EDITORIAL NEWS AND COMMENT

Perfectly beautiful in summer when a bright sunshine reveals the expense of blue water, white sand and green woods, Muskegon county in Michigan can be anything but heavenly in the dead of winter. Six children aged from one year to nine years have reason to know. They lay out on the shore of Monie lake, were none too comfortable while their parents were there to manage things.

But the father went away several months ago, to Chicago to look for work. It is supposed. The mother did what she could for the six little ones under hard circumstances. Then she disappeared and the children were left without help in their struggle for life against the cold and the snow and the rain from Lake Michigan and the pain of advancing starvation. The little that has been told of the pitiful children efforts to gain warmth and food is not pleasant to read. But presently the tragic situation in the remote hut became known. Kind neighbors rescued the six children from death by freezing or starvation and a conscientious state did its part, as by sending the two children most seriously starved or frozen to the University hospital. The case is virtually unique. Six little boys and girls being abandoned to their fate under such circumstances can hardly be imagined. It is not conceivable, of course, that the parents did it deliberately. The father may have had perfectly good intentions when he left home, only to meet with failure, accident or other defeat. The mother presumably did the best she could until desperation suggested some wild venture as possibly helpful is hardly to be believed that she was away with no intention of going back to accept human experience refuses to accept deliberate abandonment on both sides as the explanation of this extraordinary case, we are assured that human nature is still worthy of all manner of caring for little offspring as lovingly and adequately as life's circumstances permit.

LOCAL GIRL TELLS OF BUS ACCIDENT

Miss Dorothy Straub, Miami University student, who was recently injured in a bus wreck, writes a vivid picture of the tragic accident, in which a Presbyterian preacher from Oxford was killed and nineteen students injured, a number of them seriously. Miss Straub was returning to Oxford from Hamilton when the crash occurred and of which she writes. The letter follows:

Oxford, Ohio

Dearest Folks: Here I am a somewhat battered up invalid but alive thank goodness. I am at Wesley House, just arrived this morning from the hospital. That accident was horrible, hope I will never be in another one. The bus was going 45 miles an hour. We were going down a hill and I noticed the lights of a car ahead of us right by the concrete curb. It seemed to me we were coming closer to that car every moment. Glass flew everywhere as we skidded the cars. I thought we had gotten stuck but by another horrible crash when we struck the concrete. The front part of the bus was a wreck. Some fellow helped me through the windshield. There were people buried beneath the wreckage and had to be pulled out. I will never forget these moments of black agony and terror. The night later when I was killed and the girl who received the fractured skull were thrown over the concrete into the stream below. It was horrible. I did not want to see it. I and other girls went up to a house. I do not know how I did it as I had lost one slipper and both galoshes. I immediately called Oxford for a taxi to take the bunch back. When I arrived I was hysterical and sobbing. They took us to the hospital and I remained about three days. I have lost my front teeth, have a black eye, two finger nails were about crushed off, face bruised and swollen, one cut on the ankle and several body bruises that are very painful. Well you are tired of reading this letter so I will close.

CRESTLINE MAY GET BIG BOOM

Crestline, is in the midst of a civic upheaval as the result of persistent rumors which for the past few days have been going the rounds that the Pennsylvania Railroad company is seriously contemplating the expenditure of something in excess of three and one-half million dollars on its property located in and immediately surrounding that town.

Since the railroad company opened its new yards last August rumors have been current from time to time that further and greater improvements were scheduled for Crestline. During the past week these rumors have not only been revived but have been materially increased and business interests in the city are quickly considering to just what Crestline must do to meet the requirements, in a civic way, in the event the rumored program is put through.

Build More Tracks
Rumor has it that the company in the very near future will open its expansion program and that an immense amount of new trackwork will be built at once.

In addition new buildings are to be put up and present ones, which, it is believed, are very poor, will be razed to make way for future development.

At the same time a general remodeling program is announced to the end that the property of the company in Crestline will have a prominent part in the status of the great division of which it is a part.

Matter of Housing

Under existing conditions in Crestline, according to well founded reports, there are few vacant houses or apartments and the number of desirable places that are available are decidedly limited.

If the Pennsylvania company decided to go through with the program which has been rumored it will soon get under way it would mean that Crestline would be in position to meet the requirements and the subject of housing facilities is one which is giving city leaders the keenest concern.

Merchants, realizing the increased volume of business which would immediately come to them with the influx of new families, are ready to be reported, to co-operate in any manner possible to get Crestline ready to meet the demands which would be made upon it shortly after the railroad company makes a formal announcement as to its decision to launch its expansion program there.

The first damage suit resulting from the recent interurban crash near Bellevue was filed in common pleas court at Norwalk last Thursday afternoon on behalf of Russell Mack, a minor, by Julius Kreuger, his friend, against the Greyhound Lines, Inc., and the Lakeshore Electric. 19 people were killed in the accident, the worst on record in Ohio.

