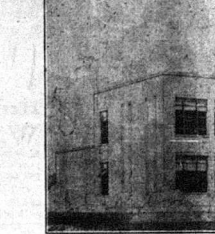

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CONSTRUCTION ON PLYMOUTH'S NEW SCHOOL WILL START NEXT MONTH



Actual work on Plymouth's new \$75,000 school house will probably begin in the early part of next month, according to information received at this office Wednesday. The building is to cost \$75,000 and is said to be one of the most compact structures, embodying all the latest improvements and plans for a modern high school. Bids are being advertised and will be received up until noon of April 25 at the clerk's office. The bids are itemized and include the various phases of work, such as excavation, grading, drains, carpenter, stone and cement work, heating, lighting, etc. The new school will be located on a

ten-acre tract just off Sandusky street and on the north side of North street. One of the most desirable features of the new building is that it will have a large auditorium, with a seating capacity large enough to take care of the public meetings that might be held in Plymouth. A well will be used as a source of water supply, and a good-sized athletic field is another feature. When the Board of Education selected the site, they not only did so through the recommendation of the State Board of Education, but it was the most ideal site offered. Messrs. J. E. Nims, Geo. W. Pickens, W. C. Ross, and H. F. Root, members of the Board, accompanied

by Granville Scott, Norwalk architect, were in Columbus Tuesday completing the necessary details for the securing of the funds for the new building. The Board has labored untiringly during the past few months getting everything in readiness for actual construction of the school. Every item of cost and expenses has been checked and rechecked and economy has been the watchword of the board in every instance. With the breaking of the ground in the early part of next month the dreams of the community, the longings of our young folk for a comfortable and suitable high school, will soon be a reality.

INVITED LECTURER Here and There TO SPEAK HERE

Leon Ray Livingston, wanderer, author and orator, better known as "The A-No. 1 Wanderer" will speak at the Lutheran church, Tuesday evening, April 9th at 7:45. His subject will be "Where is My Wandering Boy Tonight?"

Mr. Livingston has had a checked career, running away from his home in San Francisco when he was eleven years old. He ranged the earth in one place for more than a day and always leaving behind the sign, "A-No. 1." Underneath the date and below this an arrow pointing in the direction of his journey.

This former tramp is now devoting his life to persuading America's youth to stay at home and to shake off the wanderlust. A-No. 1 reveals what the life of a tramp really is and parents are advised to take their children to hear this remarkable man, to absolutely insure their never running away from home. The vast importance of A-No. 1 is wonderfully interesting message may best be judged from the fact that last year more than 200,000 boys and no less than 80,000 girls, all between 12 and 17 years of age, were reported to the police as missing from their homes, and at that, most of them from the better and best class of homes. Fully 75,000 of these children are never seen again by their unfortunate parents, who in a comparative few years usually die of broken hearts.

Mr. Livingston speaks three languages, English, French and German. He is an author of several entertaining books for boys and girls in which he covers the same subjects as his lecture. He is now a man of almost 60, with wavy gray hair and an engaging twinkle in his clear, blue eyes. He is thirty years ago. He discloses his entire and varied life in his lecture here, including his tramp travels abroad.

He carries with him a large notebook, which is filled with the cards of famous men. Each card bears a brief note which attests to the character of "A-No. 1." In this book appear the names of Theodore Roosevelt, William H. Taft, Thomas A. Edison, Luther Burbank and Jack London, together with the signatures of the chiefs of the secret service of almost every nation in America and some close where.

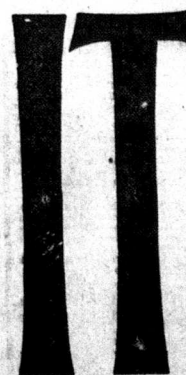

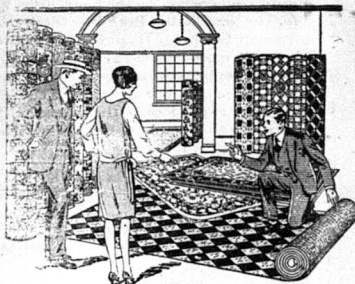

Columbus—An appropriation of \$20,000 to cover the expenses has been asked of the general assembly to investigate the departments of highway and agriculture. Nothing especially is charged with either department, but there have been many rumors in circulation, and some of the members of the general assembly want to know whether these rumors are all true or otherwise. And to satisfy their curiosity they would use \$20,000 of the taxpayers money. The resolution states as its object "to ascertain the truth or falsity of charges against these departments to the end that suspicion may be removed from persons on whom it may rest unjustly and remedial legislation may be adopted to minimize recurrence in the future."

