Potato Story

(Continued from Page One)

needed most of the time to cultivate the crop. At harvest time between fifty and sixty men will be hired to do the work. Mr. Stambaugh travels back and forth between the two farms under cultivation at the present, to see that all is going well, while Foreman, Candler directs the actual daily labor. He is a tall, thin, wiry would be the correct adjective. In his high shoes, rough trousers, shirt and white helmet, with keen blue eyes that gleam the glare of the sun keeps reaching to mere slits, and with a sun-tan which would be the envy of most beach-bathers, this man could be called the Mahab of the tropical farm or plantation. And he knows his potatoes!

GOOD POTATOES
There has been a tendency in times past to look askance at the muckland potato, but this vegetable can now take its place with the best of them. Poor drainage, of none at all, was the probable cause of the soggy, water-logged potato that many housekeepers identify as the muck potato. Now, with good drainage, and with new strains produced in muckland cultivation, there is no noticeable difference between potatoes grown in the black ground, and those from the clay and sandy soils.

Candler states that the principle difference is in the cooking. The muckland potato requiring a shorter period of time to become properly cooked. And that's a good tip for the frugal housekeeper.

FIELD IS FINE GREEN
With all the dry weather suffered lately, and with most of the local potato patches looking brown, sparse and scorched, it was actually a surprise to find a field of potatoes on the muck (where it usually gets hotter than the proverbial Hades) that was a healthy green with sturdy stalks, and millions of blossoms, and with the appearance of having been irrigated daily. It is scientific means, however, and not irrigation, that keeps the plants growing and green in spite of the dry weather.

Plenty of the proper kind of fertilizer is used at planting time, and dusting the growing plants is a necessary and important item. Copper sulphate and lime is used. This dusting is done on no small scale, by the way, for twelve rows dusted at one time! When the plants are small enough for the aisles of black dirt to be visible between the rows of plants, six cultivators are pulled by a tractor. This is a small model of the Twenty-Mule Team of Death Valley.

WEEDS ARE TROUBLE
The fight with the weeds is a continuous one, ever, and the fighting of the first giant growth. The perennial weeds give the most trouble, particularly the willow flag variety, and the cutting like a knife. This is the weed that muckland children know as the bow and arrow plant, and the stems when mature and dry make splendid arrows for playing Indian.

RATTLESNAKES
No count was made of the number of rattlesnakes that have been killed, but there have been plenty, the men say. No snake bites as yet, however, and it is hoped the good luck continues.

A deep ditch borders the south side of the fields, running east and west, and although it was cleaned out once this spring, the green growth is thick and high again. It would not be a pleasant place to go wading with bare feet.

MORE DRAINAGE
If the harvest is as good as conditions now indicate, another drainage system will be put in, utilizing the duck pond in the center of the muck. This is the small body of water that migrating wild fowl remember from year to year. More new land will be broken up for planting next season, and will be tiled.

A grading shed is being erected across the ditch from the potatoes where the sorting will be done. This work is usually done by women, after the crop is washed.

NOT BOULDER DAM BUT IN GOOD ENOUGH
In order to secure enough water for mixing the cement for building purposes, a temporary dam has been put across the ditch. At least mustn't be very good for holding the water back, old concrete supports that years ago held oil or gas tanks near the ditch, were torn out and used.

This ditch water, which looked pretty green and stagnant, will not be used for washing potatoes. Waiting for water will be started in the near future, and it is expected that wells will supply all the water needed.

Already the potatoes are quite large, much larger than have been seen lately in the town gardens. We would estimate them about two and a half inches

in diameter, and they are quite smooth.

LOST IN THE SWAMP
The west end of the potato fields borders the huckleberry marsh that attracts many berry pickers. Several years ago two men were overtaken by darkness before they could return to the path from the berry marsh. The hours they spent must have been truly a nightmare, wandering around in the blackness in weeds over their head, with snakes, swampy ground, small wild-life and their imaginations making the night a time or terror. One can imagine what the first streaks of dawn must have meant. They came out of the muck on the edge of the marsh, and from where they had entered, and they had practically wandered in circles all night.

If the cares and worries of everyday life are getting you down, and you would like a place of quiet, quite away from the ways of civilization, just drive out on the muck as far as your car can go, and then get out and walk. You will soon find yourself in a wilderness such as probably the Ohio Indian once knew. Trapping on the frozen marsh was once a favorite sport with the youth of old Plymouth, and what adventures they must have once had when wildlife was larger and more abundant.

HOT WEATHER
Although the temperature goes mighty high out on the flat land, where trees are few and far between, Candler and his men have suffered no bad effects from the heat.

Part of the labor employed are key-men who are experienced in the work. Additional men are found in neighboring towns when the crop requires more attention. Stambaugh, who now owns 640 acres of the muck land, says that the potato has replaced bread as the staff of life in this country, and when one considers that this vegetable is cooked for almost every meal, the statement is plausible.

Explorers discovered the potato in South America and took it back to Europe with them. The 1939 crop, when harvested, will be trucked directly to market via the grading shed, but individuals may make purchases at the field.

In case you are planning to visit it, the crop goes from Plymouth past the little settlement of New Pittsburgh, over the bridge, and turn right on a narrow road, with gravel and sand top. Drive north, keeping on the road nearest the ditch which runs north and south; drive past the black dirt storage, on and over the board bridge, and turn left. There you will find the potatoes as you see your car register. The men assure us that the bridge they built has a good foundation, and though you hold your breath when you start over, you'll get over safely.
