Death Occurs Monday At Home In Shiloh.

Mrs. Margaret Crawford Barnes died at her home on Mechanic St., Shiloh at 9:30 Monday evening. The deceased was a highly respected citizen, 59 years of age, Oct. 25, her birthplace being near Richmond, in Jefferson county.

The 58th wedding anniversary was celebrated by Mr. and Mrs. Barnes, September 13 of this year.

Their younger years were spent on their farm near Adair, but for the past thirty years they have been residents of this place.

The deceased is survived by her husband, George Barnes, and one son, Charles Barnes of Adair. She was a life long member of the M. E. church and an active member of the Ladies Aid as long as her health permitted.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church Thursday afternoon at 1:30 conducted by Rev. O. M. Peoples. Burial was made in the cemetery at Adair.

DISEASE FOUND AMONG CATTLE

Pneumonia Discovered In Shiloh Cattle As Result of Minn. Shipment.

C. C. Swartz, a prominent Shiloh farmer, recently received a shipment of 25 steers, from Minneapolis, Minn. A disease termed by stockmen as shipping pneumonia developed and Mr. Swartz has lost four of these valuable animals.

We are informed that this disease is very contagious, and can easily be carried to other stock in the community by hunters or others crossing the farm near the sick stock. A careful check and watch should be kept on all cattle.

Greenwich Suffers Water Shortage

Conference of State and County Called Soon

A conference of engineers from the state health department has been called with Huron county officials for a discussion of the water shortage at Greenwich.

A report made December 5 stated that an epidemic of typhoid fever was feared unless water was obtained in the near future. The shortage was anticipated at Greenwich but the proper steps were not taken to prepare for it because of the shortage of funds. A well was drilled about three miles from the city, but no pipe line was installed.

Three other small towns facing the same shortage are Barnevillie, New Sharon, and Caldwell. Engineers of the state department are now working night and day to provide relief for the stricken communities. The department will recommend in the near future, the lifting of the limit of expenditures from the tax duplicates, to the state tax commission.

DIPHTHERIA IS REPORTED HERE

Condition of Willard Ross Remains Unchanged; Antitoxin Sent Tues.

The Health Department of Richmond county dispatched 25,000 units of diphtheria antitoxin to Plymouth Tuesday afternoon, to be used by health authorities, after a case of diphtheria had been reported.

Although at the present time, Willard Ross, manager of the local Kroger store, is the only person stricken with the disease, a large number of people could have been exposed. Health workers of Huron county are assisting Richmond county in preventing the spread of the disease.

To prevent an epidemic such as experienced north of Vernon Junction last January, Dr. T. R. Meyer, county health commissioner, ordered 25,000 units sent to Dr. G. J. Searle for use in combating the spread of the disease. The condition of Mr. Ross is reported about the same.

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Rininger, aged 55, of Toledo, were held Thursday afternoon from the family home in Shiloh, on Marvin avenue, West Shiloh, of Columbus, former Shiloh pastor, officiated. Burial was made in Greenlawn cemetery here.

Death occurred at the State Hospital early Tuesday morning. Surviving is one son, John Rininger, of Tiffin. The deceased was at one time a teacher in the Tiffin schools, and is well known in the neighboring communities.

Marsh School Aided by Willard Women

Otto Roe Assisted By Club Members In Work

Plans have been made by the Federated Clubs of Willard to further the cooperation with teachers of the New Marsh school for marshland children. Members of the committee appointed for the work are Mrs. E. McKinney, Mrs. H. F. Murray, Mrs. J. Lumber, Mrs. A. C. Byer.

Fifty-two children are enrolled for the school term, the majority from families that are practically destitute. Where food and clothing is almost a luxury during the winter months. Classes are conducted with Mr. O. Roe, of Plymouth, in charge, in the Community house donated for use by the Farmers Farm Company.

Training, and education, aside from the necessary 3R's is given, and is sorely needed by these children, whose only salvation from a life similar to the one they are now leading, is through schooling, and contact with people of higher standards. An organ has been given the school by Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Denzer of Willard.

