A committee was appointed to contact the various clubs and organizations in the town with the idea of a representative from each to serve on a General Park Committee. There was a good attendance present and the park proposition is gaining favor. With such an unusual and splendid offer before the town, the project should be pushed to the fullest.

ANOTHER FACTORY FOR PLYMOUTH?

Dr. Gaskill, mayor, recently received a communication from a Contact Agent in Chicago, Ill., with the possibility of an out-of-state factory locating in Plymouth.

The letter was read before the group and Dr. Gaskill was authorized to investigate the matter before anything definite was decided. The letter stated that the factory is looking for locations in smaller towns preferably with a population of 2,000 or under, to cut the enormous overhead expense. In this instance, the prospective factory, as yet unnamed, will hire approximately 100 men the year round and if building and ground were available, it is possible to erect here. A representative is expected in Plymouth at an early date when more details will be forthcoming.
