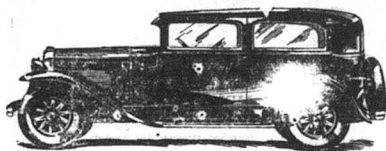

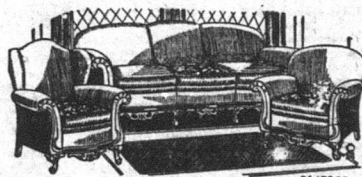

WATCH YOUR CAR

The twin menace of inefficient and illegal automobile lighting and equal identification, now in evidence in Ohio, is to be met squarely by the State through its Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

An intensive two-week campaign of education and correction, the opening gun of which will be fired within the next ten days, will be the means employed toward the desired end.

From the northern border to the Ohio river and from Pennsylvania to Indiana, inspectors of the Bureau will marshal the law-enforcing powers of every hamlet, village, town or smaller city in battle array.

In a two-week massed attack, with the cooperation of the newspapers of the state, they will thus attempt to stem the tide of increasing violation of the two cardinal tenets of motor- ing, which violation is, annually, responsible for the unnecessary loss of hundreds of lives and for a property damage amounting to millions of dollars.

The two weeks beginning June 15 will be devoted to this effort and at a meeting of State automobile inspectors, held in the Senate chamber Tuesday, called by Chairman E. Wilson.

Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, a day-and-night campaign was planned and it is assured will make for safer motor- ing in Ohio every hour of every day in the year.

It is recognized that the larger cities of the State have efficiently met the twin evils within their boundaries but their further co-operation will be urged, to carry this campaign into the territory immediately surrounding the municipalities.

The State traffic laws as to the two offenses named will be enforced occasionally where unwitting offenders are found. Flagrant and persistent violators will be shown that Ohio's motor statutes are not a collection of legal phrases to be lightly laughed off.

Those who cover their license plates with bumpers or other obstructions or seek to calm the waters of motor violation by pouring oil on their license numbers that dust may collect, will be the first to feel the iron hand in the velvet glove of the bureau's inspectors.

Bussey market towns, county seats and peaceful crossroads communities will be visited and revisited in turn. Precept and persistence will go hand in hand in the State's educational campaign. The co-operation of all residents of these communities will be sought to put across the idea of increased safety and safety in motor- ing. The co-operation of all Mayors, Police Chiefs, Sheriffs, Marshals, Constables and other officials will be asked and gratefully accepted in making the bad boys of the highways and byways behave.

"Give every driver a square deal. See that all motorists are given a chance to correct irregularities as to lights and license plates" said Commissioner Wilson to his inspectors at this meeting, and Deputy Commissioner E. T. Fogo repeated the order with emphasis in a short questioning and answer session in which he briefly outlined the salient points of the law's provisions in both regards.

So those motorists on Ohio's roads who have their lamps correctly trimmed and their license plates on straight in the period from June 15 to June 23 next, and thereafter, need have no fear that the long arm of the traffic law of the State will twine around their necks in an admonitory embrace which may prove costly to the wital ones.

ORDINANCE NO.

PROHIBITING THE SALE OR USE OF FIREWORKS IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH.

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the Village of Plymouth in that certain residents or inhabitants thereof are discharging fireworks and fire arms within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth and are creating a noise and disturbance thereby, which it is necessary to regulate and control at once, now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUN-

CIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HURON AND RICHARD COUNTIES, OHIO: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation by himself, agent, employee or other person, to sell, give away or dispose of fire crackers, torpedoes or any other form of fire works within the Village of Plymouth.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to fire off, shoot or otherwise use or discharge or assist in using, firing or discharging within the Village limits of the Village of Plymouth any fire crackers, torpedoes or other fire works.

Section 3. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than \$20.00 nor less than \$5.00.

Section 4. This ordinance, being an emergency measure shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage this 10th day of June A. D. 1929.

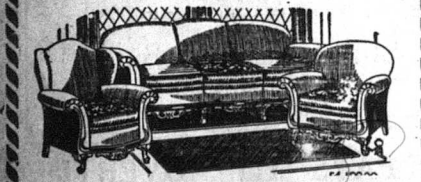

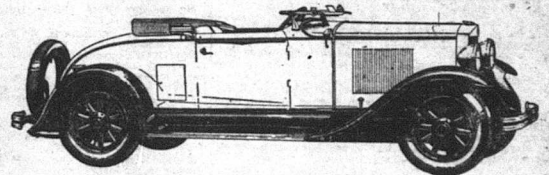

WHEREAS, this council has heretofore requested the Village Clerk to issue his certificate as to the estimated life of the property proposed to be acquired from the proceeds of the bonds hereinafter referred to and such Clerk has certified to this council such estimated life as exceeding five years, and has further certified the maximum maturity of such bonds as ten years;

