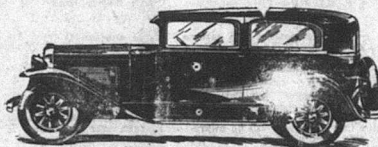

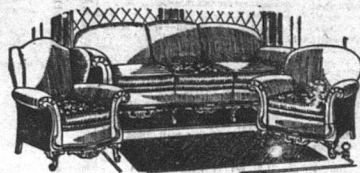

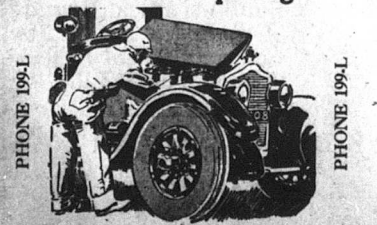

ORDINANCE 5

An Ordinance providing for the issuance of notes by the Village of Plymouth in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for the purpose of paying for the construction and reconstruction of a storm sewer in Sandusky Street and declaring the necessity of the issuance of bonds for such purpose.

Whereas, this council has requested the Village Clerk to issue a certificate as to the estimated life of the improvement to be constructed from the proceeds of the bonds hereinafter referred to, and of the notes to be issued in anticipation of said bonds and the Village Clerk has certified to this council such estimated life as exceeding five (5) years and has further certified the maximum maturity of such bonds as twenty-five (25) years, now therefore.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That it is deemed necessary to issue bonds of the Village of Plymouth in the total principal sum of \$3400.00 of which \$1600 shall be bonds of the Village of Plymouth for the Village's portion of the cost of said improvement and \$800 shall be bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of special assessments to be levied against the property benefited by said improvement. The proceeds of said bonds to be used to provide a fund for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of a portion of the Sandusky Street storm sewer.

Section 2. That bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in

the principal sum of \$1600 for the village's portion of the cost of said improvement and said bonds should be of the denomination of \$400 and shall be dated July 1st, 1929 and bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first days of July and January of each year until the principal sum is paid and shall mature in their consecutive order as follows: \$400.00 on the first day of January in each of the years from 1931 to 1934, both inclusive, which maturities are hereby determined to be in substantially equal annual installments.

Section 3. That bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in the principal sum of \$800 in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the property owners' portion of the cost of said improvement. Said bonds shall be dated July 1st, 1929 and shall bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July of each year until the principal sum is paid and shall mature in their consecutive order as follows: \$200.00 on the first days of January in each of the years from 1931 to 1934, both inclusive, which maturities are hereby determined to be in substantially equal annual installments.

Section 4. That it is necessary and this council hereby determines that notes shall be issued in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds.

Section 5. That such anticipatory notes shall be in the amount of \$2400.00, which sum does not exceed the combined amount of the proceeds of \$1600.00 and \$800.00 bonds respectively and shall be issued bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable at maturity. Such notes shall be dated the 29th day of May 1929 and shall mature on the 29th day of September 1929 provided, however, that such notes may be redeemed at any time by payment of principal and interest to date of redemption. Such notes shall be executed and delivered in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be

and shall be payable at the office of the People's National Bank in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio. They shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued and that they are issued pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 7. Said notes shall be first offered to the Sinking Fund Trustees of the Village and so many of the same as shall not be taken by said Trustees shall be sold at private sale by the Village Clerk, but for not less than par and accrued interest and the proceeds from such sale, except any premium and accrued interest thereon and the amount necessary for the payment of interest prior to the maturity of said notes, shall be paid into the proper fund and used for the purpose aforesaid and for no other purpose. Any premium and accrued interest and the amount necessary for the payment of interest prior to their maturity shall be transferred to the sinking fund Trustees to be applied by them in the payment of principal and interest of said notes in the manner provided by law.

Section 8. Said notes shall be the full general obligation of the city and the full faith, credit and revenue of said city are hereby pledged for the prompt payment of the same. The par value to be received from the sale of the bonds anticipated by said notes and any excess fund resulting from the issuance of said notes shall be to the extent necessary to be used only for the retirement of said notes at maturity, together with interest thereon, and is hereby pledged for such purpose.

Section 9. During the year or years when such notes run there shall be levied on all taxable property in the Village of Plymouth in addition to all other taxes a district tax annual, not less than that which would have been levied if bonds had been redeemed at the prior issue of such notes.

Said tax is hereby ordered, computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected to the same officers, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be

placed in a separate and distinct fund, which, together with the later net collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest of said notes or the bonds in anticipation of which they are issued when and as the same falls due.

