WHITE CALLS ANNAPOLIS EXAMS ON OCTOBER 7TH

Washington, D. C., Sept. 2nd.—Congressman Dudley A. White has announced that the competitive examinations for 1940 appointment to Annapolis from the 18th Ohio District will be conducted by the United States Civil Service Commission on October 7, 1939.

Each applicant is required to pass a preliminary physical test given by Navy examiners before he is eligible to participate in the mental examination of the district competition.

The Post Office Building at Sandusky, Ohio, has been designated by the U. S. Civil Service Commission as the place where the examinations will be held.

The examinations are restricted to residents of the district and the nominations will be made according to the grades certified by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, provided the applicants are otherwise qualified as to character, residence, physical condition, etc.

"It is my purpose," said Mr. White, "that the selections must be determined on the highest possible merit basis, in keeping with the character and standards of the institution. Each applicant will have to prove his own qualifications and no artificial obstacles will stand in his way."

All boys living in the district who desire to participate in the qualifying examinations on October 7th should communicate immediately with Congressman White, Room 241, House Office Building, Washington, D. C., so that the necessary authorization may be sent to them with instructions as to when and where to report.

Applicants for Annapolis must be not less than 16 years of age, nor more than 20 years of age, on April 1, 1940.

No vacancy for this district is indicated at West Point until 1942 unless there is a withdrawal in the meantime.

OFFER LOANS TO FARMERS

REHABILITATION LOANS
AVAILABLE TO FARMERS
IN HURON COUNTY.

Huron County has been assured of its part in the rural rehabilitation phase of the farm security administration program for the year ending June 30, 1940. Farm security administration funds have been made available for this year's lending program according to a statement made this week by Albert G. Dauch, Huron County rural rehabilitation supervisor at Norwalk, Ohio.

Rehabilitation loans are made to farmers, farm laborers and share croppers who need operating capital in order to farm successfully, but who lack sufficient security to borrow from the usual credit agencies. Every loan made by the farm security administration is accompanied by assistance in farm and home management. Emphasis is placed on the "Family-sized Farm" operated on a plan which will yield a good living off the farm in addition to enough to repay the loan and provide for permanent security.

"The Farm Security Administration," explained Albert G. Dauch, "is interested in helping worthy farm families who cannot get help elsewhere. That takes

early now to begin laying plans for next year. Farmers who are having difficult problems may be able to solve them by starting early. The service of the farm security administration is available to eligible farmers, and the office at Norwalk, Ohio is ready to take applications for loans."

Rehabilitation loans are secured by the chattels purchased with the money borrowed and may be repaid in not longer than five years at 5 percent interest.

GRASS ISLAND

ON ROUTE 20

An "Island" 18 foot wide will separate the two 22-foot lanes of traffic on the New Route 20 cut-off around Oberlin. The north lane is nearly complete and the south lane will be begun next spring. The island will be seeded to grass and landscaped.

A new safety feature will be the clover-leaf turns at the intersections of 58 and 511. It is reported that protests by Oberlin College that the heavy truck traffic damaged sensitive instruments, caused the new highway to go around Oberlin.

TO INSURE 1940
WHEAT CROP

The Huron County AAA Com-
mittee is ready to begin the sign-
up wheat growers who want to
insure their 1940 wheat crop, ac-
cording to an announcement to-
day by Robert F. Finlay, Chair-
man.

"The yields that may be in-
sured, and premium rates, have
been determined for all wheat
farms in the county," Mr. Finlay
said, "and all the forms are on
hand for completing applications."
This year, the insurance
is being written in one operation,
and all the grower has to do is
fill out the application, indicate
the acreage he intends to
seed, and pay the premium."

Under the insurance program,
growers can insure 50 or 75
percent of their average yield
as determined for the base pe-
riod 1926-33. The insurance is
"all-risk" and protects against
all unavoidable hazards that
might reduce the yield.

Premiums may be paid in
one of three ways, the Chair-
man said. Growers may pay
with actual wheat in the form of
a warehouse receipt with check
or cash, representing a value
equivalent to the amount of
wheat called for by the premium
at the current market; or they
may advance against payments
that may be earned in the 1940
Agricultural Conservation Pro-
gram. The amount of the pre-
mium is computed at the time
the application is filled out.

LET'S EXPLORE OHIO

THE MORMONS IN OHIO

High in the beautiful hill coun-
try of northeastern Ohio, in the
valley of Kirtland, stands a
huge church.

Woven around the church is an
amazing story, one of the most
fascinating in Ohio's fascinating
history.

The story of the church really
starts in New York State in 1827,
when Joseph Smith announced
the discovery of golden tablets
covered with mystic writing. It
was only through the aid, Smith
said, of a pair of crystalline stones
which he called Urim and Thum-
mim that the mysterious charac-
ters could be read. They told the
story of Mormon and were the
basis of the Mormon Church.

Three years later, through a se-
ries of circumstances too long to
be recited here, Smith led his fol-
lowers, some 50 families, from
New York to Kirtland, where they
were joined by Sidney Rigdon, a
"Reformer" preacher from Mentor,
Ohio. Another three years elapsed
and work was started on the church.
Those were still primitive days in
Ohio. Trees had to be felled in
the forest and stone cut and
dressed in a nearby quarry. The
men of the congregation labored
on the first floor of the church
at each end of the auditorium four
pulpits were built, rising one
above the other, and each large
enough to hold three people. They
were for the two classes of priest-
hood.

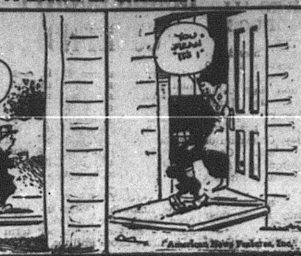
The stinging of the stately col-
umns was made by mason-

planes pulled by yokes of oxen.
By 1834 the church was com-
pleted. Four days and nights
were devoted to the religious cer-
emonies dedicating the church as
a religious edifice.
Then misfortune began to fall
upon the sect. The building of
the church itself was a drain on
the purses of the members. Added
to this, there were losses in land
speculation and finally a bank
failed, taking with it the savings
of the pioneers. The two men were
arrested and convicted of illegal
banking.
During the night they fled,
pursued by armed men on gallop-
ing horses. From Ohio they went
to Missouri, then to Illinois, and
finally started the long trek which
ended in Utah.
The church on which so much
effort, money and time had been
spent was deserted until 1880,
when the "Organized Church of
Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints"
acquired title to the property by
court decision. Since then it has
been in constant use.
On Sundays, especially, hun-
dreds of people drive to pictur-
esque Kirtland to go through the
church. Guides are provided, who
tell its interesting story of more
than a century.
The story of the Mormons was
a fascinating chapter in Ohio's thrill-
ing history—one with which to-
day's people are familiar.
