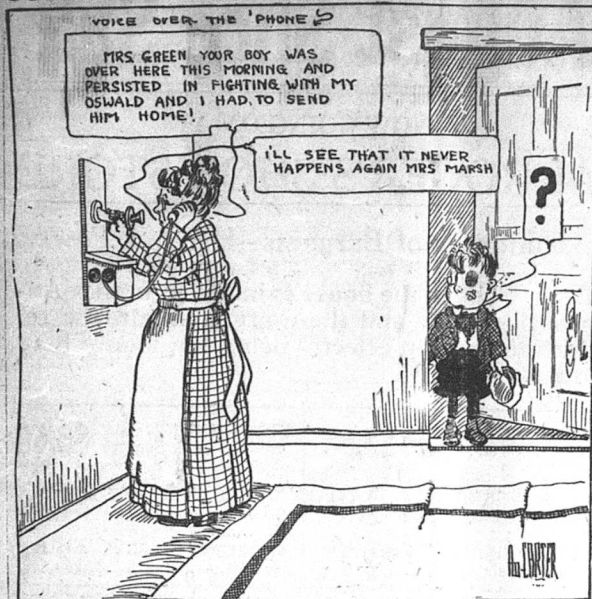

NEWEST MODEL RADIO ON DISPLAY

A new model radio receiving set, Radiola 66, employing the proven and popular super-heterodyne principle, was announced today by Brown & Miller Radiola dealer of the Radio-victor Corporation of America.

"The super-heterodyne circuit used in Radiola 66," Mr. Brown explained in announcing the new model, includes a tuned antenna coupling, one stage of tuned radio frequency amplification, oscillator, power detector two stages of intermediate frequency amplification, second (power) detector and one stage of audio frequency amplification. Editorials

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

Plymouth has several things to think about in the way of civic improvement. And this summer we thought of one of the most outstanding, we believe, of all our present, and that is a municipal swimming pool.

There is something that gives the young folks more enjoyment than a good dip or swim during the hot months, and it is more than a source of delight to them.

There is Shelby and Willard with swimming pools, and from reports we hear, they are being well patronized and are proving much enjoyment to the children and young people. A pool here would give many youngsters an opportunity to learn how to swim, something that everyone should know.

There are several grown people in town who admit they can't swim. The hot sultry days we've just gone through makes it a strong argument for a pool where the tots can go in for wading or swimming and get relief from the heat.

We venture to say that if a pool of the proper size, surrounded by a playground and a "hot-dog" stand, erected on a suitable location around Plymouth, that in five years time it will have paid for itself with about twenty per cent additional on the principal.

Even if we can't afford a pool for everyone the little fellows should have a place to wade and play.

LEAVENWORTH AND OTHERS

The third major prison riot within twelve days occurred Thursday at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth. Before that, the convicts of Danemora and Auburn prisons in New York, had rioted. In each instance guards or convicts were killed.

The attempt at outbreak at Leavenworth may be only the psychological backlash from the two other riots, although, according to prison officials, Leavenworth is badly overcrowded. Herding prisoners who have already lost much of their hope into narrow cells in the heat of summer is calculated to arouse revolt in them.

In the New York prisons, overcrowding was not the only cause for the revolt. After a full investigation of both the Auburn and Danemora prison trouble, Dr. Kiek, state commissioner of correction for New York, attributes the riots to overcrowding, plus the state of despair of the convicts.

Danemora is called "Siberia" by the underworld of New York, because it is a grim, forbidding place to which only the convicts who have been termed intractable or incorrigible are sent. Its population is made up of desperate men whose terms last for the remainder of their lives. Having lost all hope, having seen the state despair of salvaging them, they are naturally desperate. They have nothing to lose by death; they can play it as a stake against their freedom calmly. The state offers them nothing save physical force to restrain them.

At Auburn, the conditions were somewhat different. The prisoners are of a different class, or have been until recently. The New York papers say that since the Baumes law, providing life sentence for fourth offenders in felony cases, has gone into effect a desperate class of prisoners has been created in all New York prisons. The Baumes law has filled the New York prisons to overflowing. Danemora had 300 more prisoners than the normal capacity; Auburn had 300 to 350 more than could be taken care of. Poor food and overcrowded conditions in the hot weather made the men desperate enough to risk anything for freedom.

The blame in New York has been placed upon the legislature, which, it is contended, is ready enough to pass any sort of new law without making provision for its effects. The Baumes law has sent hundreds of criminals to the penitentiaries, but the legislature has not provided an additional cell-block. The law is not condemned, except that by providing life sentence for less than capital offenses, it sets the state's seal of despair upon the prisoners and makes them, in turn, desperate, but it is contended that the machinery will have to be made adequate for handling the Baumes criminals.—Macon Telegraph.