Section 10. The Village Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certi-

fied copy of this ordinance to the Auditors of Huron and Richland Counties.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

PARENT-TEACHER MEETING

The Parent-Teacher Association held its April meeting at the school house Thursday night. After an excellent program given by the seventh grade, which included group songs, recitations, vocal and instrumental solos, the Association held its business meeting. Mr. Miller then gave a talk on breaking children from their left hand habits. It is more natural for a child to use his right hand more than the right. Observation have proven that the average child will instinctively use his left hand for protection and his right hand for aggression. He said they had no instinct to write at all therefore could have no instinct to write with either hand. However, some children do show an instinctive tendency to use the left hand more than the right. This can be easily corrected, if parents start early enough for childish instincts are easily modified.
All of our modern machinery is made for the use of the right hand, and to best prepare the child for his future, he should not be allowed to form left hand habits.
Mr. Miller added that his instructions to teachers are to require pupils to use the right hand in writing except in cases in which parents request that left-handed children be permitted to continue the use of the left hand.

LIQUID AIR

A very interesting lecture about liquid air and the component parts of our common air was given by Dr. James at Hamilton Hall, Monday afternoon.
Our air is made up of many parts of which oxygen and nitrogen are the most prominent.
Liquid air is 315° F below zero (-157.32 plus C). Some very interesting experiments were performed by Dr. James. The first one was to show that liquid air was really a liquid and can be poured like ordinary water. When a rod is thrust into liquid air and then pulled out it steams. This shows the great difference in temperature of common air and liquid air. Another experiment was to apparently boil the liquid air in a teakettle at the same time freeze the kettle to a cake of ice on which it was setting. Then other experiments were performed among which was one to show that temperature effects the resistance of wire. Another demonstrated how a rubber ball can be frozen and how the rubber acts when frozen. He also froze some raw meat and hit it with a small mallet and the meat of the audience got souvenirs. A demonstration of airplane engine firing by filling the boiler with liquid air.

The motor developed a speed of nearly 2300 R. P. M., but the boiler was all frost.

TRAFFIC LIGHT IS INSTALLED

A try-out is being given the new signal light which was installed this week in the Public Square, and many favorable comments have been received on its installation, and the manner in which the majority of the motorists are observing it.

No definite plans or regulations have been made as yet to the various turns that will be allowed, but council held a short session Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of outlining in ordinance for the new signal light.

The tentative regulations are: A left turn on the green light at the risk of the driver; one way traffic on the north side of the Square, i.e., all traffic from the county line road or Trux street, coming into the east side of the Square, and keeping next to the curb from Curpen's store to the north entrance of the Square, will be allowed to enter into the north flow of the traffic on any color, green or red, at the driver's risk.

Village officials are giving the traffic light a careful observation before making a definite traffic ruling. However, it is the opinion of the authorities that after the public is instructed as to the various turns, steps, etc., that the traffic problem through Plymouth will be solved.

Observers state that ninety per cent of the motorists are driving through Plymouth at a slower rate of speed, and using the same turns that are allowed in most all cities and towns.

The new light has several new features. The main one is that the light changes from red to green, and from green to amber, thus allowing the motorist to know that while the green and amber lights are on, that he must slow down and take precaution to have his machine under control.

After the ordinance has been passed and a period allowed for drivers to become familiar with regulations, stringent enforcement of the traffic problem will be at least in part, solved.

MEETING HELD

The Plymouth W. C. T. U. met at the Methodist Church, Friday afternoon April 19, with ten members present.

After the devotional period which was in charge of Mrs. Sam Trauger a short business session was held during which it was decided to grant the request of the County President, Mrs. Ray Louie, that we entertain one of the three county institutes which are to be held in the near future.

The topic of the afternoon, "Our Nation and our Immigrants," was in charge of Miss Eva White, who gave "Experiences in a W. C. T. U. Center." This center was opened in January, 1927, in Cleveland in a needy section of the city, where it ministers to the foreign mothers and the children. It is the only agency in all that densely populated section that is teaching Christian American ideals, and is supported by funds from local W. C. T. U's.

Mrs. Jessie Phillips gave "What to do for our Foreign Neighbors," and Mrs. Russell Scott read the plan of work as given by National W. C. T. U. Mrs. John Hester in giving "One hundred per cent Americanism," read Josiah Strong's definition of a 100% American who has American ideals, American spirit, American conceptions of life, American habits. A man is foreign not because he was born in a foreign land, but because he clings to foreign customs and ideals."

Mrs. Sam Trauger read "Canada and Liquor" which gave us an idea as to the effect of Government Control of Liquor in Canada. Some of the facts given from official sources are as follows: The Saskatchewan Liquor Board states that "arrests for drunkenness increased 125% in the first eight months." The Toronto Star is quoted "All records for inebriates were broken today, speaking of the last Labor Day celebration. The Montreal Star says "Drunkenness among women has increased 25%."

The Saskatchewan Liquor Board points out that with so-called government control, bootlegging increased 111% the first year. The British Columbia Board announces as much liquor is sold by bootleggers as is sold by the government stores. The Alberta Liquor Board says "Our greatest problem is moonshining in the country districts."

Those who argue that light wine and beer will promote temperance should learn that the British Columbia Liquor Board is quoted as saying "Since the opening of the beer parlors the sale of hard liquor increased 50%." The Quebec Liquor Commission says, "the sale of hard liquor increased 32,755 gallons in one year," and the Saskatchewan Board reports an increase of 33% in the sale of hard liquor.
