SHOES

LIFELONG RESIDENT OF COUNTY BURIED SATURDAY

Funeral services for William A. Pittenger, 67, were held Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Franklin M. E. church of Shelby, Rev. D. B. Young, of the First Lutheran church officiating. Burial was made in the Franklin cemetery.

The deceased died at his home at midnight, April 15, located three miles southeast of Shelby on the Hartman farm. Death was reported due to heart trouble, from which he had suffered during the past year.

Surviving is the widow and the following children: Mrs. Allen Pugh, Curtis Pittenger, Mrs. Arthur Hughes, Mrs. Arthur Pugh and Mrs. William Shoup, all of Mansfield, Waldo W. Mr. Pittenger was born in Richland county in October, 1862, and lived his entire life in the community in which he died. He was educated in the county schools, and afterwards took a normal course at Ada. He taught during the winter months, and followed the agricultural work in the summer. Mr. Pittenger taught 12 terms at the Light school house.

WELLINGTON HAS ITS BOOTLEGGERS OF MILK

Wellington made its first definite move to wage war against the bootleg milk dealers of the city. It is alleged that more than 50 citizens are being supplied with raw milk. Less than half the number hold permits to use raw milk.

It is in direct violation of the ordinance requiring the pasteurization of all milk and cream sold within the corporation limits and action will be taken against the sale.

Many of the dealers in question were reported to not be observing the requirements of the County Board of Health. Most of the bootleggers are doing business on a small scale. The practice is to be curbed, by action taken, as a matter of health protection and in fairness to the legitimate dealers.

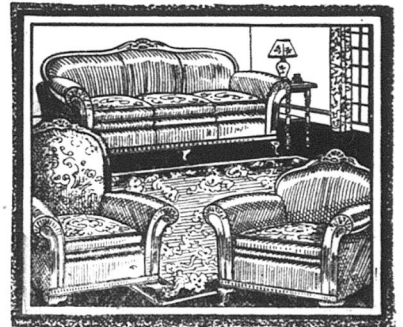

The city of Bellevue, the Huron county commissioners, the two railway companies concerned at the crossing, and the state highway department have agreed to defray the usual proportionate shares. It is not likely that the abandoned part of No. 20 including the triple grade crossing will be used as a detour while the cut-off is under construction.

This particular section where No. 20 crossed two railroads and an interurban line has been the scene of several traffic accidents. It was eliminated last summer by a temporary cut-off road.

GAS MAY BE FOUND BY DRILLERS AT NORWALK

The firm of W. H. Whitman & Sons, manufacturers of extracts, is drilling for gas in Norwalk on East Main street. It is expected that gas bearing limestone rock will be struck at about 400 feet.

Simon Mackert drilled in an excellent gas well in the rear of his home at 23 Woodlawn a short time ago, and since that time various gas wells have been made. No wells of exceeding large size have been reported, but the drilling of the wells has been successful for the small consumer. The leading gas center of the county is in Peru twp. It is reported that of 50 wells drilled in that district about 90 per cent developed gas enough for domestic use.

The favorable factor of the gas situation in this county is the lasting power of the wells, for 25 years old wells are still producing with unabated force and volume.

The drop of the volume in a number of the wells has been remedied by a general cleaning out. The principle drawback is the quality. Gas found in Huron county is a high sulphur content that causes discoloration of silverware and other articles.

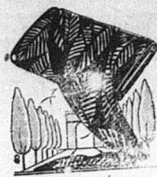

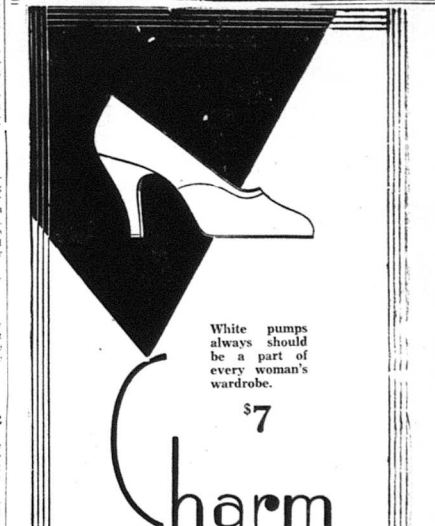

COUNTY TO BACK SPECIAL SCHOOL ON MARSHLAND

WILLARD—Plans have been completed by the Huron-co. board of edu-

cation to establish a new sort of school at New Pittsburgh to care for the children in the marsh land south of here.

