Because of the Earth's tilt at this time of year the Sun's direct rays fall on latitudes far south of the equator, while in North America the solar rays even at noon are quite oblique. A night twenty-four hours long has come again to the Arctic Wastes and extreme cold prevails, while summer is at its height in Australia and in the Argentine. The Midnight Sun shines on the south pole and an expedition of explorers has embarked for that region to take advantage of its light.




