AT GALLON DIES

BURT E. PLACE WAS AFFILIATED WITH TWO OTHER COMPANIES; FUNERAL ON WEDNESDAY.

Death attended Burt E. Place, 59, Gallon industrialist and financier, at his home, 134 West Church Street at 6:30 p. m. Sunday. Mr. Place had been in failing health for several years. President of the First National bank since 1924, Mr. Place was a director of the American Steel and Wire Company and an executive of the E. M. Freese and Company. He was associated with the bank thirty-five years.

Born in Grand Rapids, Mich., Sept. 7, 1870, he attended school in Plymouth, and joined the Freese Company when it was located in Plymouth. He came with the company when it moved its plant to Gallon, Ohio.

Mr. Place was a member of the Gallon Board of Education when the new Gallon high school was built and a member of all of the Masonic lodges, Elks and United Commercial Travellers.

His wife, Mabel, two sons, Lawrence E. and Horace F. Place of Gallon; a daughter, Mrs. W. R. Heffner of Gallon; and a son, Mrs. Nina Currier, of Cleveland, and four grandchildren, survive.

He was the son of the late Rev. Dr. Horace Place, a Methodist pastor, who held pastorate in this part of Ohio for many years.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday from the Whitridge funeral home at 2 p. m.

HURON COUNTY COURT NOTES

The Northern Ohio Telephone Co. has filed an injunction suit in common pleas court, Norwalk, to restrain the Findlay Electric Cooperative Inc. from erecting power lines and poles on the west side of the New State rd between North Fairfield and Boughtonville. In its petition, the plaintiff avers that the REA units it is setting poles on the west side of the road between telephone poles that have been in place thirty-five years. It is further set forth that the 300 foot spans of high tension wire that are to carry 8,600 volts or more, are planned to be hung with a clearance of from two to five feet contrary to the regulations of the Public Utilities Commission, which has stipulated in order seventy-two that the clearance should be two-thirds of the falling distance of the higher pole. The telephone company asserts that the high tension wires if hung directly over the telephone lines would result in a great hazard and a menace to the company and its patrons, and that inductive interference might be set up. It is stated in the petition that the high tension line might cause induction trouble. The Higley Construction Co. of Findlay is made a party defendant.

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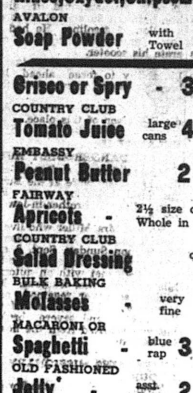
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
