Complete List of Premiums and Entry Blanks Now Ready; 8,000 Boys Are Eligible to Enroll.

The Ohio State Junior Fair is looming big for Aug. 31-Sept. 5, 1931. Many thousands of dollars will be paid in premiums to Buckeye boys and girls.

Approximately 6000 boys enrolled in 207 high school departments of vocational agriculture in Ohio are eligible to compete in the vocational agriculture and future farmers of America classes in this Junior Fair. As a part of their four year training these boys carry home projects in the various live stock, poultry and crop enterprises. Many boys get a start with pure-bred live stock and certified seed in their project work. It is the purpose of the classes in vocational agriculture to further encourage these boys to receive training in feeding and showing good live stock, produce and show examples of good crops to enjoy the excellent educational and inspirational opportunities incident to attending the Ohio State Fair. The number of classes and exhibitors have increased considerably each year. A farm shop class is being added this year in which departments may exhibit projects made in the school shop to be used on the home farms.

The future farmers of America department calls for exhibits by local F. F. A. chapters. This organization is national in scope and its membership consists of students of vocational agriculture. It has four major objectives in the development of farm boys: leadership, scholarship, farming ability, and thrift. Each exhibit will strive to portray some phase of F. F. A. work.

APPROPRIATE SUM FOR RELIEF

\$15,000 Released to Be Used in Helping School Children; Sum to Be Spent Over Wide Area.

The State Board of Control released \$15,000 to the State Department of Education to be used to supplement the \$50,000 fund appropriated for relief for school children by the Lowrey Bill. The original appropriation of \$50,000 has been distributed, according to Dr. J. L. Clifton, director of education, to 491 school districts in 46 counties, 9 cities, and 10 exempted villages, providing relief for 34,500 school children.

The additional \$15,000 will make it possible for the State Department of Education, in conjunction with the State Relief Committee to complete the relief work, and reach the children in those localities where there is urgent need for relief.

PROTEST IS LODGED AGAINST FARMS CO. ON REMOVAL OF FAMILIES

A protest charging that the Ohio Farms Co. has brought many families here to work in the muck lands, who become objects of charity for a large portion of the year, has been sent to the Farms Company by the New Haven Town Council.

The Farms Co. has been asked to guarantee that any and all families which are brought here through their office in the future will not have to be supported by the community.

F. VANASDALE COMMITS SUICIDE

Body Found Early Wednesday on Fenner Road With Gunshot Wound Near Heart; No Cause For Deed.

Frank Vanasdale, 69, well-known Plymouth man, committed suicide sometime early Wednesday morning by shooting himself with a double barrel shotgun. The body was discovered about 7:30 on the Fenner road by Cleo Griffiths who was on his way to work on a nearby farm. Indications point out that the gun was placed on the left chest, just below the base of the heart, and the victim used a gas measuring stick to aid in pulling the trigger. A hole about an inch in diameter, was made, and powder burns showed that the muzzle was at close range. The gun was double-barreled and both barrels had been discharged.

Mr. Vanasdale had been residing at the Cora Miller home and Mrs. Miller started out early Tuesday evening she requested Vanasdale to make purchase of groceries. He left the house apparently in the best of health and humor. About 11 o'clock the hall light was still burning and nothing was missed at the usual time early Wednesday morning when Mrs. Miller discovered the light still burning. About 7 o'clock Mrs. Miller notified W. H. Vanasdale, a brother, of the absence, and a search was begun at once. However, in the meantime, the body was discovered and Richland county authorities including Sheriff Underwood and Coroner James Biddle were notified.

At first it was thought that foul play might have taken place, but the fact that a watch, and a sum of money and a number of other personal belongings were in the clothing, and coupled with the position of the body and location of the wound made it evident that the deed was that of suicide. At just what time the act was committed no one knows. However, Mr. Griffith stated that when he passed the location Tuesday night about 10:30 there was no machine parked in the vicinity, and from the condition of the remains it is said that it was probably shortly after midnight when the victim did the rash deed. After the coroner's investigation the body was removed to the Postle Funeral Home for preparations.

The deceased was well-known in this immediate community, and followed the occupation of a farmer. He leaves one brother, W. H. Vanasdale, and three sons, Harry and Clarence of Oghrinn, Clifford of Elyria and one daughter, Mrs. Fannie Koschiak of Norwalk, besides several relatives.

Funeral services will be held at the Postle Funeral Home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

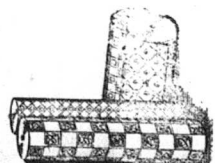

"In every case, at least two papers have been marked, and an honor rating given. This is what was promised. Some of the judges, however, also used the N. S. P. A. newspaper score book.*** Where the judges seem to have been more critical this year since scores, where the scorebook was used, run uniformly lower than formerly. If your score is lower, it is probably due to this, and not to any lowering in quality in your newspaper. If your rating is lower than, too, does not necessarily mean that the paper is poorer this year than last. It means only that it is standing still and other papers have slipped in ahead of it. So many more papers were entered this year than last that some of last year's simply had to move over to make room for the new comers." Progress has been shown and interest in the work of the association. This makes the challenge of the local paper that much more keen and our honor much more fitting. May our paper continue to grow and win higher awards next year.

A Little Relief for Farmers

The substitute House bill No. 7 which redistributes the gasoline tax, passed in the Senate April 9, with a remarkable vote of 25 yeas and one no. The bill as passed in the Senate provides that townships will receive 8-1/2 cents of the gas tax dollar. This is an increase of 3-1/2 cents. The organization of township trustees and clerks asked for five cents additional. With the increase added to what townships already receive, each township should be at the rate of \$2500 to \$2600 per year. Another notable feature of this bill is that the money all goes to townships to be spent on township roads. The law has now been changed so that trustees do not have to spend their gas tax money on county roads; it can be used for maintenance or construction. It is the consensus of opinion that real relief will come to rural Ohio because of the passage of the Secret-Bostwick bill. Officers are confident of the governor's signature.

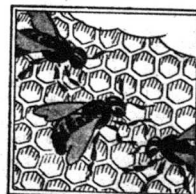

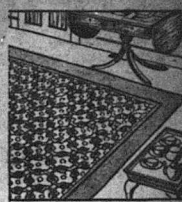
