

Quarry Claims First Victim as Gilbert Kalb Drowns

C. R. Beel Finds Body of Youth As Many Dive Futilely In 15 Foot Hole

For the first time in its history, the Quarry has claimed a human life, extinguishing a vital spark in its relentless grasp. For almost thirty years a drowning has been prophesied. Tuesday evening around 7:30 o'clock, the tragedy occurred as Gilbert Kalb sank 15 feet to the bottom of the small quarry.

The victim's life was ended at the age of 15 years. The exact cause of Kalb's death will probably never be known. He had not been in the water for two years and though not an experienced swimmer, the young man had crossed the small pool and was returning. Without a cry of warning he disappeared and did not come again to the surface. Kalb had complained Sunday of pain near his heart and a heart attack was the verdict rendered by witnesses of the accident and the doctors called to the scene. However, he had eaten an unusually hearty supper only a short time before going to the Quarry.

His companions, Carl Robinson, Al Markley, and Arthur Myers, all of Plymouth, immediately began diving to aid him as Mrs. A. Myers called that the man had gone under. Though Robinson found the body at the bottom of the hole, he was unable to lift it. C. R. Beel, of Willard, who had been swimming in another section of the Quarry, succeeded in bringing Kalb to the shore. Artificial respiration was tried without success. A pullmotor, brought to Plymouth by the Shelby fire department failed to revive the man.

Realizing that the body was drowned but at least with life extended, so it is not thought that Kalb could have been revived with (Continued on Page 8)

Board of Education May Lease School Bus

The interest of the public in the problem of school buses is again brought to the fore as Attorney General Gilbert Bettman gave the ruling in regard to bus leasing.

A board of education may legally lease a school bus for two or three years if the board deems such action is for the best interest of the schools under its control.

After a contract of lease for three years has expired, which contains a clause granting the board the option to buy the bus, the purchase may be made, provided that such a lease holds a rental for the use of the bus. The contract cannot be a contract of purchase signed as a lease.

This system would not necessitate a bond issue for the purchase of buses as by boards who deem the action advisable. Over a period of three years, the buses could be purchased out of money paid an individual for transportation, and a saving could be made in addition.

PIONEER ENDS DIVIDENDS TO MEET WAGE PAYMENTS

The stockholders of the Pioneer Paper Company were recently notified the following statement: "Under existing conditions, your directors believe the best interest of the company will be conserved at this time by deferring further dividends. The operation of keeping our business in operation in order that as many people as possible may draw wages is the first consideration."

The Pioneer has had a steady and good business, and has been able to retain practically all forces for work. Besides the plant at Willard, there is a factory at Attica.

FARMER RAISES 245 BU. WHEAT ON FIVE ACRES

To Arthur Leber of Haron county goes the honor of having raised the record crop of wheat for this year. Last fall he sowed 245 bushels of wheat on five acres. It would easily run nearly 50 bushels to the acre, and is of high grade. Last fall Leber plowed under a fine base of manure, which was very good. He had a good effect on the ground. Though agricultural reports have stated that the average wheat yield would be low, John Clarke, superintendent of the County Home, states that the yield on his farm was thirty bushels to the acre, of good quality.

NORWALK GHOST STEALS APE'S POPULARITY AS CEMETERY IS WATCHED

There should be any number of authors in the vicinity of Norwalk, if the scope of the imagination can be judged. Since the ape has seemingly wandered away, people at Norwalk have a "ghost" for their present pet.

A dozen residents of the vicinity of Woodlawn cemetery having seen an apparition walk the paths and graves of the burial grounds around 10 o'clock at night. This ghost apparently lacks training in the field of drama, for it refuses to wait until the stroke of ten.

Night watchman at the city water works sounded the horn of their machine after locating the ghosts on the road near the mausoleum. The ghost made an unidentified dive for the sidewalk, proving that extinction is feared even after death. Police are of an opinion that the ghost walks to discourage the practice of parking cars in or near the cemetery late at night.

