LOCAL PUPILS TAKE PART IN PEACE CONTEST

The Prince of Peace Declaration Contest conducted throughout the state under the auspices of the Ohio Council of Churches will be held in Plymouth Methodist Church Sunday evening 8:00 o'clock. Rev. H. T. Wintermute, is the pastor of the church.

The following high school boys and girls will participate in the contest: Robert Ross, Ray Ford, Joanne Derr.

Each one has memorized an oration chosen from the official Book of Selections published by the Ohio Council of Churches and will deliver that oration. Judges have been chosen to pick the winner who will receive a bronze medal from the Ohio Council of Churches and who will represent The Plymouth Methodist Church in the County contest to be held early in December.

The winner of the county contest will receive a silver medal and will represent Richmond County in the District Contest.

The winner of the latter contest will complete in the state contest for awards as follows: First prize four year free tuition scholarship and \$200 in cash. Second prize, two year free tuition scholarship and \$100 in cash. Third prize, one year free tuition scholarship and \$50 in cash.

More than 400 churches in the state will hold similar contests Sunday night. This is the fifteenth annual series of contests in Ohio and many other states are now participating in the enterprise.

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RE CROSS ROLL CALL STARTS SAT

The annual Red Cross Roll Call will start this Saturday morning, Nov. 11th. Once again the people of Plymouth are to have the opportunity of helping do a great piece of work.



The Red Cross not only works here in times of flood and disaster relief, child welfare and home work, first aid and life saving, but as well the Red Cross works in nations abroad. The war has broken out in Europe, the Red Cross has appropriated \$250,000 to help the refugees, homeless and injured on the battle fronts. We had contributed \$50,000 to Polish relief and the Polish Red Cross itself raised \$20,000 but that barely touches the edge of the problem. In Rumania there are 11,000 refugees, civilians, not soldiers, who are not being cared for except by the Red Cross. In Lithuania there are 11,000 refugees in whose care the Red Cross is assisting the government.

In addition supplies have been sent for the care of the wounded and needy in Germany, France, England and Poland. Thus the good work of the Red Cross goes on all over the world.

Plymouth will do its share just as it has in the past. For the past two years we made the admirable record of surpassing our quota. This year, with the Red Cross facing greater needs than ever before we ought to do even better than the past two years.

Derr Loses to Opponent by Margin of 66 Votes; One Mill Levy For Cemetery Wins by 44 Votes; Rhine And Moore Are Re-elected.

One of the biggest "off-year" votes in the history of Plymouth was cast at the ballots in Tuesday's election, with the results running unusually close in the mayor's race.

Wm. Johns, out of 568 votes polled, drew a finish of 66 votes over J. B. Derr for mayor. While no outward political campaigning was done by either candidate, the interest in the race was spell-bound at the finish.

The one mill levy for the upkeep of the cemetery was carried by a margin of 44 votes. Precinct A. D. Smith's vote polled a total of 176 votes for the one mill levy, while 114 voted against it. In Precinct B, Huron county, the issue was decided, primarily due to the fact that Huron county voters had an additional levy put up by Huron county, which gave the tax increase in that county 2 mills. The vote in Huron county for the levy was 108 for the levy and 125 against it.

In both precincts the Bigelow Pension plan was snuffed under. In fact all the proposed amendments suffered a defeat in Plymouth's marshing.

In the township's race, Otis Moore, present incumbent of the marshal's office, claimed a victory over B. O. Blanchard in both precincts with a total of 132 votes for the finish.

Neal Shepherd, Willard Wirth and Walter Dawson, who were winners in the race for Board of Public Affairs. Dawson received nine more votes than did Wm. Root, another candidate for the office.

In the race for Plymouth Township trustees, the Baird made it a tie. They have ten days in which to decide whether or not to call a recount or to toss a coin.

James Rhine, present incumbent, was re-elected to the Clerk's office with a large majority over L. R. Shields.
