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SALES TAX REPORTS DUE

REPORTS FOR LAST HALF OF 1939 DUE, JAN. 31 IS THE DEADLINE.

H. D. Miracle of Mansfield, Sales Tax Examiner for this district announces this week that he will be in Plymouth on Wednesday, January 3rd during banking hours at the Peoples' National Bank to assist vendors in making out their sales tax report for the last half of 1939. The reports are now due and the deadline for filing is January 31st. A penalty of \$1.00 per day will be assessed for each day later than the deadline.

Vendors on either side of the county line may take advantage of Mr. Miracle's office to assist. In Shiloh Mr. Miracle will be present on Thursday, January 11th in the morning only. At Shelby, he will spend all day on Friday, January 13th. At George Armstrong's office and again on Thursday afternoon the 11th and all day Thursday, the 25th at the same location.

With the exception of the above dates, he will be in his office on the third floor of the City Hall, Mansfield, the balance of the time.

HURON COUNTY MUST REDUCE CORN ACREAGE

"561 Million Bushel Carry Over in U. S. Reason for Downward Adjustment," Finlay Says.

"A carryover of 561 bushels of corn facing U. S. farmers in 1940 is the best way to inform Huron County farmers that the acreage of corn next year will have to come down in order to level off production and protect corn prices."

This was the comment made recently by Chairman Robert E. Finlay of the Huron County AAA Committee who announced that the 1940 Huron County corn allotment has been set at 32,573 acres. The 1939 allotment was 34,977 acres.

The October 1 carryover of 561 million bushels is almost three times the average 10-year carryover of 212 million bushels, the chairman pointed out. "In order to protect the loan program which guarantees farmers a certain price providing production does not exceed certain levels, the downward adjustment in corn acreage is necessary," he said.

HIGHER YIELDS "Furthermore, the increase in the corn conservation payment from 9 to 10 cents and increases in yields should offset the adjustment farmers are asked to make. Fewer acres plus higher yields as demonstrated in 1939 and the 10 cent conservation payment will more than protect farmers' income from corn next year," he declared.

The chairman urged farmers to plant within their corn allotments. "By doing so, farmers are not only protecting farm income, but they also avoid the added expense of seed, labor and equipment necessary to harvest acres of corn not needed."

Allotments for individual farmers in Huron County will be mailed to local farmers within the next few days.

"Planting within all special allotments will make cooperators eligible for both conservation and parity payments and a loan on next year's corn crop," he said. In closing, the chairman reminded farmers that 27 million bushels of corn out of the 561 bushel carryover are in the Ever-Normal Granary either under seal on farms or held by Commodity Credit Corporation in steel bins or terminal storage. "This is now providing protection against an over-burdened market."

"1940 plantings are expected to supply all domestic demands, including any possible increased demand for pork and lard for export, he concluded."

MRS. ROBINSON DIES SUDDENLY

Hearst Attack Fatal to Mrs. Walter Robinson; Death Came At Daughter's Home in Norwalk. Tuesday Night.

The sudden death, Tuesday night of Mrs. Alice Swanger Robinson, 53, wife of Walter Robinson, brought much sorrow to hundreds of friends in Plymouth and vicinity.

Death came suddenly to Mrs. Robinson as a result of a heart attack, which came upon her at 9 o'clock Tuesday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Aubrey Stoutenberg, 101 Norwood Ave., Norwalk. Mrs. Robinson had motored to Norwalk Sunday to spend the Christmas holiday with their daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Stoutenberg. Tuesday morning Mr. Robinson returned to his work here, while his wife remained in Norwalk for a few days' visit. While Mrs. Robinson's health had been somewhat impaired the past few years, her condition was not considered serious.

Mrs. Robinson had been up and around the home all day Tuesday assisting with the household duties, and did not complain about her condition. She was last seen getting up her 17-month-old granddaughter to bed Tuesday night, when she was stricken. Death came very quickly from that attack.

The deceased was born April 8, 1886, near Plankton, and had been a resident of this vicinity all of her life. For many years she was employed as a bookkeeper at New London, Ohio. Quite a number of years ago she came to Plymouth with her husband, who was employed at the Fate-Ryot-Heath Co.

Mrs. Robinson was a member of the Lutheran Church at Shiloh, and was also affiliated with the Rebecca Chapter, I. O. O. F., at New London. During her residence in Plymouth she made a host of friends through her amiable disposition. As a wife and mother her family was very close to her. She found her greatest interest in beautifying her home and surroundings—she was a lover of flowers and the beauty they afford.

