RESOLUTION FOR DAIRY BENEFIT

R. 1930, whereby "that the unfair and ruinous competition which the dairy industry has had to meet since the internal revenue department's ruling of Nov. 13, 1930 committing the use of refined Palm oil in the manufacture of oleomargarine without the payment of the ten cents per pound tax be removed."

The institute was largely attended, especially on Friday evening, when by actual count the crowd numbered about 600. All the local parts of the program were well received. The industrial departments showed improvement over past years and an increased interest among the young people for a prize display.

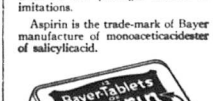

SCIENCE COLUMN

NARCOTICS AND THEIR EFFECTS
From 1920 to 1930 the number of drug addicts quadrupled. One ton of crude opium would be sufficient to supply the demands of medical and scientific worlds in America. But two hundred tons were smuggled into America.

The amount of morphine consumed is thirty-five times that required and we import ten times the amount of crude opium as Germany, France and Italy combined.

Few of those who begin using narcotics are fully aware of the aftermath. All narcotics demand larger and larger doses as time goes on. One-eighth of a grain is sufficient at the start. But by the end of a year, the addict requires from two to three grains to obtain the same results. The average dose of the morphine addict is from ten to thirty grains a day. Some dope fiends use as much as two hundred and fifty grains a day. Nearly four teaspoonsful, an amount sufficient to kill five hundred normal men.

The cost of this habit is enormous. An ounce of morphine or a similar narcotic smuggled into the United States is worth \$150, seven times its weight in gold. It costs the average addict from five to seven dollars a day to indulge in his habit, the sum increasing as he uses larger amounts. An addict taking two hundred and fifty grains a day would spend nearly \$75

a day or \$27,000 a year for rugs, alone. Where, unless the addict is rich, does the money come from? This is the relation between drugs and crime. Narcotics dull the mind and weaken the body so that the user is unable to earn an honest living and at the same time makes him desperate for money. Robberies, holdups, and murders can be traced to drugs.

Of the two hundred tons smuggled into America last year, 85 percent came through New York City. Detection is extremely difficult because the peddler can carry it anywhere, the person or in brief cases without arousing suspicion.

How can one tell a drug addict? In the early stages it is impossible. But later the signs are evident. The features are expressionless, indicating a lack of mental activity. The cheeks are sunken and the eyes are lustrous. The skin is either a waxy pallor or has a bluish appearance. The fingernails become brittle and chip off. The teeth soften and crumble. They lose weight and smoke cigarettes excessively. The blood pressure is above normal and the addict yawns every few seconds.

LIGHT IN THE HOME

Light in the home is coming more and more, to mean electric light and other kinds of artificial light. Lighting the home properly is a serious problem of today. Even if it were possible to light our homes with daylight, there would remain the problem of light at night.

The most efficient system of lighting is the direct, but it is also the most unhygienic, since the eye will tend to receive direct rays from the source. In the indirect system the light is cast in the indirect system the source is up and toward the walls and ceilings, where it is diffused and reflected. In the semi-indirect, the source is surrounded by a translucent globe which

tempts to diffuse the light without first reflecting it from a wall or ceiling. The semi-direct system is perhaps the most advantageous one, all things considered. As electricity is a common form of lighting every intelligent person should have some knowledge about it. Although the nature of it is not fully understood a few terms are quite clear. A fuse for example is used quite often. It is a piece of wire introduced in the wiring circuit, which melts at a much lower temperature than the permanent copper wire which brings the electric flow to the outlets. If the flow becomes greater than the maximum limit which the fuse wire can stand, the fuse wire will melt, then the circuit is broken. Fuses ranging from 5 to 15 amperes capacity are common in the home.

The practice of replacing the blown out fuse with a coin or other piece of metal is extremely dangerous. It means a sacrifice of safety of the moment. It is both illegal and unwise. Ruth Vanasdale.

Fifty Golden Years Christian Endeavor

Huron county will celebrate this golden jubilee with a banquet at Peru, Thursday evening at 6:15 for 50 cents per plate. All Endeavorers or any interested are cordially invited to attend. Rev. Tom Fred Campbell, state superintendent of Young People's Dept. of Christian Endeavor, will be the speaker.

The Golden Jubilee of Christian Endeavor renews a friendly feeling in the hearts of millions of persons around the world. People now well advanced in life will think back with gratitude to the contributions which came to them through Christian Endeavor in the days of their youth. Men and women in the prime of country where Protestant Christianity has found a way.

First Society
When Rev. Francis E. Clark, a young Congregational minister in Portland, Maine, organized the first Christian Endeavor society in the Williamson church on February 2, 1831, his little thought of the magnitude which the movement would assume in less than one half a century, but the society has so well met the needs of the church in providing for its young people that today a Christian Endeavor society may be found in every country where Protestant Christianity has found a way.

The evening of February 2, 1831 brought the young people of the "Williamson church" to the home of their young pastor and his wife. The evening was largely spent in explaining the organization and election of officers, including Granville Stephens as president, and so the first prayer meeting of the society was held two nights later, on Friday evening, Feb. 4. The new president was leader of that first

meeting, and after his brief opening, some forty minutes were left for the participation of the others. One after another took his or her modest part. Unconsciously, the society had begun to practice the modern psychological doctrine, "No imposition without expression." Christian Endeavor because the expressional agency of the church for training the young people. In 1837, the United Society started to publish as its official periodical "The Golden Rule" which has been published ever since, except that the name has been changed to "The Christian Endeavor World."

Headquarters in Boston.
The Christian Endeavor Union is at the World's Christian Endeavor Building located at 41 Mt. Vernon street, Boston, Massachusetts, the cornerstone of this building being laid with simple but impressive ceremonies at high noon on July 18, 1917.

In 1925, Dr. Francis E. Clark retired from active leadership in the International Society, and Dr. Daniel A. Poling, well known as minister, platform speaker and leader of young people, became his successor. At the death of Dr. Clark in 1927, Dr. Poling also was chosen president of the World's Christian Endeavor Union, and is looked to by young people in a hundred countries as their leader.
