Plenty of Turkeys For Two Thanksgivings

There is no need for anyone to worry about the supply of turkey for Thanksgiving day dinner this year, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture advices to the State Department of Agriculture.

Surveys completed September 20th indicate the turkey crop this year is 22 per cent larger than last year. Nearly 32,000,000 turkeys will be available for the holiday.

This is the largest crop on record and is 15 per cent higher than the previous high record set in 1927.

The turkey supply is estimated to be 12 per cent of the crop will be readily for market in October.

Storage holdings Sept. 1, totaled 10,808,000 as compared with 5,711,000 pounds last year. This increased stock supply is equivalent to about 300,000 birds.