Muck Saves Two Fliers as Plane Crashes

Although they fell 500 feet when their Curtiss biplane nose-dived on Sunday, John T. Kelly, Jr., 24, pilot, and Max Stevens, 22, student flier, both of New London, suffered only minor bruises.

The young men were saved from more serious injuries because their plane chose to land on the soft muck of the Willard marshes just south of here. The plane had just taken off from the Willard airport when it hit an air pocket. Spectators at the airport saw the crash and ran to the aid of the pilot and his student.

NEW SURGEON AT WILLARD COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

For the past 15 months he has been working with Dr. Page Edmunds, eminent surgeon at the University of Maryland and chief surgeon for the Baltimore and Ohio railway company.

Mrs. Limbach, who was Miss Greta Cecelia O'Shaughnessy of Dublin, Ireland, is a graduate of a nursing school in Dublin and of Johns Hopkins School of Nursing, Baltimore. She will assist her husband in his work at Willard.

They were married at the home of C. W. Galloway, first vice president of the Baltimore and Ohio, at his home in Baltimore on June 30, and since have been travelling in the New England states and Canada.

MONROEVILLE SCHOOL BD. MAY ERECT NEW BUILDING

It has been reported that the Monroeville Board of Education is contemplating giving the voters another opportunity of deciding the question of a new school building.

The present structure is too small to accommodate the number of students that apply for an education. The school enrollment has been increased, and some more must be made.

LAKE ROAD MOVED TO PREVENT WAVE EROSION

The new route is laid between the N. Y. & C. railway and the L. S. & E. tracks, but is not satisfactory to the property holders who will petition for relief.

Treaties Neglected for Tariff Measure

Commercial Treaties Stand Still For Eighteen Months

All the results of the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill are not confined to boomers which are continually coming back since the schedule went into effect.

The necessary work of negotiating commercial treaties with twenty-five countries has been at a standstill during the eighteen months discussion of the tariff bill, although most of those now in effect are over 75 years old.

Italy has increased her tariff on small cars from 10 percent to 120 percent, and is sending an industrial commission to Russia to arrange for the Soviet with aviation, military and naval goods, as well as to provide for general increases in Italy-Russia trade. The sentiment is "It is only so to buy raw materials and other products from countries purchasing our goods."

Spain has signified her approval of the Briand plan for an economic union of European states. Great Britain has placed an embargo on Virgin, Is-grown apples saying that it is not a retaliatory measure. Paul Gerber, head of the French dressmaker's syndicate states that France may have to establish her factories in the U. S. to avoid the tariff duties.

While protesting against our tariff, France shows her readiness to cooperate with us on prohibition even against her own economic interests. Recent word reports that France has agreed to prevent the use of islands off the Newfoundland coast as a base for liquor-smuggling.

LIBRARY HAS RECORD MONTH IN JUNE

The month of June was a record-breaking month for the Library when 732 books were taken out. July promises to equal or even better that record when 844 books were taken from the shelves in one evening.

Special attention is called to the extra good list of children's books, for the primary and intermediate grades, that have been received from the Mansfield Library and comprise 100 of the best books.

New additions to the Library include "The Great Meadow" the story of the Pioneer trail across Kentucky, by Elizabeth Roberts; "Liberty" by Everett Dean Martin and Galloway's record. New rentals to be placed on the shelves over the week end are "Honor Girl" by Grace Livingston Hill; "Vision of Desires" Margaret Pedler and "Cythera," J. S. Herzogheim.

The Library continues to grow and gain in popularity each week and since quartered in their new location many new patrons have been added to the list.

COUNCIL ASKS WEEDS BE CUT

Ordinance Passed Requesting Property Owners To Cut Grass and Weeds

Civic pride in Plymouth village has resulted in the neat appearance of the majority of the homes in the residential district, but as in every case, there are a few that mar the record.

The impression that visitors and tourists receive, is usually made by the appearance of the lawns and gardens that border the streets. Why not boost Plymouth by giving care to your property?

