MURDER WIFE, THEN SUICIDES

No Motive Found for Suicide of Earl J. Cline, and Murder of Wife.

Earl J. Cline, aged 48, shot and killed his wife, of three months, Elizabeth, 46, Monday night, about 9:30 p.m., and then turned the gun on himself. The bullet entered his head back of the right ear.

The wife was shot in the head and died immediately, but Cline was breathing when he was discovered. The scene of the tragedy, he died a few minutes after being admitted to the Mansfield General Hospital. After investigations were made by police it was stated that no motive for the crime could be discovered. Coroner H. B. Schreiner was unable to determine the cause of the shooting, but believes that several things may have entered into the killing.

About one week ago, Mrs. Cline informed relatives that she feared for her own life, and that her husband had threatened to commit suicide. Officers Jesse Schwab and Paul Whipp were sent to the home after a neighbor had reported the shooting. Other officers were detailed to the house when the murder was made known. The body of the woman was found in the middle of the street, and Cline was discovered near it. The Cline home was located on High School, and it has not yet been determined why the two were on Miller street.

Cline married Elizabeth Burdine on December 7, 1928, and had lived in Mansfield about three months. Both had been married before. Though Cline had worked in Mansfield, he had lived in Shelby until his second marriage. Surviving him are his parents, two sons, Charles and Frank, and a daughter, Mrs. Edward Powley, of Mansfield, a brother, Roy Cline, of Shelby, and a sister, Mrs. Harry Blund, of Plymouth.

Funeral services for Cline were held Thursday afternoon at the Burdine home in Shelby, with burial in the Shelby cemetery, while services for Mrs. Cline were held at 2:30 Thursday afternoon from the John S. Jones Co. in Mansfield. The Rev. Mr. Snyder, of the Plymouth church, was officiating. Burial was made in the Mansfield cemetery.

170 To Be Graduated Friday at Ohio State

COLUMBUS—The winter quarter will end this week with final examinations and the graduation of a class of approximately 170 at Ohio State University.

Six students, all men, are prospective candidates for the degree of doctor of philosophy, the highest degree.

With the fields in which they have specialized, they are: James Franklin Lewis, DAYTON, organic chemistry; Vincent Harmon Morris, WOOSTER, botany; and those from COLUMBUS—Justin Lloyd Bussell, organic chemistry; Rodney Cecil, entomology; Harry William Cordell, business organization; and Virgil Wilks, economics.

Chas. Beatrice Imlay, CHEVY CHASE, MD., is the only prospective candidate for two degrees. She is completing the requirements for the degree of bachelor of arts and bachelor of science in education.

Another co-ed, Martha Belle Hollen, DAYTON, is the only prospective candidate for the degree of bachelor of landscape architecture.

The exercises will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the university chapel. The convocation address will be given by Prof. H. Gordon Hayes, of the department of economics. A reception for the class will follow.

ARMORED RUM BOAT CAPTURED BY GUARD

The Sambo G. of Port Stanley, Ontario, rum runner, was captured last week on Lake Erie by a coast guard cutter and taken into Lorain harbor.

The runner was steel-armored, and was carrying a large quantity of rum. It was captured. The coast guard cutter, CG-106, was stove in at the middle just above the water line where it was hit by the prow of the runner, ramming at full speed.

Frederic H. of Detroit, one of the hard battle was given before the boat was twice in the hail of bullets sent into the boat by the government riflemen and one-pounder. He was taken to a Lorain hospital, where his condition is reported as critical. His companion, Joe Hanna is held by Lorain police.

Capt. J. T. Hagrove, in command of the CG-106 sighted the rum runner about 15 miles off Cleveland. After due warning, pursuit was given. Tracer bullets bounced off the sides of the Sambo G. and one-pounders were used.

Huron County Man Democratic Candidate for Ohio Governor

Stephen M. Young, Cleveland attorney has announced his candidacy for Governor at the Democratic primary in August.

He served two terms in the General Assembly of Ohio and in 1918 was a prosecuting Attorney in charge of criminal prosecutions in Cuyahoga County. He resigned to enter the army and served until after the Armistice. He was Democratic nominee for Attorney General in 1922, being defeated by a very slim margin.

He is an aggressive campaigner and has shown remarkable strength as a vote getter, winning every Democratic primary contest for legislative, congressional and state office he has entered.

Young is 41. He, Mrs. Young and their three children live in Cleveland Heights. He was born on a farm in Huron County, was educated in Norwalk public schools, Kenyon College and Western Reserve University Law School.

He is a progressive Democrat. Recently he denounced "so-called Democrats in Congress, who claiming to worship at the shrine of Thomas Jefferson, vote with the American Legion, 40 and 8, Knights of Pythias and Elks."

THIEVES LOOT STUCKEY GARAGE IN GREENWICH

GREENWICH—Loot valued at \$100 was taken from the M. D. Stuckey garage by burglars Thursday morning.

Auto and truck tires, castings and inner tubes, a clock and a spotlight were loaded by the thieves into an auto in the garage and driven to another waiting car where the loot was transferred and the thieves made their getaway. Harry Crum, Greenwich garage worker, saw the men leaving the loot to their car but before he could reach them they had driven away.

