A GOOD CITIZEN

He was a graduate of Shiloh High School and an outstanding student of exceptionally fine Christian character.

Reaching for the Stars by Nora Waln. In June of 1934 Nora Waln with her husband motored across the Belgian frontier to her new home on the Rhine, she faced the difficult problem of trying to live with and understand the German people.

Within the Nazi barriers she found the warm elements of German character. Through her husband's work as a musician she was admitted to the inner circle of artists and music lovers.

It was all the more disconcerting to her to find the shocking contrast between the deep-hearted tenderness of the German people and the blind cruelty of their nationalistic pride.

She could not shut her eyes to the persecution, the desertion of free speech and of loyalty to the kin, the obedience without mercy, which clouded the lives of so many households.

"Is Germany dead?" she asked herself. "Or does she lie in Snow White in a trance from eating a poisoned apple?"

To answer these questions this American Quaker has told in poignant human terms the true story of her life in Germany from 1934 to 1938. "The mind which now guides my use of words strives only for accuracy. It is as tell as honest as I can what I have learned from the Germans."

SNITE, BACK HOME. IS STILL SMILING

Still undaunted, and facing life with a smile, Chicago's young man in the "iron lung" Frederick B. Snite, Jr., came home after a 4,000-mile trip which took him to the historic grotto at Lourdes, France.

He arrived in his private car

San Lucas, attached to a New-York-Chicago train. Accompanying him were his parents and attendants, including doctors, nurses, orderlies, a chauffeur and a psychotherapist.

While his supplication to the Virgin of Lourdes produced no miracle, his father said the experience had enriched the boy's life and had given him renewed courage, adding:

"A miracle already has been performed by science. When Fred was stricken with infantile

paralysis three years ago in Chicago, physicians said he hadn't a chance in a million to live. But he is still alive, more mentally alert than ever, and taking an increased interest in life."

He is now able, his father said, to use his small chest respirator four or five hours daily, while receiving sun lamp treatments, and has been able to breathe without artificial lungs for more than an hour at a time.

"I'll Still Take Ohio" Says
Former Resident in California

That old slogan that "Ohio is the heart of the nation" still rings in the ears of Mary Lerch Fenton who left Plymouth three years ago to make her home in Hollywood, California. Sunny days, cool nights and lots of stars (Hollywood Kind) and others thrown in can't compare to her native Ohio, in her estimation.

Excerpts taken from a recent letter are so interesting that we are publishing them, knowing her local friends will be glad to have word.

Expressing her appreciation of the local paper and her amazement at the number of deaths that have occurred since her departure she speaks about California as follows:

"Now, about California, Sunny days are here again—for awhile we didn't see much of the sun, and yet we didn't have rain, just stayed cloudy and quite nice. The past week we have had our first touch of summer. Later we are having much wind, especially over the noon and early afternoon—from 5 p. m. on the wind usually goes down with the sun. We have no twilight, so we do not have the opportunity of enjoying the evenings out doors as you do in East. We are glad to do coats or else close windows and stay indoors. Nights are always cool and often cold."

"I am sure you write the roar of bombers, and American Air Wop-wood—in honor of the convention of Vet. Foreign Wars. They are taking possession of Hollywood Blvd. with a grand military parade and electrical pageant tonight. I did not go to see it, but crowds are so great and parking places are very scarce, and it's too tiresome to stand so long. Often they give these parades and pageants in the huge Coliseum, then we go and see them for we can get good seats and see the spectacle in comfort. We like to see when we know The Stars will be on parade, as they were when The Legion had their Nat. Convention out here. They were all out that night, from Shirley Temple to the oldest and oldest ones. The Legionaires were royally entertained."

If all goes well, over the Fourth when Mr. F. has a few days vacation, we may go to San Francisco Fair; not so much to see the Fair, as the country, between the Harbor and the Golden Gate, etc. We will not drive, but will take the new air conditioned greyhounds and take advantage of the very low rates. Then use the sight seeing tour while there. Are you contemplating seeing either Fair? We had a very lovely as well as wonderful trip to San Pedro Harbor, where the Fleet was in—was Harbor Day. Battleships were open to visitors. We water taxi'd across Harbor to S. S. California—climbed to the only Hospital Ship in the Navy. From there we chose, instead of another U. S. boat, to go on the British Battle Cruiser Orion. The educational value, of the sightseeing of the boats, and the glorious trip across the Harbor, was the making of the most perfect day I have spent in the West."

Another day and I haven't finished this letter. I got too tired and sleepy last night to finish. So far today I have been too occupied to get back to it. Some friends came at noon for tea and we drove to Patriotic Hall, where the many D.U.V. Tents were having a courtesy day—eleven tents in all—from Hollywood, Inglewood, Glendale, Los Angeles and other districts surrounding Los Angeles. A crowd was there and all seemed to have a wonderful time."

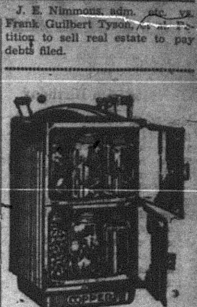