SELF GOVERNMENT IS ADVOCATED

Local Self Government Is Upheld By Toledo Man In Answer to Detroit Judge

At the meeting of the State Association of County Treasurers and Auditors held in Columbus, the principle of local self government was upheld by William B. Guttenow of Toledo, Collector of Internal Revenue of the 10th Ohio District.

Collector Guttenow answered the criticism of township government made by Judge Lacy of Detroit before the Ohio Association of Real Estate Boards. Judge Lacy declared that "the township government is a parasite, drawing on state revenues to maintain itself with the result that urban property must pay sufficient taxes to carry along the obsolete township."

Answering this charge, Mr. Guttenow said: "If the learned jurist from Michigan meant this statement to apply to the township in Ohio, the answer is that he does not know what he is talking about. Township governments in Ohio, whatever else they may be, are not parasites; their support comes solely from taxes levied within the township. Not one dollar of the general revenue of the state government goes to support township government; not one penny is taken from any urban citizen of Ohio for the support of any township government in Ohio."

"The second of Judge Lacy's pronouncements is that 'townships can be abolished without any surrender of the principle of local self-government.' Now that is a rather remarkable statement. Ever since the first settlements were made on this continent, our people have had notions of their right to control their own local affairs through local officials of their own choosing. This is what most Americans regard as the rightest local self-government; and they believe it to be an inalienable right, belonging to all the American citizens."

"It is true that we have always had with us the theorists who believe in the centralization of government; and who, in the interest of what they term efficiency, advocate that all township and county lines be abolished. The ideal of this group of thinkers is to have the area of the state divided into convenient administrative districts, and to have the administrative districts governed by an authority quite remote from the taxpayers."

"The idea of central government which has been followed throughout our history is far different from this."

We have accepted the view that the people who occupy the areas known as townships and counties have definite political interests in common, and govern their own local affairs through local officials. Self government involves the determination of local policies by the people of the locality. What shall be done to care for the poor within the township? Which township road shall be improved? What provision needs to be made for the upkeep of cemeteries? How much money shall be spent for these purposes, and what shall the tax rate be?

Apparently he has overlooked the fact that if it were not for the political machinery of the township and county, the people living outside of urban centers would have no local self-government at all.

Our fathers of the Revolution believed that the people who paid the taxes were entitled to have a very large part in determining what those taxes should be. This lesson of American history has not been forgotten by the men and women living within the township, although it may have been overlooked by some of the urban friends of centralized government."

BILL OF SALE IS NECESSARY FOR '31 AUTO LICENSE TAGS

Columbus, O., Dec. 11.—Secretary of State Clarence J. Brown at this season of the year wishes to remind all motor vehicle owners that it is absolutely necessary to have a bill of sale before application can be made for auto license tags. If a new car has been purchased during 1930 and the license plates have not been transferred according to law, in order that no delay will take place when making application for new plates only the owner named in the bill of sale is permitted to sign the application.

No other person should attempt to do so as it only causes confusion and delay to those already waiting to secure tags. All owners should apply for plates early as the 650 distribution points throughout the state are now open with plenty of clerical help to care for the public.

As in early Christmas buying, those who purchase license plates early in December, are saved a loss of time and many inconveniences caused by putting off until tomorrow, that which could be done today. The latest report for Plymouth tags is 28 sets.

COSTS FOR GRAIN ELEVATOR IS GIVEN

With a total sales amounting to \$24,450.00, Ohio cooperative grain elevators handled their business this year on a trading margin of 7.7 cents per dollar and made net earnings of \$11.40 per \$100 share, according to B. A. Wallace, specialist in grain marketing at O. S. U.

Miscellaneous items, such as receipt from grinding, trucking, and interest received, make up nearly a fifth of the elevators' total income, he declares. The actual operating expenses in handling \$24,550,000 of sales were 8.3 cents per dollar of sales. An increase of commodities handled, mixing of feeds, and in trucking of goods.