Huron co. sheriff and his deputies are tracing the theft with but little hope of finding the burglars.

GREENWICH MAN IS CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

NORWALK—Charles A. Crum of Greenwich announced his candidacy for sheriff at the primaries on the Republican ticket.

Mr. Crum is a member of the Greenwich Village Council. He has been proprietor of a garage in that village for the past fourteen years and an auctioneer since he was 18 years old.

PRIMARY ELECTION FALLS ON AUGUST 13 FOR 1930

The date of the state primary election this year falls on August 13. That many people are interested in this election is evidenced by the fact that candidates are, this early, calling on Secretary of State Clarence J. Brown for supplies of declaration of candidacy forms, with the accompanying blanks, for circulation in their respective areas.

Anticipating this and sensing an increasing interest in Ohio's election laws and special rulings thereon proceeding with a recodification of Ohio laws governing exercise of suffrage rights. A feature of this recodification will be the incorporation thereof in attorney general opinions on these laws, together with court decisions and special rulings thereon made by secretaries of state since the last codification.

ROME WOMAN KILLED IN THURSDAY ACCIDENT

Rose Prichia Hisey, aged 63 years, of Rome, was killed instantly Thursday night when the horse and buggy she was driving was hit by Peter Leach, of Mansfield.

The accident occurred a few miles east of Greenwich center, near Shenandoah. The driver has been exonerated from blame by Richmond county officials as the buggy was without lights, and Leach was blinded from the lights from another car.

Miss Hisey had been visiting in Greenwich. She was well known in southern Richmond county, near Shenandoah. Four brothers and a sister survive.

Funeral services were held Saturday from the Shenandoah church. Rev. Turner Holt officiating.

Two Accidents Occur in Plymouth Village on Friday Afternoon

Two automobile wrecks featured the day's news around Plymouth last Friday, even though it wasn't the thirtieth.

First, F. B. Carter, driving a La Salle and Fred Colyer in a Dodge car, came together at the corner of High and Plymouth streets, badly damaging the latter machine, while the Carter car received a few minor scratches about the front fender and had the bumper badly bent.

W. A. F. Donenwirth attempted to turn around in front of the Babcock house on Sandusky street, his machine was struck by a Mr. Cline of Shelby. The accident, it is stated, was unavoidable on Cline's part, as he was forced to hold his position by an oncoming machine. Donenwirth's car was badly damaged, the rear fender and rear wheel being smashed, as well as the bumper. The Cline machine suffered a badly wrecked radiator and other damages.

It might be well at this time to call attention to the records of double parking on Sandusky street in front of the new High School. A village ordinance calls for parking lights in this zone, and it has been observed from time to time, that many car owners do not obey this ruling. Excuses have been made against the practice of double parking, and to avoid congestion at this point officials should look into the matter.

WILLARD SUES OHIO POWER COMPANY

WILLARD—Suit was filed in Huron common pleas court at Norwalk, asking that an order be issued, restraining the Ohio Power Co. from selling current to other customers of the village of Willard.

The suit was filed for the village of Willard by Solicitor L. S. Wise and Attorney Frank Carpenter. This case is the outgrowth of a battle being waged by the board of public affairs here and the power company which is selling current to the Pioneer Rubber Co. plant here.

The rubber concern claims it can buy power more cheaply from the defendant company than from the village, and current from that company was turned on in the plant here Monday.

The board of public affairs says it will withdraw its wiring and equipment from the plant immediately.

Fifth Death Occurs in Family of Thirteen

The fifth death in a family of eleven children occurred Friday morning when Baby Rose Teresa, the year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Harison, died.

Death followed a two month's illness due to pneumonia. The body was taken to Miles' Chapel for burial preparations. Funeral services were held Sunday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon from the North Auburn church, and burial was made in the North Auburn cemetery.

The Harison family resides west of Plymouth, and Mr. Harison is associated with the Farmer's Farm Company. Besides the parents, six children, five sisters and a brother, survive Rose Teresa.

WILLARD MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL TO HOLD DEDICATION EXERCISES

Willard's new Municipal Hospital have set aside Saturday, Sunday and Monday, March 20th and 21st as the official opening dates and a welcome invitation is extended to the general public. Sunday afternoon a speaker of prominence will give an address in connection with the regular dedication exercises. Visiting hours will be from 1 till 8 p.m.

The merchants of Willard have designated March 20th as "Merchants Day" when food-stuffs of various kinds will be contributed to the hospital.

It is quite unusual for a town the size of Willard to own a municipal hospital and the citizens are justly proud of this accomplishment.

LAST RITES HELD FOR B. CRISWELL

Death Occurs Early Sunday After Three Days Suffering Due to Paralytic Stroke

Funeral services for the late B. F. Criswell, were held Tuesday afternoon at the home, with Rev. J. W. Miller, pastor of the local Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment was made in Oakland cemetery, Shelby.

Mr. Criswell suffered a stroke of paralysis last Thursday morning at his home, and death came early Sunday. The deceased was well known, and for the past three years had been in failing health.

