



said, or a pair of crystamine stones, which he called Urim and Thummim that the mysterious characters could be read They told the story of Mormon and were the basis of the Mormon Church. Three years later, through a series of circumstanes too long to be recited here. Smith led his followers, some 50 families, from New York to Kirtland, where they were joined by Sidney Rigdon, a "Reformer" preacher from Mostlora work was started on the church. Those were still primitive days in Ohio. Trees had to be felled in the forest and stone cut and dressed in a nearby quarry. The