At the village council meeting Monday night it was decided that those who have refused to cooperate are to be reached by the passing of an ordinance, given as follows:

REQUESTING WEEDS AND GRASS BE CUT

Whereas several property owners have failed to cut the grass and weeds upon their properties and such grass and weeds are rapidly going to seed, it is the order necessary for the public health, convenience and welfare that immediate relief be obtained and because thereof an emergency is hereby declared to exist, now therefore:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HUDSON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES, OHIO,

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the owner or occupant of any lot or parcel of land in the Village of Plymouth to keep all weeds and grass cut on such lot or parcel of land and also on the space in front of such lot or parcel of land between the sidewalk and curb line.

Section 2. In case any owner or occupant of any lot or parcel of land in the Village of Plymouth shall fail to keep the grass and weeds on and in front of such lot or parcel of land cut and trimmed, as provided in the next preceding section, it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to notify in writing the owner or occupant of such lot or parcel of land that the grass and weeds thereon must be cut within a given time to be stated in the notice. The time shall not exceed 10 days and in case such notice is not complied with within such time, it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to cause said grass and weeds to be cut and trimmed and the expenses thereon shall be charged to the owner or occupant of said lot or lots and in default of payment thereof the same shall be assessed and certified to the County Auditor for collection as special taxes and assessment.

Section 3. This ordinance, being an emergency measure, shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

Disabled Pensioned Through A. Legion

Form Blanks Held by Commander Wechter For Application

Mr. Wm. Wechter, Commander of Elbert Post No. 447, The American Legion, announces that he has received from The American Legion, Department Headquarters at Columbus, a supply of the proper forms to make application for pensions granted to disabled World War soldiers by the Act of Congress of July 3rd.

All World War veterans who have a disability which is rated twenty-five percent or more according to the standards of the Veterans' Bureau, are entitled to a pension under the new law providing their disability is not the result of personal misconduct.

There are many other phases of the new law and the local service officer is prepared to talk over the problems of all former service men, regardless of whether or not they belong to The American Legion, and to help them make the proper application.

Pensions when granted start from the date the application is made and Commander Wechter is anxious that all former service men in this community contact the Service Officer at once.

4-H Clubs to Have Larger Enrollment

Enrollment of 4-H clubs in Ohio is expected to exceed 37,000 this season. Preliminary reports from county extension agents point to an enrollment larger than that of last year, when 36,000 boys and girls from eight to 20 years of age, enrolled in clubs in every county in the state, declares W. H. Palmer, state leader of 4-H clubs.

According to Palmer's estimates there were about 35,000 boys and girls in the state who are eligible to enroll in 4-H clubs. The present enrollment, he computes is about 11 percent of the possible enrollment, slightly more than one-third are boys.

For several years about eighty percent of the original enrollment has come from the first year of the season, which includes the raising or making of a product and later exhibiting it publicly and writing a story of the achievement.

Every state in the Union and Hawaii have 4-H clubs. The enrollment for this year is expected to exceed 350,000.

M. PERLSTEIN CONFESSES JUDGMENT FAVORING BANK

Max Perlstein confessed a judgment in common pleas court in favor of the First National Bank of Shelby in an amount of \$1,074.50 claimed due on a note according to a journal on try in file record.

Attorney C. J. Anderson was counsel for the plaintiff in the case.

SCHOOL YARD GRADING LET TO SHADE AND DELLEVARE

A contract for the grading of the high school yard was let Tuesday evening at the meeting of the school board. Shade and Dellevare of Shelby were given the work, the decision being favorable to the lowest bidder.

The work will begin next Monday and will be completed in three weeks. All members of the board were present at the meeting.

COMPLAINT MADE AGAINST STORES DISCRIMINATING

A complaint has recently been made in Greenwich, that certain merchants have been discriminating among customers as to price.

Ample proof was given, but the party submitting the grievance would not reveal the business where the practice is being made. Whether intentional or unintentional, the business of Greenwich should not allow carelessness or discrimination to monopolize their methods.

