Reverse The Progress

President Hoover recently declared that the solution of the problem of law enforcement was more vital to the preservation of America institutions than any other question. All crime, from murder to forgery, he said, had increased in the United States to the point where life and property were relatively more unsafe than in any other civilized country in the world. "We are not suffering from an ephemeral crime wave but from a subsidence of our foundations," he said.

"A surprising number of our people, otherwise of responsibility in the community, have drifted into the extraordinary notion that laws are made for those who would care to obey them. And in addition, our law enforcement machinery is suffering from many infirmities arising out of its technicalities, its circumlocutions, its involved procedures, and too often, I regret, from inefficient and delinquent officials."

"What we are facing today is the possibility that respect for law is fading from the sensibilities of our people. Whatever the value of our democracy, the enforcement of that law written in plain terms upon our statute books is not in my mind, a debatable question. Law should be observed and must be enforced until it is repealed by the proper processes of our democracy. The duty to enforce the law rests upon every public official and the duty to obey it rests upon every citizen."

President Hoover is right. The remedy is not in the passage of more legislation further restricting law-abiding citizens on the theory that this will curb the crook. Each new law passed makes more law-breakers and less enforcement.

We must reverse the process and have more enforcement and less legislation if we reduce crime and create respect for law.

ORDINANCE \$—
To Establish Traffic Rules and Regulations in the Public Square.

Whereas, the Automatic Traffic Signal Light has been installed in the Public Square for the control of traffic passing through said square and Whereas, it is necessary to establish certain rules and regulations for the guidance of traffic at said light, now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HURON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES, OHIO:

Section 1. That all vehicular traffic crossing said public square shall be subject to the right of said signal light.

Section 2. Any vehicle desiring to make a right turn at said light may make such right turn at any time and under any color shown by the traffic signal provided, however, that such turn must be made with due respect and regard for the safety and rights of passing pedestrians.

Section 3. Any vehicle desiring to make a left turn at said light shall make such turn only when a green light is displayed by said signal in the direction from which such vehicle is approaching and the complete turn may be made on such green light without waiting for a change of said signal.

A driver making such left hand turn shall, however, exceed to the right of way of all other vehicles crossing such intersection, which other vehicles shall have the right-of-way over such vehicles making such left turn.

A complete or "U" turn may be made at said intersection but only when a green light is displayed in the direction from which such vehicle is approaching and such driver must at all times exceed to the right of way of other vehicles over such vehicles making such "U" turn.

Section 5. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of an offense and upon being found guilty thereof shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
