The devotional period was arranged so that it emphasized the advice of Rev. Mr. Himes at the January meeting when he told the W. C. T. U. women to "Carry On." The message of Scripture were given a local application, some of the strongest being: Isa. 32:9—"Rise up ye women that are at ease: hear my voice, ye careless ones." Isa. 32:11—"Tremble ye women that are at ease: be troubled, ye careless ones." And Judge 16—"When the angel of the Lord cursed the inhabitants of Meroz—"because they came not to the help of the Lord against the mighty." The battle against the liquor traffic today is just as much the Lord's battle (II Chron. 20:15) as any that took place in Old Testament times.