The Get-Together Club which is sponsored by the Shiloh School for many years, formulated plans for the one this year which will be held Thursday, Aug. 21, in the school auditorium. A chicken dinner will be given in the evening.

There was a part of the business session which was held at the regular meeting of the club at the home of Mrs. Rowland McBride on Thursday. A large attendance was present to enjoy the pot-luck dinner at the noon hour.

TAX LEVIES IN EFFECT JAN. 1

One-mill Levies Will Be Inside Limitation When Amendment Becomes Effective

COLUMBUS, July 24.—The special one-mill tax levies for school district, libraries, and for road construction, which now can be levied outside the 15-mill limitation on taxes, will both come inside the limitation when the new tax amendment to the Ohio constitution becomes effective January 1, 1931, in the opinion of the constitutional law and drafting sub-committee of the Governor's Taxation Committee.

This opinion is contained in the first preliminary report of the committee on a search which also deals with the extent to which the amendment will nullify existing statutes permitting other levies outside the 15-mill limitation. The report points out that tax levies to retire road bonds issued or authorized prior to the date on which the amendment becomes effective will be outside the limitation, but that levies for those issued after January 1, 1931, will come within the limitation. The same is true as regards water works and refunding bonds.

Other opinions contained in the report are:

1. That the amendment does not nullify the statute for exempting forest lands from taxation.
2. That the constitutional provision that property of corporations "shall be subject to taxation on the same as property of individuals" remains in force and that it would be unsafe to assume that this same provision does not also prohibit favoritism to individuals as against corporations.
3. That a corporation franchise tax measured by net income would probably be held to be in substance an "income tax" and as such would have to be divided equally between the state and localities.
4. That any privilege tax levied on corporations engaged in a particular line of business, but not extended to individuals and partnerships engaged in similar business would be unconstitutional.

License Issued To 18,535 Physicians

The annual report of the Ohio State Medical Board which has been made to Governor Myers V. Cooper, discloses that 18,535 certificates have been issued to physicians and surgeons, 616 osteopaths, with 19 previously licensed for surgeons, 689 certificates to medical practitioners, 353 to chiropractors and 701 to midwives.

There was a total of 857 rejections for physicians and surgeons, 178 for osteopaths, 53 for chiropractors and 15 for chiropractors and 94 for midwives.

The number of accredited schools of nursing in the state is 73 with a bed capacity of 13,131 and a daily average of patients of 9,162, the number of student nurses being 4,152. The number of certificates issued to nurses since the passage of the law is 14,019.

The ninth anniversary of the establishment of the Willard First Baptist church, colored, is being observed this week by a series of meetings each evening including Sunday.

Rev. W. M. Sherman, pastor, is in charge of the services. Services will begin at 7:30 o'clock each evening. Several outside speakers will be featured. On Monday night Dr. E. McKenney will talk and on Tuesday, Rev. P. M. Redd will assist. Thursday evening will feature Attorney Wm. G. Burwell. Sec. R. R. Jenkins will give the history of the church on Friday night.

Colored pastors from Chicago, Mansfield, New London and other places will attend the services.

GIVEN FINE IN WILLARD COURT

Four fines were levied on liquor violators in Willard in mayor's court Friday morning, two being from Plymouth.

Alvin Slesinger, 64, Plymouth, was fined \$100 and costs. Slesinger was fined \$750 for selling liquor but was freed when the costs were paid.

John Hanick, 55, another Plymouth man charged with intoxication, was released after his fine of \$100 and costs.

Feeding Space for Pullets is Assured

It is almost impossible to estimate the damage done a flock of pullets by having insufficient hopper space. Often you will visit a flock and find about half the amount of hopper space necessary to take care of a given number of chicks.

Cannibalism is often caused by insufficient hopper space being provided for the birds. Chickens having a desire to eat will begin to peck at the ones eating at the hopper, the feathers will be injured, sometimes causing bleeding. As a result of this the birds get a taste of the blood and then a cannibalistic tendency becomes a vice.