The children who will attend this school are from the families of Kootenians, Italians and Hungarians who work in the onion fields owned by the Farmers Farm Co. of Chicago, Ill.

Plans for the school were made after Superintendent Bell and officials from the state education department at Columbus made a survey of the New Pittsburgh district last winter when the situation there was most acute.

They found conditions as bad as reported with families existing in subzero weather, without food, clothing or fuel, and most of the children kept out of school.

The Huron-co territory to be included in the new school will be the southeast portion of Richmond-twp. and the southwest part of New Hamburg-twp. Crawford-co. territory has not yet been definitely decided upon.

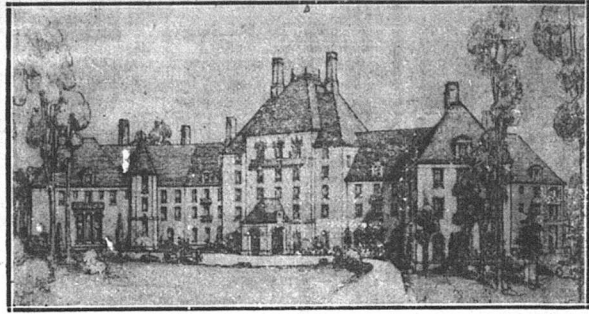

SAN FRANCISCO: Under articles of incorporation already filed with the Secretary of State of California, permanent trustees took over on March 26 the ownership of the property and buildings which are to accommodate the Christian Science Benevolent Association for Pacific Coast. The Association, which will open its doors to guests about the middle of May, was established in accordance with Section 3 of Article I of the Manual of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.

MOTOR VEHICLE BUREAU GIVES SPLENDID REPORT

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 24.—That the Bureau of Motor Vehicles is the fastest growing branch of the state's government and that in 1929 but two counties of the state's 93 showed a decrease in passenger car ownership in that year are the salient points of a comprehensive report of the bureau's activities made this week to Secretary of State Clarence J. Brown by Commissioner Chalmers B. Wilson. In commenting on this report Secretary of State Brown points with pride to the huge increase in revenues shown in 1929 over the preceding year in an amount of over one million dollars, this in spite of the fact that no increase has been made in the working personnel of the bureau. During the past year total revenues of \$12,951,232.16 were collected by the bureau, compared with \$11,840,258.94 in 1928. The sale of licenses alone brought in \$12,325,575.10 in the past year as against \$11,547,304.65 in 1928. The following comparative figures show the respective increases made in the various classes of motor vehicles: 1929, Passenger, 1,550,721; Commercial, 205,274; Motorcycles, 1,849; Trailers, 19,248; Sidecars, 1,860; 1928, Passengers, 1,450,947; Commercial, 198,705; Motorcycles, 2,053; Trailers, 14,005.

All three of these corporations are independent from a legal point of view they are under the control and supervision of The Christian Science Board of Directors.

The California property, known as Arden Wood, is a thickly timbered, 16 acre, piece of rolling land situated on the edge of San Francisco, its general location being between Twin Peaks and the Ocean. The Sanatorium is sheltered from the prevailing winds by the hill which forms the principal topographical feature of the property. No public roads or ways cross it, but paths will be arranged extending from the Sanatorium through the woods, making a feature of a small ravine which runs along the east boundary.

The Sanatorium, designed by Henry H. Gutterman, Architect, is of steel and reinforced concrete done in a modernized Breton style, with high central pavilion, tall, classic

Sidecars, 2,653. License plates in Ohio are placed in the hands of deputy commissioners in the various counties at a cost of eighteen cents per set, of which amount ten cents covers the cost of manufacture and packing and eight cents the bureau's cost for handling and shipping.

The Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles is generally conceded to be the most economically conducted motor vehicle bureau in the United States.