HENRY VOTAW DIES SUDDENLY

Henry Votaw suffered a stroke of apoplexy about 7:30 o'clock Wednesday night which caused his death 30 minutes later. Mr. and Mrs. Votaw had been to the Lutheran church supper and had returned to the store about 7 o'clock. After arriving at his home Mr. Votaw was stricken with what apparently seemed an attack of acute indigestion. He complained of a severe pain in his chest and also his head. Dr. Geo. Searle was summoned and on his arrival it was found that Mr. Votaw was sinking fast and that nothing could be done to aid him. He died just 30 minutes after complaining of being ill.

The remains were removed to Miller's mortuary where they will be prepared for burial. Private services will be held at the home on West Broadway way Friday evening with Rev. A. M. Himes in charge, after which the remains will be shipped over the B. & O. to Decatur, Ind., his old home. Friends will please omit flowers.

Henry Votaw was a prominent business man in the city for 25 years ago and was connected with the J. D. Fate company. After the merger of this concern with the Root-Heath company, Mr. Votaw acted as general sales manager for the clay machinery department, a position he held until last June, when his health failed him and he retired from his duties.

The deceased was a member of the Masonic order, Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows and Elks, and was admired by his fellowmen for big, congenial disposition and his thoughtfulness. He was a member of the Presbyterian church at his old home in Decatur, Ind.

Mrs. Votaw preceded her husband in death Dec. 11, 1900. He leaves two daughters by his first marriage. On Aug. 6, 1915 he married Nellie Pockham of Clinton, Iowa. During his residence in Plymouth Mr. Votaw made many warm friends and the community was greatly shocked to learn of his sudden passing.

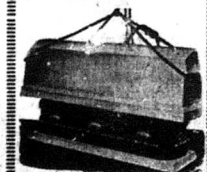

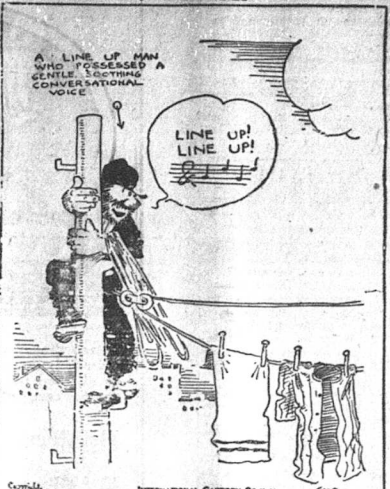

PLANT HOUSES DEFY WEATHER

Truck gardeners in southeastern Ohio are defying uncertain spring weather conditions, with an entirely new type of cold frame which has proved itself successful and economical. the plant house. Work with the young plants can be carried on under this shelter, when outdoor weather conditions are inclement; there is available more room for each plant, and in "cold spells" the fine heating system can prevent injury to the plants even in zero weather.

In constructing such a house the heating system is installed first. It consists of old oil drums connected with tiling laid in the soil in such a fashion that the smoke and heat from fires built in the oil drums are carried under the soil to smoketanks on the opposite sides of the house, warming the soil on the way. The houses are constructed in sheltered locations, as far as possible, and sometimes it is advisable to build a board fence as a windbreak.

Over a framework of poles, two thicknesses of cloth, one of "tobacco cloth" and the other of a fairly good grade of muslin, are fastened. The covers are made of strips of the cloth, sewed together.

Independence of weather conditions in the spring is an important factor in the size of the possible profits in vegetable gardening.

RESOLUTION NO.—
DECLARING IT NECESSARY TO IMPROVE SANDUSKY STREET BY RECONSTRUCTING A STORM SEWER THEREON.

BID IS INVOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HURON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES, OHIO.

Section 1. That it is necessary to improve the Sandusky Street Storm Sewer by taking up and relaying to a new grade the 15 inch tile between the stations 32 and 21, and the removing of present tile, deepening, reglazing and installing 18 inch tile between stations 21 and 0, together with suitable inlets, manholes, traps etc., as required by the plans and specifications for this work; and that said improvement is necessary and is conducive to the public health, convenience and welfare.

Section 2. That the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles for the proposed improvement heretofore made by the Village Engineer be and the same are hereby approved.

Section 3. That one-third of the cost of said improvement shall be assessed in proportion to the benefits which may result therefrom upon all the lots and lands benefited thereby, which said lots and lands hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement and the cost said improvement shall include the expenses of the preliminary and other surveys printing and publication of notices, resolutions and ordinances required and the serving of said notices, the cost of construction together with interest on bonds and notes issued in anticipation of deferred assessments and all other necessary expenditures.

Section 4. That the assessment so to be levied shall be paid in three annual installments with interest on deferred payments at the same rate as shall be borne by the bonds to be issued in anticipation of the collection thereof provided that the owner of any property assessed may at his option pay such assessment in cash within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance.

Section 5. That bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of assessments by installments and in account equal thereto.

Section 6. That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement not specially assessed shall be paid by the Village of Plymouth by the issuance of bonds in the manner provided by law.

Section 7. This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

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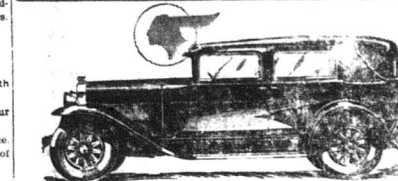