For birds 10 to 20 weeks old, on range, at least a 7 1/2 foot hopper should be provided for each 100 birds. This will allow at least 15 feet of feeding space per 100 birds. When they go into the laying house in the fall of the year a 10 foot hopper should be provided for each 100 pullets.

It is also desirable to have a water fountain at each end of the trough so that the birds will not have to waste so much energy in going to other places in the house for their water supply. Remember that 55 per cent of the body weight of the bird is water and 55 per cent of the weight of the egg is water; therefore, it is very essential that the proper amount of feeding space and plenty of water be provided for the pullets and hens if maximum and economic egg production is to be expected.

AIRPLANE ANSWERS TO AUTO'S TROUBLE CALL

Real service was illustrated Thursday night by Bob Andrews, repair man at the Bourgeois airport, Shelby. Mrs. D. Horner, driving near Six Points, south of Plymouth when the engine suddenly refused to function. Being many miles from home, and in a strange neighborhood, Mrs. Horner called for assistance.

Andrews, who was at the Bourgeois airport responded to the call, threw a bit of tools into a plane, and by the time Mrs. Horner returned to her car, the repair man had landed in a gear by field and was fixing the car.

The plane lifted without difficulty and flew back to the port, while Mrs. Horner continued her evening ride.

MAN DIES AFTER HORSES TRAMPLE HIM UNDER HOOF

Ernest Hooper, aged 61 years, of Crawford county, died Friday after having been trampled and mutilated under the hoofs of two horses with which he was working.

The accident occurred on Thursday when the horses became frightened and ran away, throwing the victim under their hoofs. The man sustained internal injuries which resulted in death. Charles Krebs, a farm hand, attempted to stop the fun-aways, and received injuries in the shoulders and arms.

NORWALK WOMAN SUES FOR DIVORCE AND ALIMONY

Elizabeth Swope, of Norwalk, has brought suit against Charles E. Swope, of Willard for divorce and alimony, charging gross neglect, cruelty and infidelity.

The plaintiff asks temporary and permanent alimony through her attorney, Young and Young, of Norwalk, in view of the fact that she is in poor health and in need of support.

BONDS SOLD FOR FUNDS IN CO. ROAD PROGRAM

County Auditor Arthur S. Beck signed bonds Thursday which were sold Saturday morning to secure funds for Richland county's share of the Erie Railroad's crossing elimination on the Harding highway, west of Shelby, and the remainder of the county's share in the 1929 road program.

A sum of \$35,209 in bonds was issued for payment of the costs on the Harding highway under-pass, and a sum of \$63,500 in bonds will be issued for payment of the secondary road program of last year.

KEEP DOGS FROM KILLING SHEEP BY PROPER FEED

Dogs may be prevented from killing sheep by the simple remedy of providing them with enough food and water. This simple suggestion was given as a method to put an end to the slaughtering of sheep on Richland county farms.

County Dog Warden Albert Gray asserted that when dogs are allowed to go without food and water they become thirsty enough to search the country for water. The sight of sheep enrages them. Gray asserts that any farmer sighting a strange dog on his property has the right to shoot the animal.

AGED UNION SOLDIER DIES EARLY SATURDAY MORNING

William Gilchrist, a Union soldier who marched with Sherman Atlanta to the sea, passed away Saturday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. P. Bricker, in Shelby.

Gilchrist has been in failing health for some time and is aged 80 years. He retired but a few years ago from active work on his farm east of Shelby.

Surviving is one son, F. O. Gilchrist, of Lorain, a daughter, Mrs. Bricker, of Shelby, three grandchildren, a sister, Mrs. Forbes, of Ashland. The deceased was a member of the First Lutheran Church in Shelby.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the London church. Rev. D. Young, officiating. Interment was made in London cemetery.

IS BROADCASTING FROM THE BEYOND IMPOSSIBLE?