Coming to Plymouth 46 years ago, Mr. Criswell was engaged in the tinning and plumbing business until the recent years of his life. He operated a creamery here. He was well known throughout the community and those who knew him best held a high regard for him. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, and was a devoted attendant. He was a man of high ideals, and he possessed a gentle disposition which many admired.

The deceased leaves besides the widow, two children, one son, Leon Criswell of Cassopolis, Mich., and one daughter, Mrs. Edna Andrews of Norristown, Pa., and two grandchildren, Mrs. Burton Rivers of Pittsburgh, and Lazzelle Criswell of Cassopolis, also a great grandson, Thomas Charles Criswell.

The passing of Mr. Criswell removes another one of Plymouth's well known residents.

THE CHRIST WE KNOW; THE CHRIST OF THE CROSS

thought along the subject of Christ,
the meaning of His life, and the com-
ments which have been made con-

of the best sellers of religious books,
a volume, with the title, "THE MAN
NOBODY KNOWS." The book has
no marked literary value nor has it
a spiritual message. This volume
claims to contain a new discovery
concerning our blessed Lord. The
writer of "THE MAN NOBODY
KNOWS" declares that our Lord was
not a "kill-joy" nor a "physical weak-
ling," but that "He was the most pop-
ular dinner guest in Jerusalem." He
describes Him as "THE OUT OF
DOOR MAN, THE SOCIABLE MAN, A
GREAT ADVERTISER AND A
GREAT BUSINESS MAN." More so-
ber than all this is the fact that the
author states, whenever he can, at
the very heart of Christianity. That
heart is the CROSS OF CHRIST and
His substitutionary Sacrifice. Take
the Cross of Christ in its true mean-
ing out of Christianity and Christian-
ity becomes a lifeless and powerless
religious system. One quotation suf-
fices to demonstrate the denial of
this great essential truth of the Gos-
pel and how the author despises the
declaration "that Christ died for our
sins." On page 59 we find the fol-
lowing:

"Thomas Paine remarked truly that
no religion can be really divine which
has in it any doctrine that offends the
sensibilities of a little child. Is there
any reader of this page whose child-
ish sensibilities were not shocked
when the traditional explanation of
the death of Jesus was first poured
in his ears? Would any human father
loving his children, have sentenced all
to death, and been persuaded to com-
mute the sentence only by the suffer-
ing of his best beloved?" The
book leads us to believe that he does

not know Christ at all. The Christ
we know is a different Christ. God's
people know Him as the Eternal
Christ. In spite of all modernistic
infidelity which utters its miserable
inventions, God's true people still hold
fast to the great confession of Peter,
"Thou art the Christ, the Son of the
Living God." We know Him as the
Incarnate Son of God, the Christ who
was born of a Virgin, who was crad-
led in Bethlehem's manger, who liv-
eth as the Perfect Man, a holy, sin-
less life on earth. We know Him as
the perfect Teacher, the revealing
Christ. We too cry out with Peter:
"Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou
hast the words of Eternal Life." We
know Him as the sacrificing Christ
who died for our sins, who bore our
sins in His own body on the tree.
What can wash away our sins? Our
character? Our attempts to follow
Jesus? No! Nothing but the blood
of Jesus. Can the conception of Jesus
as a BUSINESS MAN, as a LEADER,
or ADVERTISER, or SOCIABLE
MAN, give our consciences rest and
bring us nigh to God? No! Nothing
but the blood of Jesus.

We know Him as the risen Christ.
The book "THE MAN NOBODY
KNOWS" ends with a brief mention
of His death, but not one word about
His resurrection. True believers
know that Christ arose and that they
are risen with Him. We know Him
as the living, the interceding Christ,
in whose worthy and all-availing
Name we come to God. We know
that He liveth, for our prayers in His
name are answered, and in sorrow,
bowed down with the cares and bur-
dens of life, we know Him as our bur-
den-bearer, who sustains and keeps
His people. We know Him as the Tri-
umphant Christ. In spite of all op-
position to Him He has triumphed in
every age, and His greatest triumph
is yet to come, when Heaven opens
and He returns. As He approaches,
Christian people should search the
Scriptures and learn more about the
Christ of the Cross.

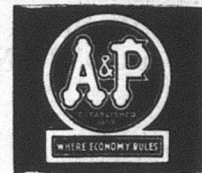

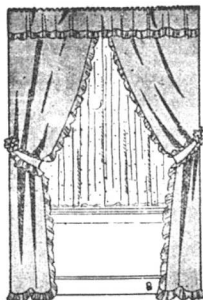

JOHN WINTHROP

John Winthrop was born at Groton, Suffolk, England, in 1587. He graduated from Trinity College Cambridge about 1605 and became a lawyer. He was a Puritan and in 1630 was elected Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Company. The next year he headed the great migration to Massachusetts, landing at Salem and settling at Boston. He was governor of the colony and being a very capable man he helped to promote the colony to a state of great importance among the thirteen colonies. He was re-elected Governor at all elections up to 1634, and afterwards in 1637-40, 1641-43, 1644-45. He died in Boston, March 26, 1649, after a very memorable life.

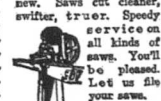