AND WHEREAS, the notes, issued in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds hereinafter referred to, are about to fall due;

NOW THEREFORE, he it ordained

Section 1. That it is deemed necessary to issue bonds of the Village of Plymouth in the principal sum of \$4,000, for the purpose of acquiring and purchasing an automobile fire truck for the Village of Plymouth and the inhabitants thereof and to provide a fund for the payment of not to exceed one year's interest on said bonds. That such bonds shall be issued in one lot to take up the anticipatory notes which have been issued in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds.

Section 2. That bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in the principal sum of \$4,000 for the purpose aforesaid. Each of said bonds shall be of the denomination of \$500.00 and said bonds shall be dated April 1st, 1929, and shall bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the 1st days of April and October of each year until the principal sum is paid, provided, however, that if said bonds are sold bearing a different rate of interest than hereinbefore specified, such bonds shall bear such rate of interest as may be provided for in the resolution of council approving the award thereof. Said bonds shall mature as follows:

\$500.00 on the 1st day of April of each of the years from 1931 to 1935, both inclusive, which maturities are hereby determined to be in substantially equal annual installments.

The principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable at the office of the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be signed upon their face by the Mayor for which they are issued; that they are issued in pursuance of this ordinance and shall be signed by the Mayor and Clerk, and sealed with the corporate seal of said village. The interest coupons attached to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the City Clerk. Said bonds shall bear such consecutive numbers as the City Clerk shall determine.

Section 4. That for the purpose of providing the necessary funds to pay the interest on the foregoing issue of bonds, promptly when, and as the same falls due and also to provide a fund sufficient to discharge the said serial bonds at maturity, there shall be and is hereby levied on all the taxable property in said Village of Plymouth, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually during the period said bonds are to run in an amount sufficient to provide funds to pay interest upon said bonds as and when the same falls due and also to provide a fund for the discharge of the principal of said serial bonds at maturity, which tax shall be not less than the interest and sinking fund tax required by Section 11 of Article 12 of the Constitution.

Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the said officer, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, levied and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to the other taxes and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund to be known as the sinking fund and collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds when and as the same fall due.

Section 5. That said bonds shall be sold and principal of said bonds interest to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund in their official capacity, and if said trustees refuse to take any or all of said bonds, then said bonds not so taken shall be advertised for public sale and sold in the manner provided by law under the direction of the Finance Committee and the Clerk, but not for less than their par value and accrued interest; the bond sale advertisement shall state that any one desiring to do so, may present a bid or bids for such bonds based upon their bearing a different rate of interest than hereinbefore fixed, provided, however, that where a fractional interest rate is bid such fraction shall be one-quarter of one per cent or multiples thereof; the proceeds from the sale of said bonds, except the premium and accrued interest thereon and the amount of said bonds issued for interest, shall be used for the purpose aforesaid and for no other purpose; the premium and accrued interest received from such sale and the amount of said bonds issued for interest shall be transferred to the Trustee of the Sinking Fund to be applied by them in the payment of the principal and interest of said bonds in the manner

ORDINANCE No. —

DETERMINING TO PROCEED WITH THE IMPROVEMENT OF SANDUSKY STREET BY CONSTRUCTING A STORM SEWER THEREIN.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO:

Section 1. That it is hereby determined to proceed with the improvement of Sandusky Street by taking up and relaying to a new grade the storm sewer therein between stations 22

and 21, and the removing of present manholes, steps, etc. as required by the plans and specifications heretofore provided and in accordance with Resolution passed on the 14th day of February 1929.

Section 2. That all claims for damages resulting therefrom shall be judicially inquired into after the completion of the proposed improvement.

Section 3. That one-third of the cost of said improvement shall be assessed in proportion with the benefits which may result therefrom upon

all the lots and lands benefited thereby, which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement the cost shall include the expenses of the preliminary surveys, the printing and publication of notices, resolutions and ordinances required and the serving of said notices, the cost of constructing together with interest on bonds and notes issued in anticipation of deferred assessments and all necessary expenditures.

Section 4. That the assessment so to be levied shall be paid in three annual installments with interest on deferred payments at the same rate as shall be borne by the bonds to be issued in anticipation of the collection thereof; provided that the owner of any property assessed may at his option pay said assessment in cash within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance.

Section 5. That bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of assessments by installments and in an amount equal thereto.

Section 6. That to pay the remainder of the cost of said improvement bonds of the Village of Plymouth shall be issued in a manner provided by law.