The death of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of Sherlock Holmes, and investigator of that supreme mystery, the world beyond, recalls the book recently published in America with the title "Is This Wilson?"

In this volume, Doyle is said to have found unmistakably Wilson's style and idealism. He was convinced himself that Wilson from the hereafter gave the message through the hand of Mrs. C. A. Dawson Scott.

Wilson's picture of the world beyond has much the flavor of the ideal Republican and Utopias which abound in the classics. It has nothing of the ghostly mistiness associated with what is spiritualism. And none is Wilson's partnership and impatience. There remains his humanitarianism and his immortal urge toward world peace. Two things he supposedly has found are the power and vitality of constructive purposes and the necessity of carrying through any project on which one has embarked. Public opinion is not a tyrant.

Bewildered Democracy might well profit by the message of a rejected leader.

152 O. S. U. STUDENTS FROM HURON AND RICH CO.

Every one of Ohio's 88 counties was represented during the school year of 1929-30 in the student body of Ohio State University, according to the annual report of Miss Edith D. Cockins, registrar.

Richland county sent 91 students to the state college, and Huron representatives numbered 63.

TIRO VILLAGE COUNCIL ADOPTS BUDGET FOR 1931

The Tiro village council at their last meeting voted and adopted the budget for the ensuing year. The budget calls for an expenditure of \$1,554 in the general fund.

It is estimated that the balance at the end of the year will be \$286.55, leaving a net tax levy of \$1,297.45 for 1931. A new street lighting ordinance is again up for approval.

WINTER FEED PLANTED FOR U. S. BIRDS PREVENT HIGH STARVATION RATE

During the winter of 1929-30 the shortage of feed for birds was noted throughout the entire United States. Now is the time to plant patches of winter feed for them and prevent hundreds of thousands of the feathered friends from starving next winter, according to Carlos Avery, president of the American Game Protective Association with national headquarters here.

It is better to plant a large number of small patches than a few large patches. Buckwheat, Kaffir corn, oats, barley and such seeds should be planted, and will serve as cover as well as food. It is best to scatter seeds

along the creek banks, ditches and places not generally utilized for agricultural.

**BETMAN HOLDS GAS TAX

In the opinion of Attorney General Gilbert Bettman a municipality may use its portion of the gasoline and motor vehicle license taxes for the repaving of alleys dedicated to the public's use.

This opinion opens the way for the improvement of these valuable links of transportation which have become more popular because of the crowded thoroughfares.

Gasoline and motor vehicle tax monies might also be used for the construction, maintenance and repair of driveways of public parks when used as public streets and are open to vehicular traffic.

NOTICE TO PLYMOUTH VILLAGE DOG OWNERS

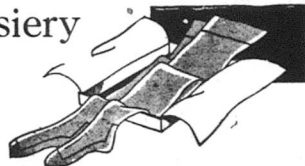
The attention of owners of dogs in Plymouth is called to an ordinance which provides that dogs shall be kept confined or muzzled from July 15 to September 15 of each year.

NOW, THE COURT

The Senate's ratification of the London naval treaty marks the president's first triumph on a major issue of foreign policy. The country applauds. Now comes the question of the World Court.

Mr. Hoover asked approval of the naval treaty as an American contribution to the move to make war less probable. As an even greater contribution to the same movement we believe he should ask the Senate to make this nation a member of the court.

The next opportunity the president will have to submit the issue to the Senate, barring another special session, will be in December. It may be anticipated that at that time or very soon thereafter he will ask approval of the protocol of adherence which will give the United States a membership in the court at The Hague.

In January, 1926, the Senate ratified the World Court agreement, but with reservations which left the controversy open and led to long negotiations with member nations of the court. Not until September, 1929, were these difficulties worked out and a form of protocol agreed on harmonizing with the Senate's objections and satisfactory to members of the court.