Besides her husband Walter, Mrs. Robinson is survived by one daughter, Alice Robinson Stoutenberg of Norwalk, two sisters, Mrs. H. A. Baker of Mansfield, and Mrs. C. C. Chase of Los Angeles, Calif.; four brothers, Clarence Swanger of Bellingham, Wash., George Swanger, Shiloh; Sherman Swanger, Shelby and Chas. Swanger of Mansfield. Two grandchildren also survive, Donald and Janna Stoutenberg of Norwalk.

Funeral services will be held at the Laible & Brady Funeral Home in Norwalk at 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. Burial will be made in Greenlawn cemetery, Plymouth.

CHRISTMAS BUSINESS AT P. O. INCREASED

Social Security Payments Begin January First For 1,000,000 Elderly People

A bright spot on the business horizon for 1940 is the fact that Social Security payments start on January 1st. It is estimated that, throughout the nation, at least 1,000,000 elderly people—men and women over 65—will become eligible during the next year for monthly annuities to be paid them the rest of their lives. Already thousands are jamming the regional offices of the Social Security board to find out when they get their first checks.

These payments ought to filter down into trade channels pretty rapidly. They will put back into active circulation some of the money that has been held out of trade channels the last few years by the social security taxes on paychecks and payrolls. Much of the money will be spent by the oldsters for better food and clothing.

Under the changes Congress made last spring in the original social security legislation, any worker 65 years old can qualify for monthly payments for the rest of his life—even though he hasn't worked since S. S. went into effect three years ago—he now gets a job and holds it for 18 months. If he earns \$25 a week for that period, and is married, he can retire and get a monthly check of \$38.25 as long as he lives. An interesting and heartening development of this provision is that many companies now are voluntarily providing jobs for retired employees so that they can get the extra months of work needed to qualify for a monthly S. S. check.

Deadline Set For Adjusted Compensation
All veterans who desire to obtain the benefits of adjusted compensation and have not applied should file form WWC No. 1 or an informal application with impression of fingerprints of right hand prior to midnight of January 2, 1940. Veterans who have received their adjusted compensation in ten quarterly installments or as beneficiary should not make application. Dependents of deceased veterans where previous application has not been made or benefits received should file in the following order—wife, children, mother or father.

Applications must be received in the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., or its Regional Office, or Facility located throughout the country on or before January 2, 1940.

If there is a doubt regarding the filing of the original application, an application should be filed before the expiration date.

McGregor Out For Congressman in 17th District

Coshocton, Ohio—State Representative J. Harry McGregor, of West Lafayette, majority leader of the House of Representatives, announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for congressman from the 17th district.

Mr. McGregor has been state representative from Coshocton county in 1934 he has twice been re-elected, each time by an increasing majority. His first majority in 1934 was 884. Two years later he was re-elected by a margin of 940 votes, and in 1938 he was returned with a majority of 909 votes.

In the 52nd General Assembly he was chosen as Republican "whip" and as secretary of the powerful finance committee. In the present legislature he has been speaker pro tem and Republican floor leader of the House.

White guiding legislation on the floor of the House Mr. McGregor has been the originator or co-author of a large number of bills and resolutions that have been accorded state-wide recognition.

Among the better known of these are the laws giving free text books to all children in the public schools; permitting old age pensioners to retain their property; setting up a financial program for the school foundation; making it possible for teachers to be paid on time and in cash; asking the federal government to assume the costs of the Muskingum Conservancy district; prohibiting the use of hunters' and trappers' license fees except for conservation purposes.

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since 1902, Mr. McGregor was born on a farm near Unionport, September 30, 1896. In 1918 he was married to Miss Twila Cox, of Dresden. They have three children, Constance, a senior at Miami University; Betty, a sophomore at the same college; and Harry Laird McGregor, in the sixth grade at West Lafayette.

Mr. McGregor was educated at West Lafayette high school, West Lafayette college and Oberlin college.

During the world war he served in the field artillery. He is at present commander of post 468, American Legion, but will resign this office to conduct his campaign.

He has been a trustee for ten years and for five years president of the board of the West Lafayette Methodist Church.

He has also been a member of the West Lafayette school board since 1931, and for three years was chairman of this body.

Mr. McGregor is a member of West Lafayette lodge 602, F. and A. M. and Knights Templar, and the Shrine. He served as District Attorney the 18th Judicial district from 1933 to 1937. He is also a member of the Order of Eastern Star, and served this organization as Worthy Patron in 1937.