A fine trip is being scheduled for Governor Cooper, Adjutant General Reynolds and a legislative committee to be appointed by the governor. The trip is scheduled for next September and will be to France and Belgium where three monuments to the 37th Division, Ohio National Guard are to be dedicated. The delegation headed by Governor Cooper plans to sail from Montreal on September 14th, and will be gone at least a month. The legislature is asked to appropriate \$25,000 to cover all expenses of the trip.

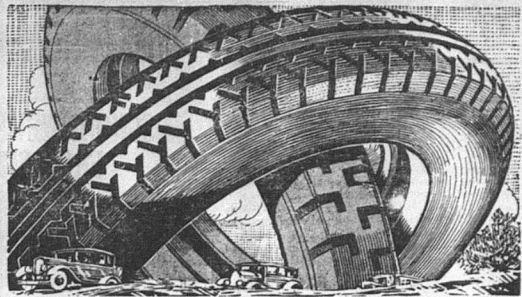

The hospital commission is more than pleased with the response that has been made in the appeal for furnishings for the various wards, it was revealed. The commission is comprised of Acting-Mayor C. L. Woloughby, chairman; H. H. Stires, Dr. C. Hawn, C. J. Ross and T. W. Beelman.

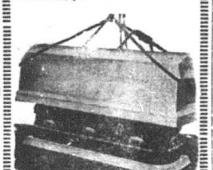

CHATTEL MORTGAGES SHOW MARKED GAIN

A marked increase in the number of chattel mortgages has developed here. The number increased from 9712 in 1927 to 4,687 in 1928, the gain being 575 in that time.

Not all of the possible sanitary measures can be discussed in an article of this kind, but some of the most important ones are described above. A good dip and disinfectant used regularly and conscientiously will go a long way toward making disease impossible in your poultry flock, not forgetting the most effective of all—God's own great sterilizer, fresh air and sunshine. It is not as easy to keep things sanitary as it is to let them go to rot, but it does keep down disease and THAT PAYS.

Hens that are healthy, robust, strong, free from parasites and disease are better layers, better breeders

The discoveries of Dr. Gorgas in Panama and of Dr. J. H. Henshaw in Africa, have shown how certain kinds of mosquitoes transmit the germs of yellow fever. This suggests that such parasites as lice, fleas, mites, ticks and bedbugs, which so often infect chickens, may also be carriers of disease. There is reason for believing that such is the case, but whether they do or not, such parasites cause a heavy drain on the vitality of the fowls. That means decreased ability to block the progress of disease should infection occur from other sources. The simplest kind of sanitary measures will make poultry houses and yards very unhealthy for germs and parasites, so why they should be tolerated is past understanding. Simple cleanliness is the first measure of sanitation. Poultry houses should be made so they can be scrubbed out occasionally and they should be regularly sprayed with coal tar dip and disinfectant.

No animal or vegetable matter should be allowed to remain exposed in yard or house until it begins to decay. All such material should be removed and buried or deeply buried. Be particularly careful so to dispose of fowls or animals that have died from one cause or another.

Drinking vessels and feeding equipment should be watched carefully. All fountains, troughs and hoppers should

be so constructed that the fowls can not get in them with their feet or roost on them, thereby befouling the contents with dirt or droppings. Fresh water should be drawn at least once a day. All feeding and watering equipment should be thoroughly scrubbed out, scalded or disinfected at frequent intervals.

Droppings are perhaps the most dangerous of all possible sources of infection. They are almost invariably breeding grounds for disease germs and, also frequently harbor intestinal worms. These may be picked up by fowls not already affected, thus spreading the evil. Furthermore, nothing could be worse for fowls than to be compelled to roost just above filthy droppings boards. The odors and gases arising from droppings are extremely unhealthy. Continued breathing of air so contaminated weakens the lungs, thus making easy the progress of any disease which may be contracted from the droppings and droppings board should be frequently cleaned and disinfected, as well as the whole house. It is also advisable to cover the droppings board with wire netting so the fowls cannot get into the droppings with their feet.

Birds that show signs of disease should always be put to themselves and treated until it is safe to return them to the flock. If any considerable number of them show signs of the same trouble, they should all be taken out of the flock and a wholesale clean up should be made; clean out and disinfect all houses and equipment; clean up yards and in every way attempt to remove all possible sources of infection.

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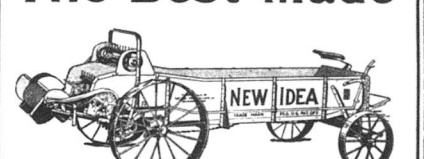