In his annual message to Congress last December, the president declared:

"The statute establishing the court has, by action of the nations signatory, been amended to meet the Senate's reservations and to go even beyond those reservations to make clear that the court is a true international court of justice. I believe it will be clear to everyone that no controversy on question in which this country has or claims an interest can be passed on by the court without our consent at the time the question arises. The doubt about advisory opinion has been completely safeguarded."

Our adherence to the International Court is, as now constituted, not the slightest step toward entry into the League of Nations.

With these assurances to the faint of heart, Mr. Hoover promised to submit to the Senate the amended court protocol "at some time when it is convenient to deal with it."

When the Senate next convenes a year will have passed since the president declared this purpose. Except for complications unforeseen, it is probable that the issue would have been brought to the floor before this. A delay beyond the next session, beginning in December, would be surprising in view of Mr. Hoover's attitude seven months ago and in view, further, of the Senate's decisive approval of the naval treaty.

Membership in the World Court will serve the same general purpose as entering into this treaty. Both steps are in the direction of substituting reason for fury in the affairs of nations.—Plain Dealer.

PROVING SUMMER IS SILLY SEASON

If there is need of any explanation for calling summer the silly season it is supplied this year in the epidemic of endurance contests. Each new stunt is a little sillier than the one before it.

The current eruption of endurance folly seems to have been inspired by the Chicago flyers, the Hunter boys—their name is not quite forgotten although it is a fortnight since they came down.

Flying a plane in circles for three weeks at least has the excuse, more or less valid, of having value to the study of aviation engineering. The same excuse, probably less valid, can be advanced for chugging around in an outboard motor boat.

But the interests of science are not served even remotely by sitting in a tree top or keeping a bicycle in motion until it falls apart or the rider falls off. These are the two most popular forms of enduring at the moment.

A kite flying Marathon and a surf board riding endurance contest were also reported yesterday and tomorrow will probably see new and sillier efforts.

A warning from the head of the health division of the National Safety Council may discourage a few tree-sitters. He tells parents of these youngsters that besides the danger of falling out and breaking heads or limbs, there is the possibility of electrocution by lightning or wires and the danger of mental and physical strain. His warning may do some good, but we doubt it. Three or four of the tree-sitters have already fallen with more or less serious injury.

A few firm paternal "nos" would do more than anything else to end tree-sitting, but these useful negatives are said to be out-moded and are becoming very scarce.

Still there is hope. We read that two 16-year-old girls in Peoria ended their tree sitting very suddenly. They saw their mothers coming with paddles.—Plain Dealer.

GASPARO MUCCIOS

Gasparo Muccio walked through the crowded streets of Milwaukee a couple of days ago, eyes forward vacantly. In his arms he carried wrapped in a faded blue blanket, the body of his infant son. There were tears in his eyes as he moved through the laughing crowds, stepping slowly, like an automaton. No one paid him heed.—Gasparo Muccio walking with his dead.

Up the steps of the morgue he walked. That was where people took their dead when there wasn't money enough to pay for burial. If he could just leave his baby boy there until he could get more money. But Gasparo Muccio need not worry. The County had a heart and a pocketbook. The highways and byways of Life are filled with Gasparo Muccios who go trudging along under burdens of sorrow, amidst the laughing throngs. Oftimes the voice that rings with laughter, is suddenly choked with the sob of anguish.

But along with all the selfishness and hardness of the world the good Lord, in His Wisdom, has buried deep in the hearts of men an undeniable strain of human sympathy and kindness that reaches out and helps shoulder the burden just as the load seems heavier than one can bear.

In this case Gasparo Muccio needed a friend and he found that which was a "friend" to him in time of need, in an agency of human society. Still how much the intimacy of a real friend would have meant to him. Life's road carries us down through the valleys, across the sweltering deserts and up over the sun-kissed mountain tops, and the man who can tread with firm step to the end of the journey is the man who can look back and see his pathway dotted with the deeds of tired and true friends.—Reflector-Herald.

WAKEMAN BRIDGE PLAN TO BE MADE BY STATE AT COST OF \$25-35,000

The cost of the Vermillion River bridge project at Wakeman has been roughly estimated from \$25,000 to \$35,000. Figures were submitted by authorities to the state highway department.