RIGHT and WRONG USE OF WEALTH

Who unto him who sacrifices manhood at the delusive shrine of mammon; the influence of its demon power will drive out the last spark of nobility from the life which by right should be devoted to lift the human race to the highest level this side of eternity. It was the vision of gold which tempted Balaam the ancient prophet to profane his sacred calling; visions of gold caused Ananias and his wife to fall from grace; how dreadful the thought that for his glitter many are willing to barter away their immortal welfare. Let us lift our eyes upward and ask the loving Father to assist us in seeing ourselves as we appear in His sight, stripped of the last vestige of usefulness, a base slave to gold. O Divine Master! Let us see the abomination of the worship of mammon accompanied by his ministering priests: Avarice on the one hand and Polony and Death on the other; help us Almighty, Loving Father to see us as thou seest us, grovelling in the dust, the fifth feeding on husks and chaff, bowed to the earth by the crushing weight of the passionate desire to possess things that abide not. John Jacob Astor the great financier was once congratulated by a dear friend on account of his accumulated wealth, to which the king of finance replied by pointing to a large pile of bonds, deeds of properties asking how he would like to manage these things for his board, room rent and clothes? To which his friend replied he would not like to do this; well replied Mr. Astor, that is all I get out of it, with the addition of many a sleepless night. In studying ancient Mythology we read of King Midas asking the Gods that everything he would touch might be turned to gold, for he was under the impression that wealth must bring undisturbed happiness. The Gods granted his request, but when his clothing, food, water, the flowers he plucked, and even his little daughter whom he kissed, all changed into the golden metal, he begged that the golden touch might be taken from him. Mammon worship is found in the palace of the rich as well as in the hovels of the poor; for the old miserly form counting over and over the hoarded dollars, making them the God of a dwarfed conscience, or the selfish figuring on the death of some one, through whose departure a few paltry dollars might come into his possession, the unscrupulous mechanic at tempting bad work for food, the idler who wastes the hours of others, the anarchist carrying discontent and despair wherever he can build upon the downfall of existing social and political conditions, his own selfish and base ideas, all of these and many like them are worshipping the golden calf, heedless of the day of reckoning, when the words shall fall upon the ear, inasmuch as you did not apply the principles of true and useful charity to these of the least of mine, you have failed to fulfill the law of love, depart from me, ye idle and unprofitable. We must never lose sight of the fact that wealth so highly prized by all is of very little real value unless we are aware of the admonition that true worship consists only in the enlargement of our talents, gifts and powers to the gospel of a universal brotherhood. If unlimited possession of wealth can make a man happy Solomon certainly should be considered the happiest man of his time, but he had sense enough to know that he could use but little of this wealth to satisfy the cravings of the human spirit, hence we hear him exclaim: It is all vanity and vexation of spirit!

It is indeed refreshing to read at times of men of great wealth using their gold to assist humanity to a higher level, by applying the same to relieve a strain upon the financial or social conditions of the age, while here and there we discover a poor man who shows evidence of the self-mockery of the glitter of gold, while it is true that at times the pos-

session of wealth throws a protecting arm around man, yet it is very hard to practice true brotherhood and thus live a life of service, sharing the burdens of our fellows, as long as mammon is the passionate desire of our heart. Do not misunderstand me, I am not condemning the rich man because he has been successful to amass a competency for himself and those depending upon him, for the world has produced many millionaire citizens, who have used their wealth to succor the poor and forsaken, but I would warn all that gold is a delusion, and its worship contrary to the teaching of the great teacher of Galilee. Nevertheless if we believe in the truth of the divine writ, we must acknowledge that there is hidden away in the possession of earthly riches an insidious foe and a dangerous snare, demanding our constant watchful care and prayer. Some time ago I read in a story book of fiction of an Arab out on the desert waste of the Sahara, starving for food; weakened and almost overcome by hunger still he pressed on, hoping to meet some traveler, or that perhaps some one who had passed that way might have left by accident a package of food. Finally, away beyond the sand-blows he found a traveler, but he was hoping it might not be empty, he tore open the fastenings and before his hungry eyes he poured out upon the desert sands a stream of glittering gems, the rays of the evening sun throwing their bright glow into his face, he fell to the earth in agony of spirit with the cry of despair escaping his lips: Only diamonds for which other men were willing to give their lives, to him they were at this time cruel mockery, for he was starving for bread. Friends God has made the human soul too big to be satisfied with the things of this world that pass away, and if we could supply all our temporal wants, there would still be an aching void in the heart unless we listen to the masters command: First love to God and next love to our fellowman. Our other known weakness therefore the sacred word plainly tells us to watch and pray, lest we fall into temptation.

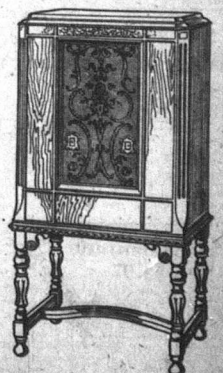
