Local People Attend Four Square Temple at Los Angeles

The doors of Angelus Temple are open 365 days of the year with crowds in attendance at the three-day services. Since its opening on January 1, 1923, the Foursquare headquarters had had a non-stop revival headed by its founder, Almee Sempie McPherson.

The entire service is quite dramatic, music playing a most important part. The Temple is known as "The Church of the Singing Heart." The choir is vested in white satin robes and at each service some special accessory is added or changed such as a small flower, all the same color or streaming colored ribbons from the hymnals.

Once a month, the collection for that day is turned over to Mrs. McPherson as her salary, and on October 9th at 7:30 p. m. the birthday of Mrs. McPherson will be observed, with a special birthday offering of one dollar from each member and friend.

Those who are in need who apply at the Temple are asked no questions and something like thirty-thousand baskets of food were given out the past year. The good that Mrs. McPherson and her co-workers have done cannot be estimated.

While Angelus Temple was the highlight in the trip of Mrs. Ruckman and daughter, they also enjoyed his sight seeing trips in other cities and stopovers which included Omaha, Neb., Denver, Colo., Salt Lake City, Utah, Oakland, San Francisco, Kansas City, Hollywood, San Diego and Tijuana.

Christian Church at Shenandoah Re-dedicated Sunday Sept. 24th

Sunday, Sept. 24, the Christian Church at Shenandoah was re-dedicated and it was almost on the sixty-third anniversary of the founding of that church.

Previous to the erection of this church a "Union Meeting House" founded in 1849 stood on the main highway south of the village and was used by Quakers, Presbyterians, German Reform, Methodists and Church of God, as a house of worship.

Instrumental in building this edifice were Christian Ulrich, David Miller, Tobias Fox, George Burgoyne, Charles Savers, Peter Seurist, William Foulks, Daniel Quinn and Henry Long.

During the year 1870 through the efforts of Mrs. Catherine Sanker, John Tanyer and William Sonnanstine, Rev. Jacob Lowe was invited to preach in the "Union Meeting House." A few people gathered and he announced that he would come to preach one year later. He kept his promise coming in July and renewed the promise setting the third Sunday in July of the following year. The good seed was sown.

Many heated discussions were held in the district of Johnston and Isaac Morris on winter nights when Dr. Starr and John Tanyer were often heard. Often Dr. Starr waxed emphatic and some member of one of the congregations would be asked, "Why don't you practice what you preach?" And the doctor would reply: "I'm no professor and you people are. Why don't you practice it and teach it as it is in the Book?" I'm showing you what the "Book" teaches.

During the winter of '73 and '74, John Lowe of Clear Creek, Dicksburg Church, and brother of Jacob Lowe was brought to Shenandoah by John Mercer and his wife, to hold a series of meetings. The revival continued six weeks and a church was organized February 24, 1876 with seventy-five charter members. From

that day the church has continued to grow and prosper.

The spirituality emanating from that congregation has been a blessing to the entire community, proving that where the spiritual life of a church is kept, the material needs are supplied. For a long time it has been the wish of the congregation to fully equip their church.

Although in 1914 an addition was built it was still inadequate for the growing congregation. Money was received from the late Mrs. Minerva Zeigler. Callie Stewart gave a present of \$25 for herself in memory of a sister and brother.

Through these beneficiaries the church has a basement, a new circulation heating system, new furnace, besides repairs for the parsonage.

Over 900 people have united with the church since its organization and nearly 300 are members at the present time. One of the early converts of the church was the late Franklin Morris who for years was a successful preacher of the Word and an able champion of the cause.

The following ministers have served this congregation: J. W. Lowe, B. F. Morris, W. B. Hendrix, A. Skidmore, A. S. Dabney, G. M. Kemp, C. S. Cliffe, J. H. Dodd, W. E. Amosbaugh, V. G. Hostetter, D. S. McDonald, O. W. Howarth, C. W. Perry, Wm. Leigh, J. W. Stewart and the present pastor, Turner Holt.

Rev. Holt has entered his 12th year and much of the high department of spiritual growth among the younger members is attributed to Rev. Holt's efforts and his example of an outstanding Christian gentleman.

At the rededication Sunday, former members and friends were present from Cleveland, Sandusky and all the surrounding cities and towns. The contribution on Sunday was over \$1100.00.

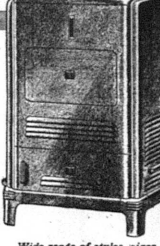