The bridge is to be increased in width from 20 to 40 feet. A survey has shown that the supporting arch system of the bridge is in excellent condition, the only defect being a yielding of the west curtain wall under pressure of the sliding earth fill. Two new concrete supporting arches will be erected. The work is to be done by the state.

One saw only sandrocks, and small mountains in the distance. A vast variety of the forest clouds was produced as the sun shone on the land.

The next important stop was at Holbrook, Arizona. A fellow passenger explained to me some of the wonder of the state. He began with the Grand Canyon, which is so vast that it is impossible to describe. It extends 217 miles in length, is from six to 13 miles in width, and is one mile deep—just a huge opening in the ground.

From the Canyon we go south and east to the Painted Desert, then follow the Little Colorado back to Holbrook. Though 19 miles from the petrified forests, some petrified wood could be seen from the car windows. My friend rather exaggerated, however, when he stated that while wondering one day, as to how such a thing could take place, he noticed a petrified bird sitting on a petrified limb on a petrified tree in a petrified forest, singing petrified songs in a petrified atmosphere.

The train continued on its way west. The next stop was Winslow, Arizona, where we had breakfast. The elevation at Flagstaff, Arizona is 7550. In the San Francisco mountains we sighted San Francisco Peak, about 14,000 feet high, above the timber line, but could not see the top because of fog and storm.

At Needles, California, on the Colorado river, the temperature ran up to 115 degrees at 9 p. m. I have visited only one other place hotter than Needles.

After about six weeks at Los Angeles, a time was spent at Long Beach. A fish boat, coming in one Sunday, brought a passenger who with pole and reel, had caught a Jew fish, that weighed 500 pounds. However, the fish is worth nothing. A gaff hook was used to land it.

From San Diego we traveled to Tuna, Mexico, which is some place. The principal idea is to get everybody's bank roll from the saloons, gambling devices, Spanish dancing girls, and cabarets.

The men were all dressed in the old style, bright and flashy, in velvets. The Ramona Mirage mission, one of the oldest in California was built near the year 1776. The structure was built by Indians directed by a Father Serra. A mission at St. Louis El Rey is in perfect condition. Several paintings, brought from old Spain are hanging on the walls.

The San Gabriel system of dams across the San Gabriel river, in the San Gabriel mountains, was interesting because of the name alone. A thunderstorm was experienced in Los Angeles in September. The cause was traced to a large forest and oil field fire not a great distance away. (Edward's adventures on hitchhiking home will be given next week.)

DELINQUENT OHIO TAXES EXCEED 1929 COLLECTIONS

At the report of the collection of delinquent taxes and rents due the State of Ohio for the first six months of 1930, it was found that the amount due is over six hundred thousand dollars.

This is an increase of \$110,280 over the corresponding period of 1929 and a substantial increase over the corresponding period of 1928. The largest amount collected was \$156,142 from gasoline taxes.

cramps. There was no evidence of a struggle, and it is supposed by many that the youth was dead before reaching the bottom.

After Kaib was pronounced dead by both Dr. S. S. Holtz and Dr. G. Searle, the body was taken to the Postle Funeral Home. The news of the accident spread rapidly and the futile efforts to revive life were watched by a large crowd that gathered despite the darkness and danger of unfamiliar paths.

Kaib has made his home in Plymouth for the past nine or more months, residing at the Tourists Inn. He was employed as section foreman on the A. C. and Y. railroad, and during his residence here has made many sincere friends who were horrified by his untimely and strange death.

The youth leaves behind to mourn the tragedy, his parents, John and Clara Kaib, of Chaffield, a sister, Lilian, and a brother, Wilmer, both at home, and other relatives. The shadow of sudden death will cover the little town for many weeks.

In the Lutheran church of Chaffield, services will be conducted Friday afternoon, with Rev. Dornbier in charge. The burial will be made in the Chaffield cemetery.
