare breakfast for the family of eleven children. Believing that the fire had gone completely out, she poured coal oil on the stove.

The girl's brother, who ran into the kitchen, he made an effort to save her without avail. Dr. Hey, of Greenview was called. He dressed the boys wounds and did as much as possible to relieve the suffering of the girl, who remained conscious until she died about noon, five hours after the accident.

The parents were notified immediately but they did not reach home until after the death of their daughter. The body of Iona was removed to a funeral home in Greenview. After the explosion a small fire started in the kitchen, but it was quickly extinguished and very little damage was done.

The Bish family moved to the Greenview community about five years ago. They live on a small farm, which is just south of Edward Grove Corners.

On Thursday noon the body was taken to Greenview, Ohio, formerly the home of the Bish family. Funeral services and burial were held at that place at three o'clock Thursday afternoon.

STATE GAME PROTECTOR GIVEN POINTERS ON THE LAW

Edwin S. Lewis of Bucyrus, state game protector for this section, recently visited in this community.

While here he made a general inspection called to the fact that a number of boys under the age of 16 years are hunting with a gun. He was accompanied by his parent or legal guardian. He points out that it is strictly against the law for boys to do this, and that it will be necessary to make arrests where such conditions are found.

Many people are under the impression that when a boy obtains a hunting license, no matter what his age, it is permissible for him to hunt. However, it should be understood that the law is against a hunting license holder being a permanent hunter.

All anyone can buy now is a license to hunt. If the person is under 16 years of age, he must be accompanied by his father or his legal guardian. Although, even in this case it is necessary for the boy to have a hunting license.

Mr. Lewis also asks the public to take notice that it is illegal to use cap pistols, air rifles or any explosive fire arms to any person under the age of 16 years.

The state game protector gave some of his experiences in regard to the protection of game birds, and the devastation of the mongolian pheasant during the corn planting season. Under the State Inspectors, a deputy was sent out to investigate the reports, and he obtained several birds, and he has been examining one kernel of corn in one ear, which was found. In all, he found a great number of worms were found. This would indicate that the mongolian pheasant lives almost entirely on corn grain.

It is supposed that the cooperation of all is in the enforcement of the game laws and asks that if any one knows of any infraction it should be reported to Edwin S. Lewis, 115 East Southern Avenue, Bucyrus, Ohio.

Further announcement will appear
later.