Section 7. That the Clerk by and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the construction of said improvement according to law.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

OLD SOLDIER DEAD

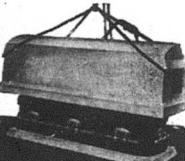

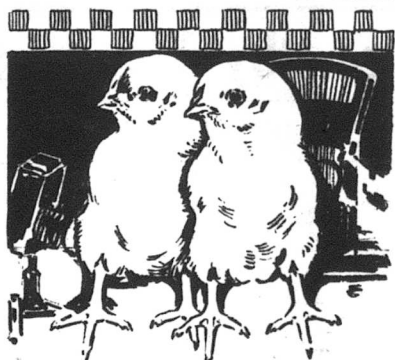

TALES OF TALL WHEAT CAN COME TRUE AGAIN

When Ohio soils were first sown to wheat a good many years ago it was not unusual to hear of yields of 40 and 50 bushels an acre. The pioneers told of wheat yielding like that and growing as tall as a man.

Fertilizer was no problem in those days, for the virgin soil contained an abundance of available plant food. Constant cropping since then, particularly with heavy feeders like corn, has changed the situation. So rare is the 40-bushel yield that the agricultural experiment station of the Ohio State University sponsors an honor club for growers who produce wheat at the rate of 40 bushels an acre or more on 10 acres.

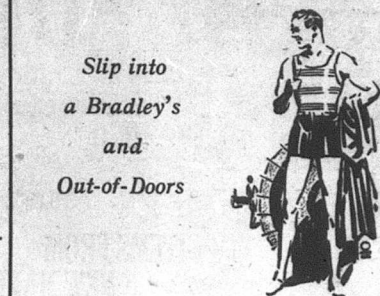

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than 20 bushels an acre hardly compares favorably with foreign countries. In England the average wheat yield is 33 bushels an acre; in Denmark, 39 bushels an acre; in Belgium, 39 bushels; in Holland, 42 1/2 bushels.

Soils specialists explain that a more favorable climate for wheat has something to do with the higher yields abroad, but that of equal importance is the fertilization program followed by foreign wheat growers. Besides the usual fall sowing of fertilizer, European wheat growers regularly top dress wheat in the spring with nitrate of soda, the most readily available and most economical form of nitrogen.

According to the Judsons, there are four principle drawbacks to Texas country.

1st, that might be listed is the freethought modern machinery plays an important part in the cultivation and quarry of high winds and the danger of them. Storms are very severe and occur often. Many, if not the majority of homes in open districts have storm cellars which are specially constructed and stocked with supplies in case of emergency.

2nd, in importance, if not first, is

the pest, jiggers. We know them in Ohio as a red mite obtainable while sitting along a river bank fishing and waiting for a bite, which the jiggers supply themselves. In Texas, however, the small insect is found on lawns and foliage.

Rattlesnakes would list first for some individuals, but will be put third here. Of the same species that are found on the prairie lands west of Plymouth, they are poisonous and hunted as a pest, and for the largest rattles.

The Plymouth visitors had the experience of being in a sand storm but were a bit at one side of the main path. Towards the South, the path being East and West, the horizon appeared a deep yellow, caused by the blowing sand and the sun refracting from the grains of the drifting material.

On the return trip the route taken followed the Mississippi on the west border for a way and a slight deviation enabled the Judsons to see the Osage. Upon being questioned as to the relative height of the range, Mr. Judson replied that the tops of several of the hills could not be seen from the car window.

The plains were covered by this red soil, with a muddy and slimy silt which grows a short grass, but the heat of the land has decayed the veg-

station killed by the high water and makes it offensive.

At the point where the tracks follow the great river for a distance of forty miles or so, the maximum width of the water is one mile. It could be seen along the tracks that the height of the flood had reached and passed over the rail bedding.

A few comparisons could be made that may give a further idea of the extent and variation of our nation.

In passing through Illinois, and coming towards Ohio and northward the flat land was left and the topography became more rough. Farmers were busy preparing the fields for corn while, as before mentioned, corn in Texas was big-high.

Large barns and buildings, and large farm houses are prevalent thru this part of the U. S. In Texas country there are few if any buildings besides the house, and that structure is built low and of heavy material.

Homes in the city are usually of brick or of like material, with 4, 5, 6 or 8 rooms. There are few two-story houses.

The route homeward was through Gary, Indiana, and Detroit, Michigan, as Mr. Judson's sister lives in the latter city.

And so after a journey and sojourn of nine weeks, we welcome the Judsons home to Plymouth, and thank them for the making possible the information contained in this article.
