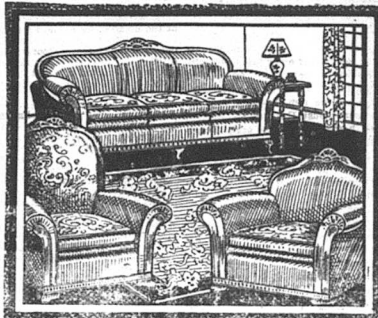

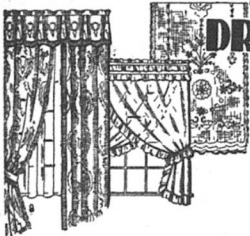

Matthew Arnold's definition of culture "the acquainting ourselves with the best thoughts that have been known and said in the world," embodies many of the essentials in modern education. The ability to appreciate and enjoy a drama of Shakespeare, a painting of Millet, or a song of Caruso's, means the possibility of noble pleasure, and of leisure time well spent, instead of possible waste, or, even worse, degradation and weakness, result.

Many think that the school should train individuals in the technique involved in the creation of the arts rather than in the appreciation of Art. This phase of education is left to the technical school rather than to the Public School. The varying classes of intelligence and abilities, and ages of youth with which the Public Schools have to deal makes this utterly impossible. Specialization in most lines of education should not start beyond the first years of college training. It is therefore a vital part of the work of the Public Schools to give opportunity for and to encourage in every way possible the development of the power to appreciate the work of the masters.

No one will ever learn to appreciate music, literature, or art because some one tells him that he ought and that this is worthy and that unworthy. On the other hand, the best guarantee of development along these lines is found in association with those who genuinely appreciate, and in coming in contact with masterpieces of real art which have endured the criticism of the ages. To give the pupils of the Plymouth Schools and the people of Plymouth the opportunity of seeing and admiring the world's greatest paintings is the aim and object of the Art Exhibit to be held in the Plymouth High School Auditorium next Thursday evening at 7:30 P. M. An inspiring and intellectual program will also

be given consisting of readings, and music by out of town and local talent. The community should certainly take advantage of so rare an opportunity at so reasonable admission rates as 25c for adults and 15c for children of school age.
